

Inspiration for the week

Relationships are hard to clarify. Determining whether people in our lives are simply acquaintances and associates or a deeper level of friend is a journey that takes time. Identifying and celebrating those people who really care about us is a lifelong adventure that involves both moments of intense elation and heartache. Some relationships are more easily definable than others. Two people who are in love must decide whether the love they share has the freedom and depth necessary for lifelong commitments. Other relationships may look like friendship but may harbor grave dysfunction and toxicity. Discernment is needed on all fronts. Our relationship with God also needs definition and discernment. God has taken creation as His spouse and human beings as His children. God delights in us and all that He has made. The wedding feast at Cana demonstrates God's investment in all of this, especially our happiness. Life is a time for celebration and great rejoicing!



SAINT OF THE WEEK

Not much is known about the life of St. Sebastian (256 – 287), except that he was a Roman martyr whose name has been mentioned throughout history since early 350.

We see St. Sebastian many times in art, especially from iconic paintings from Guido Reni, Andrea Mantegna and Hendrick ter Brugghen. Historical scholars now agree that a spiritual story has the beloved saint entering the Roman army because only there could he assist Christian martyrs without arousing suspicion on himself. Eventually he was found out, brought before Emperor Diocletian and delivered to Mauritanian archers to be shot to death. Pierced with arrows, he was left for dead, but managed to survive. He recovered from his wounds but still refused to leave.

One day, St. Sebastian took up a position near where the emperor was to pass. He confronted the emperor, condemning him for his cruelty to Christians. This time the sentence of death was carried out, and St. Sebastian was beaten to death with clubs. Today he is the patron saint of athletes.

<u>Martin Luther King, Jr.'s</u> <u>Christian Pledge</u>

Dr. King's Christian faith impacted leadership in the civil rights movement. Below is an excerpt from US State Department website that reminds us of a largely-forgotten part of non-violent protests for civil rights.

King founded the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) to take the civil rights struggle and his nonviolent message through the South. One of his most trusted aides urged him to drop the word Christian from the organization. It was argued that such an explicit religious reference would alienate white Northern liberals. whose support would be crucial in the years ahead. King was adamant, however, and the word Christian remained. He also insisted that civil rights participants be guided by Christian principles. For example, volunteers in the Birmingham campaign were required to sign a 'Commitment Card' that read in part:

I HEREBY PLEDGE MYSELF--MY PERSON AND MY BODY--TO THE NON VIOLENT MOVEMENT. THEREFORE, I WILL KEEP THE FOLLOWING TEN COMMANDMENTS:

1. MEDITATE daily on the teachings and life of Jesus.

2. REMEMBER always the nonviolent movement in Birmingham seeks justice & reconciliation-not victory.

3. WALK and TALK in the manner of love, for God is love.

4. PRAY daily to be used by God in order that all men might be free.

5. SACRIFICE personal wishes in order that all men might be free.

6. OBSERVE with both friend and foe the ordinary rules of courtesy.

7. SEEK to perform regular service for others and for the world.

8. REFRAIN from the violence of fist, tongue, or heart.

9. STRIVE to be in good spiritual and bodily health.

10. FOLLOW the directions of the movement and of the captain.




Cold, flu or COVID-19: What are the symptoms?


Cold, flu or COVID-19: Which is it? When your nose is stuffed up and you're not feeling right, a number of respiratory viruses could be to blame. Cold, flu and COVID-19 viruses have similar symptoms, but there are important differences between them. A test done by your doctor is the only way to know for sure which one you've come down with, but here's a look at how they compare.



When do symptoms appear?	Gradually; about two days after being infected	Abruptly; usually 1-4 days after infection	2-14 days after exposure to the virus; typically five days after being infected

Contagious for	About one day before you feel sick. Most contagious during the first few days of illness; you may remain contagious as long as you feel sick.	About one day before you feel sick. You may remain contagious for at least 10 days after symptoms appear or a positive test indicates you have the virus. It's not known how long someone can spread the virus.
Complications	Generally does not cause serious health problems, but complications can include pneumonia and bronchitis.	Can include pneumonia, respiratory failure, heart attack, stroke or sepsis.	Can include pneumonia, respiratory failure, heart attack, stroke, sepsis, blood clots, or multisystem inflammatory syndrome in children.
Vaccine?	None	Annual vaccine offers protection against 3-4 commonly circulating viruses.	Yes; available through your local health department and pharmacy. For more information ask your doctor.

The same basic preventive measures can keep all three from spreading: Wash hands often; social distance; wear a mask; stay home when sick; clean commonly touched surfaces; cough and sneeze into a tissue or your elbow.
