

FAITH FORMATION PERSPECTIVES FEB. 6—FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

The crowds are pressing on Jesus to hear the word of God. Jesus sees two boats by the side of the lake and the fishermen of the boats were washing their nets. Jesus goes into the boat belonging to Simon and Jesus asks him to pull his boat out a short distance in the lake so he could continue to teach the pressing crowds. When Jesus finished speaking to the crowds, he asks Simon to "Put out into deep water and lower your nets for a catch." Simon responses with, "Master, we have been hard at it all night long and have caught nothing, but if you say so, I will lower the nets." Upon lowering their nets, they caught a great number of fish to where their nets were almost breaking. They called over the other boat and filled both boats until they nearly sank.

With such a great catch of fish, Simon fell at the knees of at Jesus saying, "Leave me Lord. I am a sinful man." Simon as well as James and John, Zebedee's sons, were amazed at what just happened in their midst. Jesus to Simon says, "Do not be afraid. From now on you will be catching men." On returning to the shore the fishermen, left behind everything and became followers of Jesus.

Anyone who enjoys fishing can truly understand and relate to the joy, pleasure, and excitement when one catches the daily limit of fish on a day of fishing. Simon, James, and John followed the request of Jesus to lower their nets and were truly surprised and amazed by what happened. Fishing was their



business and their means of financial support. How many other times out fishing did they ever catch that many fish?

Simon is the main character in this story. Simon first calls Jesus, 'Master' meaning someone who is a leader and not a rabbi or teacher. After the great catch of fish, Simon now calls Jesus, 'Lord' out of holy awe and fear and being in the presence of the divine. He even calls himself a sinful man. This day with Jesus out fishing, Simon, James, and John has a dramatic change from catching fish with nets for dinners to catching men in order to save their lives in the name of Jesus. These men in absolute renunciation leave behind what they were just simple fishermen and what they possessed, their boats and their nets and their financial livelihood, just to follow Jesus. It would not be a surprise if Simon and company told a few fish stories in their day with one that was really true.

SAINT OF THE WEEK ST. JOSEPHINE BAKHITA | FEBRUARY 8

The story of St. Josephine Bakhita (1869-1947) is a story that many people taken into slavery have experienced. Born in the Darfur region of Sudan, she was kidnapped at the age of 8 and sold into slavery many times. As she passed from owner to owner, she experienced the moral and physical humiliations associated with slavery. It was only at the age of 13 that her suffering was alleviated after she was bought for the Italian Consul in Sudan. It was here that she was fortunate to receive kindness, respect, and peace from her new master.

She was later handed over to the Canossian Sisters when she made the case that slavery had been outlawed in Italy for years. She was baptized and confirmed in the Catholic Church in 1890, where she took the name Josephine. She later entered the Institute of St. Magdalene of Canossa in 1893 and made her profession three years later.

St. Josephine Bakhita's next 50 years were spent serving people through cooking, sewing, embroidery, and housekeeping. She was a source of encouragement and her constant smile won people's hearts, as did her humility and simplicity. Today she is known as the patron saint of victims of modern slavery and human trafficking. ©LPi
