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## Wayne States Universally

The church was packed for Christmas Mass; Not just with the usual parishioners, but with people who attend church only for special occasions. A crusty old pastor stared down at the congregation and began his homily. He gave them a hellfire and damnation sermon. He said the church was full of faces he only saw at Christmas and Easter. He told them what sinners they were, that they were using the Church, that God demanded more than a once or twice a year appearance. One could feel the atmosphere in the church change. The happy spirit of celebration turned sour: people felt uncomfortable, affronted, and angry. Some got up and walked out.

When the assisting priest stood to lead the closing prayer, he made a big point of praying especially for those who struggled with their faith, those who find faith difficult, those who continue to hang on to faith by their finger-tips, despite all the troubles and trials and tribulations of life. Rather than berating them, he did everything he could to encourage them.

These priests – though caricatures – represent two very different understandings of who God is, and what it means to believe in God. Which is right? Even as adults, many of us carry around an image of God from childhood: Perhaps God is viewed as an angry old man, demanding things of us, threatening eternal punishment when we sin. This is the God of the crusty old priest, a God who is to be feared, kept happy, to be placated and obeyed.

The readings paint a very different picture of God. Isaiah tells us that the coming of God is not bad but good news; Bringing peace and happiness, causing us to shout and sing for joy. No matter how messy or difficult our lives are - no matter what our own particular "ruins" are - God consoles, frees, redeems, and offers us salvation. The writer of the book of Hebrews tells us that Christ is the one who most fully and uniquely reveals God's love to us. The Father speaks through his Son. The Son is a perfect copy of the Father's nature. So, what is this Father like, as revealed by Jesus? In the Gospel, John tells us that God wants to save us so that we might have fullness of life. How God goes about this reveals everything. We find that we are not confronted with a powerful, angry, judgmental figure. Nor are we forced to believe and obey in the face of some awesome power. We are not even caught up in a compelling glory from which there is no escape. The whole Christmas story shows us that God isn't like that. Scripture reveals that God came to save us, not with a great show of power and strength, flashes of lightning or peals of thunder, but by being born as a baby. No pomp, drum rolls or razzle dazzle. A helpless baby, who was not even born in a house. Making a statement about our God who is very much at home with us. The Gospels continues: The Word who is God lived among us – pitched a tent among his people. Such a God doesn't threaten and menace but entices each of us to believe; Attracts and allures us. God is full of grace and truth, not spitting anger and fear.

Our Christmas congregation is most certainly made up of daily Mass-goers as well as those who haven't been to church in many years. Whoever we are, and wherever we are at on life's journey, each of us is invited to allow ourselves to be seduced by God; To let the Christ child enter our heart, to let God's love fill our soul. At least for a while, all of us are called to ponder how God, through Christ, made himself vulnerable; How close and available he made himself for us. Whether our faith in God is strong, weak, or somewhere in-between, whether our relationship with the Church is close or distant, we can look at the crib and know whatever level our faith – and/or doubt – God never loses faith in us. The Lord never gives up on us. To prove this, God will go any length, even to becoming a helpless baby, even to dying on a cross. Each of us is precious in God's eyes. Indeed, we've been created for life.

# Sunday, December 26, 2021 All Families Are Made Holy

Today's readings: Sirach 3:2–6, 12–14; Psalm 128: 1–2, 3, 4–5; Colossians 3:12–21 or 3:12–17; Luke 2:41–52 or 1 Samuel 1:20–22, 24–28; Psalm 84:2–3, 5–6, 9–10; 1 John 3:1–2, 21–24; Luke 2:41–52. Little is known about the life Jesus, Mary, and Joseph lived in Nazareth. From the time they returned from Egypt until the beginning of Jesus' public ministry, the only story that appears in Scripture about the family is the founding of Jesus in the temple. A close reading of this text shows that they were observant Jews and they went to Jerusalem each year for Passover. It also can be seen that they traveled with their extended family, so they had other significant relationships in their lives. They had regular family struggles. Mary asks, "Why have you done this to us?" She sounds like many mothers who are raising adolescents. Their family life is a model for ours, but it must have been very ordinary indeed.

Imagine what that can mean for us.

Jesus knows our hearts and our struggles because he lived them too. God entered into a family and set the family apart as a place of sanctification. The holy family makes all families holy. The family is an ordinary place filled with ordinary love, peace, mercy, justice, and forgiveness. It is a place to grow in holiness. This week, as you go about your routine, imagine how you are connected to Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, across time and space, to their home in Nazareth. If you are preparing a meal or folding the laundry, you are doing holy work, just as they did.

# Meditations for December 25 John 1:1-18

The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. (John 1:14)

Today we join Christians all over the world in celebrating the birth of Jesus. Today we rejoice that God has come to save us. And today we kneel before the manger in awe and gratitude. O come, let us adore him.

"The Word . . . " This child in Mary's arms is no ordinary infant. No, he is the Word who existed from the beginning. He is the image of the invisible God! Jesus, the unseen Word who created everything, has become visible in human flesh. Now we can see this God who loves us and made us. Not only that, but we can know him personally. Through Jesus, the God who made the world is now remaking it. He is making all things new, including our relationship with God. O come, let us adore him.
