FAITH FORMATION PERSPECTIVES JAN. 2 - FEAST OF THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD

During the reign of King Herod, Jesus is born in Bethlehem of Judea. Astrologers from the east arrive in Jerusalem inquiring, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We observed his star at its rising and have come to pay him homage." Hearing this, King Herod is greatly disturbed as well as all of Jerusalem. Herod calls upon the chief priests and scribes to find where this Messiah was born. They inform him, "in Bethlehem of Judea."

Herod asks the astrologers for the exact time of the star's appearance. Herod then sends the astrologers to Bethlehem, and they are to gather detail information concerning this child and report back to him their findings. The astrologers observed the star, and the star took them to the house where they found the child with his mother, Mary. They prostrated themselves before the child and did him homage. They opened their coffers and presented him with gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

In a dream the astrologers received a message not to return to Herod. They then went back to their own country by another route.



"For by gold the power of a king is signified, by frankincense the honor of God, by myrrh the burial of the body; and accordingly, they offer Him gold as King, frankincense as God, and myrrh as Man." St. John Chrysostom (c. 347-407)

"Today the Magi gaze in deep wonder at what they see; heaven on earth, earth in heaven, man in God, God in man, one whom the whole universe cannot contain now enclosed in a tiny body." and "As they look, they believe and do not question, as their symbolic gifts bear witness: incense for God, gold for a king, myrrh for one who is to die." St Peter Chrysologus (380-450)

St. John Paul II in his January 6, 1996, homily says, "When they reached Bethlehem, the Magi adored the divine child and offered him symbolic gifts, becoming forerunners of the peoples and nations which down the centuries never cease to seek and meet Christ."

O. Henry (1862-1910) in his 'The gift of the Magi' writes, "The Magi, as you know, were wise men - wonderfully wise men - who brought gifts to the Babe in the manger. They invented the art of giving Christmas presents."

Reflect upon your journey to seek the newborn king and what gift would you present to him.

RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS THE LIGHT OF THE MOON

If you own a television that has been turned on at any point in the last month or so, chances are you've caught at least a scene or two of the 1946 classic film "It's a Wonderful Life."

If you're not familiar with the movie, it follows the life of George Bailey from childhood through adulthood. A dreamer by nature, George has big plans for himself that involve world exploration and adventure — but family and community obligations keep him tethered to the same spot on the map, leading an altogether ordinary life.

One of the most memorable scenes from that movie is of George dancing with his sweetheart Mary while they sing "Buffalo Gals — Won't you come out tonight/And dance by the light of the moon?"

That lyric always catches my ear. Of course, the moon doesn't have any light of its own. All the moon has is the ability to reflect the light that shines upon it.

The same holds for us, doesn't it? Our stewardship is purely a reflection of the grace granted to us by another. "Upon you the LORD shines," writes Isaiah, "and over you appears his glory." Every good action we will ever take begins in the mind of God. The fact that we have the honor of carrying it out on His behalf is a beautiful gift. It is God that makes our ordinary lives extraordinary.

In the end of the movie, George Bailey realizes that he had a far greater life because, instead of being the hero of his own story, he allowed himself to reflect goodness onto others.

COVID-19 GUIDELINES LITURGICAL PROTOCOLS

CHALKING THE DOORS

Epiphany (also known as Twelfth Night, Theophany, or Three Kings Day) marks the occasion of a time-honored Christian tradition of "chalking the doors." The formula for the ritual — adapted for 2020 — is simple: take chalk of any color and write the following above the entrance of your home: 2 + C + M + B + 21. The letters have two meanings. First, they represent the initials of the Magi — Caspar, Malchior, and Balthazar — who came to visit Jesus in His first home. They also abbreviate the Latin phrase, Christus mansionem benedicat: "May Christ bless the house." The "+" signs represent the cross, and the "21" at the beginning and the "21" at the end mark the year. Taken together, this inscription is performed as a request for Christ to bless those homes so marked and that He stay with those who dwell therein throughout the entire year.

May all who come to our home this year rejoice to find Christ living among us; and may we seek and serve, in everyone we meet, that same Jesus who is your incarnate Word, now and forever. Amen.

God of heaven and earth, you revealed your only-begotten One to every nation by the guidance of a star. Bless this house and all who inhabit it. Fill us with the light of Christ, that our concern for others may reflect your love. We ask this through Christ our Savior. Amen.
