“... looking for Jesus.”

Today, we read about the crowd’s response when they discover that Jesus and his disciples have crossed to the other side of the sea. They follow them and ask, “Rabbi, when did you get here?” They had just experienced one of Jesus’ most amazing miracles, the feeding of the five thousand. Yet it isn’t enough. They want more. So, they cross the sea to find him.

I’ve always wondered if they really knew what they were searching for. Jesus chides them for seeking the wrong things. They had just received a free meal. Their stomachs are full and their souls are touched, but do they know that they need Jesus’ words, compassion, and presence? They need the Master to help them understand their deeper desires.

We often go about our daily lives doing what we need to do, what’s expected of us, what we think will give us fulfillment. Yet in our very depths we feel an ache, a desire that keeps gnawing at us. Do we understand what we are feeling underneath all the externals? Have we ever really quieted ourselves enough to reflect and examine what that desire is? We long for intimacy, but can another person really fulfill our deepest desires? We long for communion, but can we ever find complete harmony and unity with others? By giving us his very self, his body and blood, Jesus answers this most basic need of the human soul—the need for love. “No one has greater love than this, to lay down one’s life for one’s friends” (Jn 15:13). Our souls yearn for love. The Eucharistic sacrifice of Christ is the perfect expression of love. By giving us himself as the Bread of Life, he is offering to us this most enduring and fulfilling of all loves. Let us look into our hearts and ask the Master for the grace to recognize our need for him to fulfill our genuine desires for love.

Let us ask Jesus, Master of Love and Bread of Life, to come and fill our souls with His presence. We want so many things, and we often put a lot of effort into fulfilling our desires, looking for new places and experiences. But what do we really want, deep down? May He help us know and believe that only He can answer the desires and longings of our hearts.

No 'devout Catholic' can condone killing child in the womb, says archbishop

SAN FRANCISCO (CNS) -- No one can claim "to be a devout Catholic and condone the killing of innocent human life, let alone have the government pay for it," said Archbishop Salvatore J. Cordileone of San Francisco.

"The right to life is a fundamental -- the most fundamental -- human right, and Catholics do not oppose fundamental human rights," the archbishop said in a July 22 statement.

"To use the smokescreen of abortion as an issue of health and fairness to poor women is the epitome of hypocrisy: What about the health of the baby being killed? What about giving poor women real choice, so they are supported in choosing life?" he said.

He issued the statement in response to remarks House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., made during her weekly news conference with Capitol Hill reporters in Washington earlier in the day.

Pelosi, a Catholic, told reporters she backed current efforts by her fellow Democrats to eliminate the Hyde Amendment and other similar language from spending bills.

For four decades, the long-standing Hyde Amendment has enjoyed strong bipartisan support. It bans federal funding of abortions except when the mother's life is endangered and in cases of rape and incest.

Hyde has been reenacted in spending bills every year since it was first passed in 1976.

"As a devout Catholic and mother of five in six years, I feel that God blessed my husband and me with our beautiful family," Pelosi said, but "it is not up to me to dictate that's what other people should do."

Pelosi told reporters that federal funding of abortion for underprivileged women is about "fairness" and "health care."

"It's an issue of health of many women in America, especially those in lower income situations in different states, and it is something that has been a priority for many of us for a long time," Pelosi said.

Biden, who also is Catholic and supports keeping abortion legal, has disavowed his decades of support for Hyde.

Archbishop Cordileone urged that poor women be given a "real choice" by supporting them in their decision to "choose life" and bring their baby to term.

"This would give them fairness and equality" that "women of means" have and "can afford to bring a child into the world."

"It is people of faith who run pro-life crisis pregnancy clinics," he said. "They are the only ones who provide poor women life-giving alternatives to having their babies killed in their wombs."

He added, "I cannot be prouder of my fellow Catholics who are so prominent in providing this vital service. To them I say: You are the ones worthy to call yourselves 'devout Catholics!'"

On July 26, Archbishop Cordileone told Bill Hemmer, co-anchor of "America's Newsroom" on the Fox News Channel, that pregnancy crisis centers give pregnant women "wraparound support" by providing information, including a 3-D sonogram of their unborn child.

The 3-D image makes it "very clear this is a human life," the archbishop said, adding that even women who were inclined to get an abortion "change their mind" after seeing this image of their unborn child.

These centers also provide pregnant women in need with practical help after the baby is born, he added, and that if a woman wants to put her child up for adoption, the staff at these centers walk the woman through that process.

Asked what he thought about Congress eliminating Hyde from spending bills, the archbishop said: "This is a very serious matter. It's bad enough the government allows the killing of innocent human life and now they want to pay for it. I beg, implore our government not to pay (for abortions)."

When Hammer asked Archbishop Cordileone if he'd met with Pelosi to discuss the abortion issue, the prelate noted the pandemic had prevented pretty much all face-to-face meetings. He said he "did have a telephone conversation" with Pelosi "earlier this year (and) she was very respectful to me. ... We had a good interchange."

But he added that an in-person meeting on an issue as serious as abortion would be better and hoped this would happen with the House Speaker sooner rather than later, now that "thankfully, we're beginning to emerge from the pandemic."

St. John Vianney

Jean-Baptiste-Marie Vianney, known as John in English, was born May 8, 1786 in Dardilly, France and was baptized the same day. He was the fourth of six children born to Matthieu and Marie Vianney.

John was raised in a Catholic home and the family often helped the poor and housed St. Benedict Joseph Labre when he made his pilgrimage to Rome.

In 1790, when the anticlerical Terror phase of the French Revolution forced priests to work in secrecy or face execution, young Vianney believed the priests were heroes.

He continued to believe in the bravery of priests and received his First Communion catechism instructions in private by two nuns who lost their convents to the Revolution.

At 13-years-old, John made his first communion and prepared for his confirmation in secrecy.

When he was 20-years-old, John was allowed to leave the family farm to learn at a "parish-school" in Écully. There he learned math, history, geography and Latin.

As his education had been disrupted by the French Revolution, he struggled in his studies, particularly with Latin, but worked hard to learn.

In 1802, the Catholic Church was reestablished in France and religious freedom and peace spread throughout the country.

Unfortunately, in 1809, John was drafted into Napoleon Bonaparte's armies. He had been studying as an ecclesiastical student, which was a protected title and would normally have exempted him from military services, but Napoleon had withdrawn the exemption in some dioceses as he required more soldiers.

Two days into his service, John fell ill and required hospitalization. As his troop continued, he stopped in at a church where he prayed. There he met a young man who volunteered to return him to his group, but instead led him deep into the mountains where military deserters met.

John lived with them for one year and two months. He used the name Jerome Vincent and opened a school for the nearby village of Les Noes' children.

John remained in Les Noes and hid when gendarmes came in search of deserters until 1810, when deserters were granted amnesty.

Now free, John returned to Écully and resumed his ecclesiastical studies. He attended a minor seminary, Abbe Balley, in 1812 and was eventually ordained a deacon in June 1815.

He joined his heroes as a priest August 12, 1815 in the Couvent des Minimes de Grenoble. His first Mass was celebrated the next day and he was appointed assistant to Balley in Écully.

Three years later, when Balley passed away, Fr. John Vianney was appointed parish priest of the Ars parish. With help from Catherine Lassagne and Benedicta Lerdet, *La Providence*, a home for girls, was established in Ars.

When he began his priestly duties, Fr. Vianney realized many were either ignorant or indifferent to religion as a result of the French Revolution. Many danced and drank on Sundays or worked in their fields.

Fr. Vianney spent much time in confession and often delivered homilies against blasphemy and dancing. Finally, if parishioners did not give up dancing, he refused them absolution.

He spent 11 to twelve hours each day working to reconcile people with God. In the summer months, he often worked 16-hour days and refused to retire.

His fame spread until people began to travel to him in 1827. Within thirty years, it is said he received up to 20,000 pilgrims each year.

He was deeply devoted to St. Philomena and erected a chapel and shrine in her honor. When he later became deathly ill but miraculously recovered, he attributed his health to St. Philomena's intercession.

By 1853, Fr. Vianney had attempted to run away from Ars four times, each attempt with the intention of becoming a monk but decided after the final time that it was not to be.

Six years later, he passed away and left behind a legacy of faith and was viewed as the champion of the poor.

On October 3, 1873, Pope Pius IX proclaimed Fr. Vianney as "venerable" and on January 8, 1905, Pope Pius X beatified him. St. John Vianney was canonized on May 31, 1925. His feast day was declared August 9 but it was changed twice before it fell to August 4. St. John Vianney would often say: "Private prayer is like straw scattered here and there: If you set it on fire, it makes a lot of little flames. But gather these straws into a bundle and light them, and you get a mighty fire, rising like a column into the sky; public prayer is like that."

Parish Guideline: With good intention to welcome others to worship and pray with our Church, we ask the invited person, with your free will, be registered in our Parish for at least three (3) months in order to schedule for the Sacrament of Matrimony or Baptism. Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA): Arrangements are to be made with our Director Religious Education (DRE) for the further assistance.

Sacrament of Matrimony (Marriage): Arrangements are to be made at least six (6) months in advance. See Parish Guideline.

Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick: Please notify the office for prayers and receiving of the Anointing of the Sick: 586-755-1313.



Words on the Word

August 1, 2021 — The New Normal

The so-called “old normal” – the old way of looking at the world and doing things – seems to be gone, in many respects. And a so-called “new normal” – a new paradigm, seems to be taking hold.

Much of this, to be sure, is the result of the coronavirus pandemic. The changes in attitudes and behaviors and procedures were widespread. Among other things, the labor markets have been roiled considerably.

If simply driving past all of the “Now Hiring” and “Help Wanted” signs doesn’t make it obvious enough, one simply has to look at the headlines.

“U.S. job openings hit record 9.2 million,” the headline of one internet reporting service began a few weeks ago, “but businesses can’t find enough workers to fill them.”

The story went on to describe how people were leaving the workforce, or being recruited from competitors; how job openings in almost every industry greatly exceeded the number of workers available, or willing, to fill them.

It’s a situation that likely will find some resolution over the coming months and years, the story explains, but, at least for now, it’s the world in which we find ourselves.

A world significantly different than what we are generally accustomed to, as far as jobs go, where there are typically more candidates than openings.

It all points to the importance of being open to change, in whatever ways we might encounter it, so that we can keep our eyes fixed on what really matters.

“I declare and testify in the Lord that ... you should put away the old self of your former way of life,” St. Paul says in today’s second reading to the Ephesians. “Be renewed in the spirit of your minds, and put on the new self, created in God’s way in righteousness and holiness of truth.”
