FAITH FORMATION PERSPECTIVES

13TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

FAITH AND A HEALING TOUCH—MK 5:21-40

Jesus crossed back to the other side by boat, and he was met by a large crowd. Jairus, an official of the synagogue, goes to Jesus and makes an appeal, "My little daughter is critically ill. Please come and lay your hands on her so that she may get well and live." Jesus and Jairus go off together with the large crowd following and pushing against Jesus.

In the crowd was a woman who suffered with a hemorrhage for a dozen years and after seeing many doctors she did not receive any relief and her condition grew worse. "If I just touch his clothing, I shall be healed," was her thought. Touching Jesus' garment her flow of blood died up. Jesus was conscious at once that healing power had gone out from him. Jesus asked who touched him. The woman in fear came forth to Jesus and told him the whole truth. Jesus responds to the woman, "Daughter, it is your faith that has cured you. Go in peace and be free of this illness."

People from Jairus' house arrived saying the daughter has died. Jesus takes Peter, James, and John with him to Jairus' house. Jesus tells the crowd that the child is not dead, and she is asleep. The crowd disbelieves Jesus in saying she is asleep. Jesus enters the child's room with his three companions, Jairus and his wife. Taking the child's hand Jesus then commands, "Little girl, get up." The girl stood up and began to walk around. Jesus strictly tells those in the room not to let anyone know what took place and tells them to give the girl something to eat.

This gospel passage from Mark presents the healing of a woman and a little girl. The healings were done with a touch to Jesus and a touch from Jesus. There was also the aspect of great faith by the woman and Jairus in the healing occurrences.

The woman with a hemorrhage was seen as unclean and in the state of impurity because of blood (Lv 15:19, 25) and was separated from the community, the synagogue and worship at the Temple because of her condition. The woman touches the garment of Jesus and she is healed by the healing power of Jesus and her life was restored. Jesus himself sensed the healing power going forth from him in her touch. What great faith this woman had in Jesus.

Jairus, an official of high standing and position in the synagogue also had great faith in Jesus to approach him and ask for the healing of his daughter. It is with a touch from Jesus and his command that the girl is healed. In the healing of the little girl and in the healing of Simon's mother-in-law (Mk 1:29-31) the term "rise" (get up) is a word in Hebrew and Aramaic that also describes the resurrection of Jesus. And, in both healings a touch, food and feeding occurs.

It is deep faith and conviction in Jesus that these healings happened. Again, Jesus reveals another degree of himself to his disciples in the power to heal as well as his command to be silent of who he is.

In our faith in Jesus, are we willing and ready to seek the healing touch of Jesus in our lives?

RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

TOUCHING THE CLOAK OF CHRIST

Look to today's Gospel and you'll find one of the most arresting images in all of Scripture. Christ in a crowd, everyone clamoring for his attention, pressing against him. Several feet away, is a chronically ill woman, weak and desperate for help. She knows she doesn't have a chance of getting his attention. She has no connections. She has no strength. All she can do is lift up her hand.

So that's what she does. She reaches out.

There comes a time, or maybe several times, in each of our lives when we become this woman. We're tired and we're sick. Is it with sin? With fear? With anger? It doesn't matter. Whatever it is, it's made us weak, and we feel like we've run out of options. We've looked for help and come up empty. We've consulted friends and gotten nowhere. We're lost in the crowd of life, unable to stick our heads above the pressing throng to wave for help.

And there is Christ, always passing by us. The hem of his cloak is never far from our grasp. We have no hope of a big miracle like the synagogue leader. We don't even bother asking for that. But that cloak ... we can touch that cloak. That's something we can do.

Do we do it, though? Do we have the confidence of that sick, beaten-down woman who knew so totally that healing was there for the taking? Or do we retreat back into the crowd, stumbling back home with our pain and our sinfulness? Reach out, friends. However, whatever, whenever — reach out. Christ will not fail you.

MIRACULOUS MEDAL

QUESTION:

What is the “Miraculous Medal” and why is it called that?

ANSWER:

The medal of the Immaculate Conception that has come to be called simply the “Miraculous Medal” dates back to an apparition of Mary to Saint Catherine Laboure, who was then a novice sister with the Daughters of Charity. On November 27, 1830, Our Lady appeared to her standing on a globe, with shafts of light streaming from her hands and the words, “O Mary, conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to thee,” surrounding the image. In the same vision, Catherine saw a capital “M” with a cross above it and below two hearts. Catherine seemed to hear a voice telling her to have what she saw struck as a medal and a promise that those who wore the medal would have the protection and intercession of the Mother of God. The first 1,500 of medals were distributed in 1832. Many miraculous favors were attributed to the use of the medal.

Saint Catherine’s “Miraculous Medal” is among the recognizable and popular symbols of modern Catholicism. Reflecting on its widespread use, the 2001 Vatican document, “Directory on Popular Piety and Liturgy,” observes that the medal “recalls the mystery of Redemption, the love of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and of the Sorrowful Heart of Mary. It signifies the mediatory role of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the mystery of the Church, the relationship between Heaven and earth, this life and eternal life.”
