

My Dear Parishioners,

Happy New Year! Sadly, the much anticipated and wonderfully fulfilling Season of Christmas is coming to an end this weekend with the celebration of the Baptism of our Lord. Jesus subjected Himself to John the Baptist for baptism so that He could, as ever, serve as our ultimate example. Jesus did not require baptism as He is the Second Person of the Trinity – God Himself and as such, does not require any act of cleansing or renewal; both attributes of the Sacrament of Baptism. Christ does not suffer from the burden of original sin so there is no need for Him to be baptized. Indeed, the baptism offered by John the Baptist was not the equivalent of the sacrament of Baptism which could only be established as a sacrament by Christ Himself and executed by the Church He created while on Earth. Yet, as Christ humbled Himself by taking on human form and coming down to earth to make the ultimate sacrifice so we could have an opportunity at eternal salvation, so to, He further humbled Himself by setting the example for each of us in having the Baptist, whom Jesus described as the greatest of the Prophets, immerse Him in the waters of the river Jordan. It is through our baptism that we are claimed for Christ and freed from the burdens of original sin imposed upon each of us by the disobedience of the first man and woman referred to in Genesis as Adam and Eve.

As the Christmas season closes, I want to thank everyone who did such a great job in providing the best Christmas has to offer for our storied parish. Of course, I am grateful to Fr. Dale and Fr. Christopher for their participation in ministry throughout Advent and during the Christmas Season. Likewise, congratulations go to Denise Bommarito, our Liturgical Coordinator, and her talented team for another triumph in decorating our church in a most beautiful manner. I am most grateful to Nancy Simmons and our choir for the beautiful music which rang out into the streets bringing the Christmas spirit to everyone nearby. Likewise, I want to again express my appreciation to the parish staff for the preparation and execution of our first Christmas Light Extravaganza – now that was great fun! I have already been chatting with our Christian Service Czarina, Debbie Goff-Liegghio regarding how we can top this year's successful kickoff.

Some great news- our annual CSA commitment has been met. We are in the end zone doing the touchdown dance as I author this note to you. Having said that, it would be inaccurate to say that the burden of CSA was equally or anything close to fairly carried by our parish. Minus the truly generous contribution of a very small number of parishioners, we would not even be close to satisfying half of our annual commitment. I realize CSA is not generally popular but I must remind everyone that it is through CSA that we send seminarians to seminary to become priests and without new priests there will be no sacraments and without the sacraments, we are all in a whole lot of trouble. I hope next year the burden is more evenly carried by all of us. I would rather see a great number of pledges in smaller amounts than relatively few pledges for huge sums made by a handful of parishioners. Great news; now that we have met our obligation, all sums collected for CSA, just like the Christmas collection, go to the parish without tax collected by the archdiocese. Accordingly, if you still have an outstanding pledge to satisfy, know that 100% of your contribution will go to St. Peter's coffers.

Finally, a note on Mass intentions and the associated stipend for having a Mass offered. Our front office staff are being subjected to some pretty tough criticism from fellow parishioners who wish to have a Mass offered for a deceased or living loved one. In the past, this parish permitted multiple intentions for each Mass and we were collecting a stipend from each of these parishioners – for the same Mass. This practice is expressly forbidden by canon law and I could not permit the practice to continue. The law is very clear that only one stipend may be collected at the rate set by the archdiocese for every Mass. Thus, it is permissible to have a Mass said for a deceased or living person and with the permission of the person paying the stipend, for the Mass to be also celebrated for a second person but with no additional stipend collected by the Church for that added intention. The law in this area is intended to preclude abuses of the people of God. As a matter of law, the priest who offers the Mass is entitled to the stipend paid for the Mass. In practice, Fr. Christopher, Fr. Dale and I give the daily Mass stipend to the parish so we never see it. Yet, the law does not allow for us to offer the Mass for countless people. That practice would defeat the whole idea that the Mass is offered "for that individual". Let me be very clear, my predecessor was not personally collecting the stipends either and I am very sure, never intended to violate the letter of canon law. He was simply, good-hearted priest that he was, trying to satisfy the desires of his people. However, the law does not permit this flexibility in Mass offerings. So each of you know, the priest who says the Mass is obligated to make the Mass intention for the individual covered by the Mass stipend. For those who come to a weekday Mass which I preside at, you will note that I literally say the name of the deceased person within the Eucharistic prayer, leaving no doubt for whom the Mass is being

offered. This is a great tradition of the Church and we are going to execute the practice of Mass offerings in the manner specified by the Code of Canon Law. This may cause frustration and delay in having a Mass said for your loved one. You can blame your Pastor who is following the mandate of the law. Please know that the front office staff is bending over backwards to satisfy your requests. Contact me personally if you need a clearer explanation.

Finally, try to keep the Christmas spirit in your hearts despite the fact that the "de-santification" process (to quote a line from the dreadful sequel, "the Santa Clause 2") has begun and all of the decorations are coming down. Before you know it, Christmas will be right around the corner yet again and until then, we will together pine for the clarion call from the angels, "Oh come all ye faithful". So, for a last time this year, Merry Christmas and have a healthy and happy New Year.

Hello and happy Baptism of the Lord!

I pray that everyone is having a good start to the new year. For some, I know the year has started with illness. Please know of my prayers for all of you; prayers for good health and a quick recovery.

As we begin a new year, we are often filled with a sense of optimism, a hopefulness, and an anticipation at what stands before us in the year to come. I get excited when I think of the possibilities that God has in store for us. As I look back on my life, the most impactful moments, the things that mean the most to me, have always been things that I did not anticipate. They were all gifts from God and God never ceases to amaze us if we let Him. When we allow God to be in control, the possibilities are endless. This is often the hardest part, to allow God's will to be done instead of our own. I often come back to Blessed Solanus Casey, "Thank God ahead of time." I want to encourage us as we look out over a new year and the possibilities it holds, to take a moment to thank God for what is to come: "Thank you Lord for all that you have in store for me over the next year. I thank you for the joy, the happiness, the heartache, the sadness, the struggles, the suffering you allow, and for all the many blessings that await me. Lord, guide my heart this year, that your will may be done in me and that I may have the grace to accept it and follow you each and every day. Amen." The blessings of God are endless and to help us to receive them, I encourage us to cultivate a thankful heart.

Speaking of endless blessings and a thankful heart, this brings us to today's feast: the Baptism of the Lord. Jesus in the incarnation took on our fallen humanity that He might restore what had been lost in the fall. Christ as we know was born without sin and therefore did not need baptism, but took on baptism for us. He sets the example. In baptism all of us died with Christ in the baptismal waters and coming up from the water were brought into new life in Christ. Baptism purchases for us a new life in Christ, where we become adopted sons and daughters of God, of which we can never lose.

If I took a poll of our parish and asked how many of you know your birth date, or who your parents are, what do you think the response would be? 50%, 75%, 100%? I think all of us would know these answers. Now if I asked how many of you know when you were baptized and do you celebrate it each year, what do you think the response would be? This is my challenge, my homework for you; look up your baptism date, mark it on your calendar and celebrate it this year. It dawned on me as I write this article that today is my baptism anniversary.

The day we were baptized is one of the most important dates of our lives, just as important if not more important than our birthday. Like our birthday, our Baptism is a day of birth, a day we were born anew to a newness of life in Christ. Like with our parents and birthday, it cannot cease to be. To whom we were born to and when we were born are set. The same is true with God. In baptism we became beloved sons and daughters of God and we can never loose that. Again, no matter what we have or will do we cannot lose our adoption to Christ.

We as humans get stuck and caught up in what we have done in the past and think that our actions prevent God from loving us. This is not true. No matter what we have done in our past, it cannot separate us from the love of God. Nothing can separate us, but ourselves. We separate ourselves from God when we resist repentance. I encourage us as a parish, to start the new year on the right foot by learning and celebrating our own baptisms and to start the year with thanksgiving and repentance. Let us take the time over the next few weeks to do these things, to find out our baptismal dates, to make time for the great sacrament of healing (confession) and to offer a prayer of thanksgiving for the year ahead. I know God has many blessings in store for us this year, let us approach Him with open hearts, that we might live out our baptismal joy and trust in God each and everyday.



Back To the Future

The beginning of a new year usually means looking back and remembering both the good and bad times. Many of us are saying a loud good-bye to 2021 with hopes and plans (should we call



them resolutions?) for 2022. Our St. Vincent de Paul conference is no different. We lost three very wonderful Vincentians in 2021 and we miss them terribly.

We started 2021 in mourning for Father Mike. He was our champion and we joined the parish in grieving. Mid-year we were still dealing with the pandemic and its effects on the economy in the greater Mount Clemens area. Many of our neighbors were out of work, having been furloughed by their employers who were also struggling. But one bright light during that gloomy time was welcoming Fr. Christopher Muer to St. Peter parish. Fr. Christopher often stops by the pantry on his way to the Admin building to say a few words and join us in prayer.

Then the whirlwind happened when Fr. John Maksym, our new pastor, arrived on October first. It hasn't slowed down yet. With his enthusiasm and focus, Fr. John is working to raise the awareness of local residents that St. Peter Church is a vital part of our community and we are doing Jesus' work to reach out to our neighbors who need Jesus in their lives.

St. Vincent de Paul is also looking for ways to expand our ministry to include other services beside running a food pantry and providing occasional financial assistance when needed. Our first step is in providing food delivery to neighbors who do not drive or are otherwise unable to reach the pantry on New Street. We will be evaluating all suggestions to see how we can further see the face of Jesus in the faces of more neighbors.

As an organization that receives food from federal and state sources, we are required to complete reports for them. When reviewing the information we submit, it is amazing what we accomplish in the name of the Lord. For example, in December, we served 206 households, where 201 children under the age of 18 live. Our expenditure of \$4,700 went toward clothing, furniture, rents, utilities, and transportation expenses. This is in addition to providing food to 594 individuals. Another interesting statistic is that our total volunteer hours for 2021 was over 5,700. Amazing!

In addition to thanking the parishioners, the school and religious education families, and the parish staff, we invite any suggestions you may have for St. Vincent de Paul in helping to reach out further to our neighbors. Give us a call at 586 468-6522 or stop by the pantry on Wednesday or Friday mornings to give us your ideas. God bless, stay safe and see you in Church.






WOMEN'S BOOK CLUB
