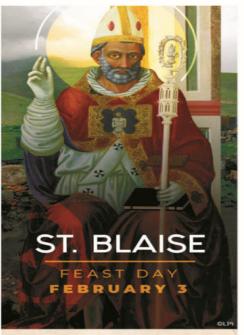

### Inspiration for the week

Prophets possess an intimate knowledge of God and act on their experience of God. Prophetic messages usually challenge the status quo and draw us up and out of ourselves, focusing us on the bigger picture. We often think of ourselves and our own needs first. When we listen to someone speak, we judge the merit of the message by its degree of usefulness. If the message or vision contains no personal benefit or profit but a call to stretch and grow, we can become indignant. Prophets are usually the ones whose message challenges us and calls us to see things differently and love more perfectly and deeply. God is love. When listening to St. Paul speak about love we witness the unfolding of this type of unconditional, other centered, self-sacrificial perfect God. It is an invitation to life, freedom, and happiness that can be offered to us only by God. Jesus, who is God and Love incarnate, calls us to this richer expression of love. Are we ready to listen and be challenged and stretched?



#### SAINT OF THE WEEK

You may be familiar with the annual "blessing of throats" that many parishes in the United States use to commemorate the beloved bishop and martyr. St. Blaise lived in the fourth century in Turkey and Armenia. Due to religious persecution, he was forced to flee and hide in a cave in the back country in order to save his life.

History has it that one day a group of hunters stumbled upon where St. Blaise was living. They found the bishop kneeling in prayer, surrounded by wolves, lions and bears that he had tamed. The legend has it that as the hunters dragged Blaise off to prison, a mother came with her young son who had a fish bone lodged in his throat. At Blaise's command, the child was able to cough up the bone and thus lived.

Today we remember the saint on his feast day by taking two candles, crossing them against the throat, and saying the following prayer:

Through the intercession of St. Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from ailments of the throat and from every other evil. In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

The third promise of Mary, from the 2022 Catholic Art Calendar for February: "The Rosary will be a powerful armor against hell, it will destroy vice, decrease sin, and defeat heresies." Set aside a special time to say the rosary.

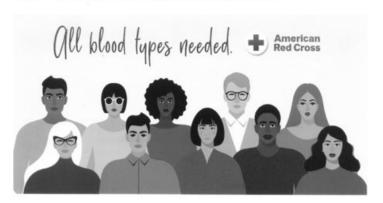

## Heart healthy cooking with the mushroom blend

Cooking with mushrooms is a way to cut down on saturated fat, and add vegetables to your healthy plate. Most saturated fat comes from animal products but it is often found in baked goods, fried foods, palm and coconut oils. Saturated fat raises bad cholesterol levels and increases the risk of heart disease. Most American adults do not eat the recommended 2-4 cups of vegetables each day. The amount of vegetables you need to eat varies depending on your age, sex, height, weight and level of physical activity. Eating a healthy diet that is rich in vegetables may decrease your risk of heart disease, heart attack and stroke.

There are over 2,000 varieties of edible mushrooms to choose from. Mushrooms have an umami taste, which is a savory, meat-like flavor. Reducing the amount of meat in a dish, and substituting mushrooms helps to boost flavor, and reduce calories, saturated fat and sodium. Mushrooms add B-complex vitamins, antioxidants and potassium to your diet. If mushrooms are exposed to ultraviolet light right before being picked they can be an excellent source of vitamin D. One cup of sliced mushrooms contains about 20 calories, compared with over 250 calories in one cup of lean ground meat. Substituting mushrooms for lean ground beef in a main dish just once a week could save you almost 20,000 calories a year and result in a 5-pound weight loss.

You can make a lean ground meat and mushroom blend by following these steps:

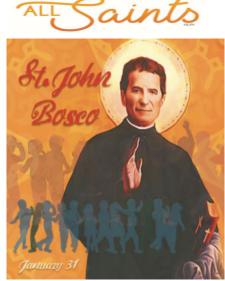

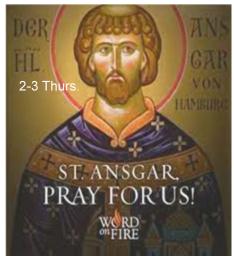






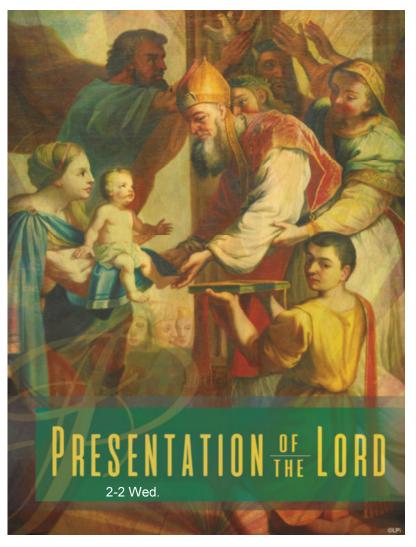


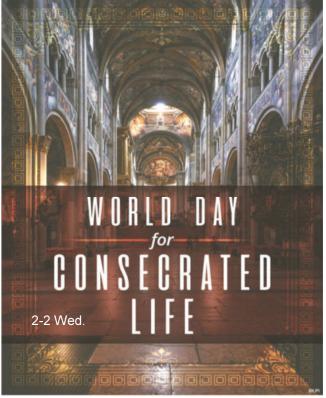




## The Holy Father's Intentions for the Month of February 2022
