We celebrate today the 245th birthday of our country. It is an occasion that should cause us to give thanks to God for the blessings of liberty, precious blessings which have been won for us by those who have stood up, fought, and even died that we might be free. On this day, we are also emerging from the pandemic that has caused so many trials, upended so many lives, and taken so many loved ones from us. We owe a special debt of gratitude to the scientists who have developed the vaccines that are now protecting us and enabling us to return to a semblance of normal life.

Along with these blessings, we are unfortunately in a time of great political polarization, perhaps deeper than at any time in decades. Six months ago, we saw a violent attack on the Capitol aimed at interfering with the official counting of the electoral votes by Congress. Whatever one's political views, such actions cannot characterize our approach to advancing them.

Our founding fathers, while they were passionate about democracy, were also passionate about handling differences through reasoned debate. The Declaration of Independence, while rhetorically stirring, is also an eminently reasonable document, arguing that a legitimate government is one that derives its powers from the consent of the governed. That consent is expressed by voting for our leaders, whether local, state, or national. Attempts to make it more difficult to vote can only weaken our democracy.

We need to recognize that there will always be differences of opinion among us, but we must resist the calls to view others as enemies, or even wish them harm. Death threats to election officials and their families, for example, are inexcusable. We need to examine our own assumptions, as well as those of others, with a critical eye, and not listen only to those who agree with us.

Isaiah said that we must reason together. He did not say that whoever shouts the loudest wins.

May God give us the patience, the courage, and the persistence to seek peace among ourselves, even among our disagreements.

May God bless America and preserve our democracy!

HOMETOWN SCORN

14th Sunday in Ordinary Time [B]

Despite the swelling crowds from Jesus' remarkable demonstrations of divine power, today's Gospel account describes a hometown reaction that is less than enthusiastic (Mark 6:1-6).

Jesus' own townsfolk only are able see Him as one of their own and nothing more. They remind one another they know Jesus' mother and His family (v. 3). They are unable to recognize the presence of God in Jesus' words and actions. Jesus only is viewed as one of their local people, not permitting God to be the Mystery that must always be

This moves Jesus to utter his famous phrase: "A prophet is not without honor except in his native place and among his own kin and in his own house" (v. 4).

How true these words ring in many of our own situations. There remains a tendency to cut down the charismatic person who harbors the courage and vision to raise questions to the established order. There remains stubborn insistence both within the Church as well as beyond Her to cling desperately to what can be controlled, ignoring and dismissing far too many good and gifted people.

The Kingdom of God cannot break into a world which refuses to see the presence of God even in the most habitual and familiar people and events.

The experience of Jesus in his own hometown often is repeated in the experience of Jesus in the hometown of His Church. Stubbornly insisting we know how things should be in our minds and hearts hardens us against God's mysterious workings and prophetic voices that surprise and unsettle. Intentional disciples tirelessly seek to find God in all things, rising above their own comfort and allowing God's ways to astonish.

Fireworks! It is a little hard for me to adjust to the fact that I already heard fireworks at least two weeks before the Fourth of July! Perhaps it has served as a helpful reminder that July was quickly approaching.

Fireworks are quite interesting when you think about it. I seek them out for **enjoyment and admiration**. Their **beauty** can be breathtaking. They can also serve as a wonderful **catalyst for bringing groups together** – after all, who goes out to an isolated spot and sets off fireworks just for themselves? On the other hand, fireworks can be **startling**. If I am not expecting them, they can even be **frightening**. If I do not know the source of the loud noise, it can be quite **jarring**. In either case, I do not think of fireworks as being an everyday occurrence; they seem to mark an occasion as a special event or celebration.

So, too, in the spiritual life, I can experience fireworks – those special graces through which God seeks to get my attention. I may go out seeking these graces, looking for the consolation that accompanies them. At other times, when I least expect it, they may startle me. I may be taken off guard by a particularly tender memory that touches the very core of my being. I may be jolted by a conviction based on a Gospel reading I hear. I may experience the felt presence of God in a somewhat unexpected way. God speaks to me in a variety of ways, and sometimes the fireworks of His love and mercy may be His way of getting my attention or an expression of His grace that simply cannot be contained!

Imagine the joy of our Loving God when He sees us delighting in the fireworks of grace He sends into our lives! What fireworks have you experienced lately?

SACRED SCRIPTURE IN CONTEXT

Ezekiel 2:2-5

In the First Reading, the prophet Ezekiel is sent precisely to those in the community who have instigated scandal; that is, those described as deserters, apostates, obstinate, rebels and hard of heart. Notice carefully that political compromise is not God's command to the prophet for there can be no compromises with any of them. The prophet is compelled to make known God's truth and is unconcerned about the success or failure of his mission – only delivering God's message.

Mark 6:1-6

People in Jesus' hometown cause scandal in the Gospel Reading. While they are amazed at Jesus' teaching, they cannot figure how where he got it. Even though they admit Jesus' words and actions are far beyond them, they rebuff Him by their knowledge of His family and His earlier life among them. After all, they say, He is nothing more than an ordinary carpenter.


FAITH FORMATION

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

The emergency Covid restrictions have been lifted in Ohio and operations at the *St Vincent de Paul Society* are approaching normal. We are now accepting and distributing gently used summer clothing as well as housewares! Our food pantry is continuing to serve twice a week which is a big help to those who do not receive government benefits but have not quite returned to full employment. We continue to see a rise in requests for financial aid for those threatened with evictions or utility shut-offs. In the past year, we have given a record amount of money for those struggling with financial issues. Many were unable to work due to child-care issues, especially those with school-age children. Others found their usual avenues of income closed to them as hours and jobs were cut back. Now many of our neighbors are looking for new jobs and finding it difficult to meet monthly expenses in the interim.

Many within our parish boundaries were unable to access grant monies earmarked for help because a large section of our parish lies outside the city of Toledo boundaries and the guidelines required them to live within the city limits. The financial aid

counselors at St. Vincent de Paul offer a listening ear, referrals to other agencies where appropriate, and bill payment as needed. Our neighbors are very grateful for all we do. Very often they offer us, and you our benefactors, a heartful thank-you and God bless you for all your help! The SVdP volunteers heartily echo that sentiment.


St. Benedict is expanding its music program to include band! Did you know that some studies show that instrumental music participation






