
What reference point do you use when making decisions? Many times, impulse takes control and decisions are made based solely on emotion and desire. We all know that these types of decisions can often get us into trouble. When a person has a confident sense of who they are and a real understanding of what is important and of value, the likelihood of kneejerk impulsive choices diminishes. Baptism gives us what we need to make well informed and purposeful decisions. By this simple gesture, God claims us as His own and provides us with the identity and purpose we need to properly live life.

It is tremendously reassuring, when we truly embrace this revelation and realize that we no longer have to wonder about the purpose of our lives or struggle to find our way. The answer of who we are in God has been given to us. We no longer have to fumble around, trip over ourselves or walk aimlessly about. Issues surrounding the sacredness of life, the meaning of death, the protection of those most vulnerable, care for the weak and the poor, offering hospitality to those in search of a home, the purpose and proper place of work, how to create a just social order, caring for creation, and understanding our roles as heralds and stewards are just a few of the wonderful gifts baptism brings. When we make decisions based on things such as these core Gospel truths we really act as Christ himself, revealing to others the new creations that we are. This is how we live our baptism.

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It is difficult to walk against the tide. Yet, that is precisely what baptism calls us to do. Although we are sinners, in need of mercy and far from perfection we are called to order our life and make decisions based upon the wisdom and guidance of Almighty God. He alone is the one who can claim us as His sons and daughters. Standing up for our principles will not make us popular. But who ever said Christianity is a popularity contest? Baptism calls us to stand up for that which goes against the grain of secularism. Standing in line with other sinners, we have our anchor to steady us in the tempests of life and God is very pleased. Forge ahead. There is nothing to fear.

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The Baptism of the Lord

The feast of the Baptism of the Lord marks the end of the liturgical season of Christmas. These weeks of Christmas have been a time in which we have celebrated the amazing grace of God coming into our world being born into our human family! In the mystery of the incarnation, we learn that our God is a God who is among us, in our midst; that our God is Emmanuel: God with us.

So, as our cultural calendar marks the beginning of a new year, this feast of the Baptism of the Lord marks the end of the Christmas season and the beginning of the liturgical season of Ordinary Time. And with the start of Ordinary Time, we encounter an event in Scripture that marks the start of the public ministry of Jesus. So, as we prepare to tell again the story of our salvation in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus throughout Ordinary Time, our church gives us readings this day that teach us who Jesus is as he begins his mission and public ministry on earth.

From our readings this day, we hear that who Jesus is, as was foretold by the prophet Isaiah, is a bearer of justice who will do so quietly: "not crying out, not shouting, not making his voice heard in the street." With Jesus, the message is not shouted out, not forced upon us (as many leaders in the world might do), but his message is cultivated from within us. As Jesus is "God with us," he will bring about justice by being just; by living justly; by showing us how to live justly and so showing us what is possible when we follow his example. The lived message of Jesus is meant to quietly call us to change our hearts by living justly.

Who Jesus is is also demonstrated for us in Luke's account of Jesus' baptism. As a humble servant, Jesus submits himself to the baptism of John whereby we learn by the opening of the sky, the descent of the Spirit like a dove, and the voice speaking from above that Jesus, the humble servant, is (as God with us) the new way for humanity to connect with and to be in relationship with God. Also, by Jesus submitting to the baptism by full immersion in the Jordan we see, by symbol, God's full immersion into our humanity in the person of Jesus.

Our Scriptures this day on the feast of the Baptism of Jesus give us a clearer vision and understanding of exactly who "God with us" truly

is. As God's servant and son, we are reminded this day that the mission of Jesus is not about powerful words of persuasion or about loud displays of intimidation. Rather, we are reminded that Jesus' mission was about living a life that cultivates justice and peace, a cultivation directed toward the conversion of the hearts of all who encounter Jesus.

By living justly, by performing acts of love and mercy, by speaking (not shouting) words of hope and promise and peace, the mission that Jesus began at his baptism is his demonstration to the world of what it means to live in a world where "God is with us." Life with Jesus, God with us, is a life that brings light to our eyes and our hearts to liberate us from the blindness that impairs us and that only causes separation and division. In the mission of Jesus, God with us gives us a guiding light of justice and love that sets us free from our imprisonment to the dark dungeons of hatred, violence, and all forms of caustic and toxic ways of thinking and acting. Living life with "God with us," as we learn from Jesus, is living our lives with a purpose and direction in life that heals, unifies, forgives, and liberates.

On this feast day, ours is an invitation given to us by God to follow Jesus' example, and so come to experience in our lives the joys of living life with God with us!

January 9, 2022 In You I Am Well Pleased

Today's readings: Isaiah 42, 1–4 or Isaiah 40:1–5, 9–11; Psalm 29:1–2, 3–4, 3, 9–10 or Psalm 104:1b–2, 3–4, 24–25, 27–28, 29–20; Acts 10:34–38 or Titus 2:11–14, 3:4–7; Luke 3:15–16, 21–22. John the Baptist pointed away from himself and toward Jesus. He spoke God's Word to the people and baptized those who came to him, but he knew that he was not the messiah, the one who will baptize "with the holy Spirit and fire." And then one day, Jesus came to him to be baptized.

The heavens opened and the Spirit came down in the form of a dove. "You are my Beloved Son; with you I am well pleased." The Holy Spirit descended bodily, making Jesus ready for his public ministry. What joy John must have felt to see the fulfillment of God's promises to him and to the people of Israel! It was the beginning of Jesus' public ministry, in which he preached the kingdom of God but also revealed it in everything that he did.

On the day of our baptism, we receive the same Holy Spirit that descended on Jesus two thousand years ago. It is the beginning of our own vocation to reveal the kingdom of God in our words and our actions: to be like Jesus. How is God calling you today? You are God's beloved child, in whom God is well pleased. How will you carry the joy of that revelation into your life beyond the Christmas season?

Meditations for January 9 LUKE 3:15-16, 21-22

He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit. (Luke 3:16)

Now that's a promise worth remembering: Jesus wants to baptize us with his own Holy Spirit! But what does this mean?

Let's look first at Jesus' experience of the Spirit. Luke tells us that at Jesus' baptism, "the Holy Spirit descended upon" him (3:22). On that day, Jesus received the Spirit in a new way—a gift from God that would empower him and set him on the path of ministry, service, and ultimately death and resurrection. Though Jesus was already fully God, the Spirit of God still came upon him.

Luke includes a small but important detail in his account. As the Spirit descended on him, the Father called out, "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased" (Luke 3:22, emphasis added). He spoke directly to Jesus. He told him how delighted he was in his Son's obedience, humility, and trust in him. Baptized, or immersed, in water, Jesus was also immersed in the Holy Spirit that day.

When you were baptized, the Holy Spirit came upon you, and God claimed you as his beloved child as well. He entered into a new, unbreakable relationship with you, and you became a new creation in Christ (see Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1279).

But God doesn't want to fill you with his Spirit only at your baptism. He wants to baptize you—immerse you—in his Spirit again and again so that you can be filled with his love and equipped for the work God has for you. Again and again, he wants to tell you, "You are my beloved child. I love you. I am pleased to have you in my family."

Even if it has been decades since you were baptized, God still wants to fill you with his Spirit. So don't be afraid to ask for more: more of his love, and more of his power in your life.

"Jesus, fill me with your Spirit. Let me know your love in a new way today!"



ST. FRANCIS XAVIER
April 7. 1506 -December 3. 1552
Francis was the youngest child born to a noble family in Northern Spain. He met Saint Ignatius of Loyola while studying at university and they became good friends. Francis was one of the first people to be ordained as a priest in Saint Ignatius' religious order, the Society of

Jesus. His ministry took him to India, present-day Indonesia, and Japan, where he worked to help the poor and preach the Gospel.

Like John the Baptist, Francis was passionate about sharing God's love with others. He evangelized in different ways for different people, always looking for new methods that spoke to the culture of the people he wanted to help. Wherever Francis travelled, he tried to learn the native language of the people who lived there.

While he wasn't much of a linguist, his priestly vocation was very fruitful; he baptized 30,000 people in his lifetime!

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
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
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
