FAITH FORMATION PERSPECTIVES

11TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME
SEEDS AND THE REIGN OF GOD

Beginning with the Eleventh Sunday of Ordinary Time to the Sixteenth Sunday of Ordinary Time, the gospel readings will be from the Gospel of Mark.

(Mk 4:26-34) Jesus said to the crowd: "This is how it is with the reign of God." Jesus tells of a man who scatters seeds on the ground and how they spout, grew, ripen, and then harvested. Jesus continues with, "What comparison shall we use for the reign of God?" Jesus tells of the mustard seed which is the smallest seed yet grows into the largest of shrubs. It is in parables that Jesus presents his message so that the crowd might understand his message about the reign of God. Privately, Jesus explains things to his disciples.

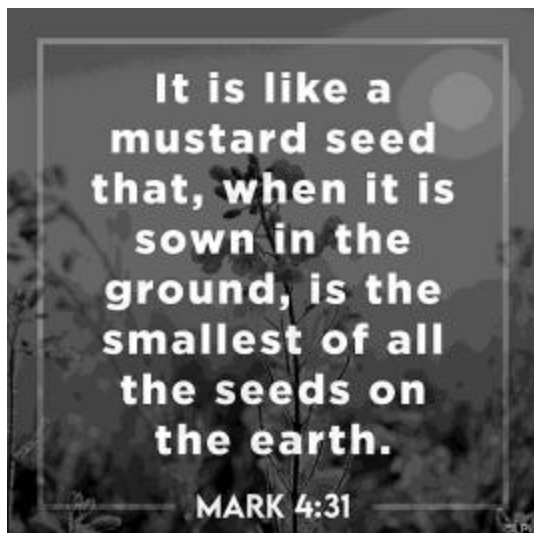
Today's gospel setting is at the lake with Jesus in a boat on the water because there was such a huge crowd gathered to hear him. Jesus first tells them of the Parable of the Seed and then the purpose of his teaching about the reign of God. Jesus then continues with the parables of the scattered seeds and the mustard seed.

"This is how it is with the reign of God," Jesus uses the example of seeds scattered on the ground and how they germinate, grow, and ripen without any doing by human hands. It is God's workings not humankind that brings about the reign of God. The reign of God in the world comes through the teaching and ministry of Jesus and it will grow, ripen and it will produce a harvest.

"What comparison shall we use for the reign of God?" Jesus in the form of a question presents the reign of God. Jesus uses the example of the smallest seed, the mustard seed, and that it grows into the largest of shrubs which even birds can nest in its' shade. This parable gives foresight into the growth of the reign of God from something very small and will become something very large.

The use of parables in teaching was common in Jesus' time and Jesus used parables because the people could relate to what was being presented in a simple way and it made sense to them. But, with Jesus' disciples, he took the disciples to a deeper meaning and understanding of the parables as it related to reign of God in the world and also in degrees his part in the reign of God.

This week take time to watch the seeds grow and bloom or ripen and witness the reign of God.

**RECOGNIZING GOD
IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS**

ST. ANTHONY CAN FIND ANYTHING — EVEN YOU

“Tony, Tony, come around! Something is lost and it must be found.”

Did you learn this one when you were a kid? In my experience there are even a lot of lapsed Catholics — or people who were never Catholic at all — who know that when you lose something, St. Anthony becomes your best friend. Missing keys? Pray to St. Anthony. Can't find your favorite sweater? St. Anthony. Forget where you parked your car in the mall lot? St. Anth— okay, you get the idea. Whatever it is, large or small, important or trivial, Tony has a reputation for finding the lost things.

It's a devotion that can seem a little like superstition — witchcraft, even? — if you don't really understand it. Mumble an incantation to a dead guy and you're guaranteed to find your sunglasses. But as with most traditions that are old, beloved and effective, looking a little closer reveals the truth of the matter.

When we lose something really important, what do we do? We make the whole household stop what they're doing to join the search. Having St. Anthony as a friend means you ask him to stop what he's doing to help, too. And how he helps is by taking the matter exactly where all matters need to go — straight to the feet of Christ.

Here's the real genius of St Anthony: he takes the most mundane, commonplace occurrence — misplacing socks — into an encounter with the divine and truly all things great and small are gifts from God. He grabs our hand and points to the cross. “That's what you're looking for,” he tells us.

In the end, Tony doesn't really find the lost things. He finds the lost people.
