FAITH FORMATION PERSPECTIVES

JAN. 9 - THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD—BAPTISM AND BEYOND (LK 3:15-16, 21-22)

Luke presents his gospel account of the baptism of Jesus. Luke brings out three important events concerning Jesus' baptism: 1) Jesus is in prayer after his baptism. Prayer is something Jesus does before important decisions; 2) The descent of the Holy Spirit, in the form of a dove, upon Jesus. This is a preview of Pentecost and the beginning formation of a new community around Jesus; and 3) By the heavenly voice, "You are my beloved Son. On you my favor rests" acknowledges Jesus' relationship to the Father and Jesus' divinity. Luke downplays Jesus' baptism in this passage to only three words, "likewise being baptized."

The people are anticipating the Messiah. They wonder if John is the Messiah. He tells the people that he baptizes with water but one mightier than he will baptize in the Holy Spirit and in fire.

Jesus and the people were baptized. Jesus is in prayer when the skies opens and the Holy Spirit descends upon him in the form of a dove. A voice from heaven is heard saying, "You are my beloved Son. On you my favor rests."

The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord should bring to mind the importance of our own day of baptism and what our baptism calls us to be and do. We celebrate our

birth day when we became a son or daughter should we not also celebrate our baptismal day when we became sons and daughters to our heavenly Father? Do you know your baptismal day?

Jesus commanded his disciples to, "Go therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptize them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." (Mt 28:19) and Jesus tells Nicodemus, "I solemnly assure you; no one can enter into God's kingdom without being begotten of water and the spirit." (Jn 3:5)

The Catechism of the Catholic Church presents, "Holy Baptism is the basis of the whole Christian life, the gateway to life in the Spirit, and the door which gives access to the other sacraments." (#1213) and "Baptism is birth into new life in Christ, in accordance with the Lord's will, it is necessary for salvation, as is the Church herself, which we enter by baptism." (#1277). The General Catechetical Directory presents "By Baptism men and women are cleansed from original sin and from all personal sins, they are born again as children of God, are made part of the Church and made holy by the gifts of the Holy Spirit." (# 57)

"Every baptized person should consider that it is in the womb of the Church where he is transformed from a child of Adam to a child of God." St Vincent Ferrer (1350-1419) and "The soul is regenerated in the sacred waters of baptism and thus becomes God's child." St. Maximilian Kolbe (1894-1944)

St. Gregory of Nazianzen (329-389) says, "These three things God requires of all Baptized: right faith in the heart, truth on the tongue, temperance in the body."

"The rediscovery of the value of one's baptism is the basis of the missionary commitment of every Christian, because we see in the Gospel that he who lets himself be fascinated by Christ cannot do without witnessing the joy if following in his footsteps ... we understand even more that, in virtue of baptism, we have an inherent missionary vocation." Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI (1927 -)

THIS WEEK AND BEYOND - JANUARY 10—MARCH 1 - ORDINARY TIME

The word ordinary can feel like a synonym for "boring," but Ordinary Time is far from it. This season takes its name from the ordinal numbers (first, second, third, fourth, fifth, and so on) that are used to count the Sundays and the weeks that follow them. While the seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter have a certain importance in the liturgical year, that does not diminish Ordinary Time. Consider that as the priest prepares the paschal candle at the Easter Vigil, he states, "All time belongs to him." How might you use this season to grow closer to God?

JANUARY 18–25 - PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity spans an octave, or eight-day observance, a time frame that lends significance to the week. It is a great sorrow to be separated from our brothers and sisters in Christ, unable to join around the Eucharistic table together to "do this in memory of me." We wait in hope in a special way during this week for the day when all divisions among Christians will cease.

JANUARY 25 - CONVERSION OF ST. PAUL

This feast commemorates the day when Saul, an observant young Jewish man who opposed the early Christians and even participated in the storing death of St. Stephen, had an encounter with the risen Jesus. Saul, also known as Paul, left behind his former life to become an apostle to the gentiles. To preach the Gospel, you might offer forgiveness and mercy to someone who is not sorry, serve a meal at a soup kitchen with a joyful heart, or drop off a box of diapers at a place that serves mothers and children. Today's readings: Acts 22: 3-6 or Acts 9:1-22; Psalm 117:1bc, 2; Mark 16:15-18.

JANUARY 28 - ST. THOMAS AQUINAS

Known as the angelic doctor, St. Thomas Aquinas was a Dominican priest whose writings are essential to the way we understand what we believe. He was a great theologian and philosopher, engaging with the intellectual currents of his day as well as those of ancient philosophy. St. Thomas described the beatific vision, unending happiness and union with God, as the goal of human life. Today's readings: 2 Samuel 11:1-4a, 5-10a, 13-17; Psalm 51: 3-4, 5-6a, 6bcd-7, 10-11; Mark 4:26–34.

JANUARY 31 - ST. JOHN BOSCO

St. John Bosco was an Italian priest who worked to improve the lives of young people who lived in poverty. He went into the world to encounter the young people who had traveled to the city to try to find a better life but were living in abject poverty and unsafe conditions. He began many initiatives and organizations to assist children and was the founder of a religious congregation. Today's readings: 2 Samuel 15:13-14, 30, 16:5-13; Psalm 3:2-3, 4-5, 6-7; Mark 5:1-20.

FEBRUARY 2 - THE PRESENTATION OF THE LORD

This feast, forty days after Christmas, is traditionally a time to bring candles to church to be blessed. In Luke's account of the Gospel, we hear Simeon proclaim Jesus "a light for revelation to the Gentiles and glory for your people Israel." The Gospel according to John is also a source of the imagery of light associated with Jesus. Anna and Simeon watched and waited for the light throughout their lives. At times, it can be difficult to wait for what we most hope for. Watching and waiting for the light, we can unite ourselves with the waiting of Anna and Simeon. What desires of your heart are you still waiting to have fulfilled? You might decorate a tealight holder and light the candle to remind you to wait in hope. Today's readings: Malachi 3:1-4, Psalm 24:7, 8, 9, 10; Hebrews 2:4-18; Luke 2: 22-40.
