

I'm quite shocked about it, but we are already through 1/3 of our youth faith formation classes for the year. The time really does fly by and each week is jam-packed with teaching about the Gospel, God's love, and how to be a disciple of Christ. Prior to the start of this catechism year, I was filled with anxiety because I was unsure what challenges we would face with essentially last year "off" from traditional classes. While we did have a home-study/hybrid type model where students picked up material and we met virtually once a week, it was hard to really determine if the students were absorbing material.

Despite the decent number of students that joined us for the hybrid model, we gained twice the number of students for the 2021-22 year as we had for the 2020-21 year. We have a large group (for our parish) for the sacramental years and that left me wondering if the students would truly be ready after being away for a year or doing a home-study for a year. So please allow me to paint a picture of the intense force God works through this little parish tucked behind a library...

First, I need to spotlight our Confirmation prep years 1&2 students. Every student in our Confirmation class comes from a family of regular Mass-goers. They know their faith, they engage in class, and understand what it means to be Confirmed in the faith. Lou works hard to fine-tune their knowledge while the students are working hard at providing service hours at the parish, serving as altar-servers, and completing their Mass attendance sheets with wonderful notes about the homilies. The 1st year Confirmation students (typically grade 7) are just as awe-inspiring. Kristie always provides enriching lessons and this group of students know their stuff! They have no problem "flipping the class" (i.e. teaching the catechist information about the topic of the day). This group also keeps impressing me and Father Joe with their completion of their Mass attendance sheets.

Our early sacramental years (for Reconciliation and Communion) have their own hurdles because for most of them, attendance at Mass has been minimal because of the shut-down. Despite this, every student comes to class each week eager to learn more and they are all absorbing everything like little sponges! Our new 1st grade catechist, Crystal, has been working hard at teaching our youngest Catholics all

their prayers and digging into the meaning of the Gospel each week. By the time this group fully prepares for their sacraments, they will be on fire to receive Christ! Rose and her newly appointed aide, Yolanda, have been whizzing through the First Reconciliation prep and have had quite a struggle trying to squeeze so much in such a small window of time. Yet, both of these women blend instruction with Christ's love so beautifully that I know these students will impress Father Joe with their knowledge of the concepts!

Mary, Linda, Charlie, and I have grades 3-6 which is our "smallest" group but the group that comprised most of our hybrid students. Just ask my husband, I cried many tears last year because I thought for sure I was letting this group down. I was unsure if they were progressing on their journey with Christ or if that year was a waste of time. But now, these students are making me cry tears of joy because although they aren't always eager to share their answers—they know the faith. Even better—they want to know more about their faith. These students pray, they know the rosary, they come to Mass, and they discuss with their families how to be a good Christian. These students truly want to know how to get to heaven and do their best to get there.

So is there one group of students that is really sticking out to me? No—they are all inspiring. But the ones that really inspire me are the catechists we have here at St. Priscilla. We have dealt with constant change since I took this position in 2017 and the catechists have stayed on this roller-coaster with me. And look at what the roller-coaster has produced! It has produced a group of students and families that are going to carry this parish and this faith to new heights! I am so proud of all of them. (Now please excuse me while I wipe some tears from my face.) Thank you to my catechists! Let us continue to build a program that sets this little parish apart from others!

THE WORD OF GOD AS THE BREATH OF LIFE

The avalanche of calendars has begun. As the time draws near for the new year of 2022 to begin, I have received many calendars (more than I could ever use) and soon I will be filling in dates for doctor appointments, friends' birthdays, family gatherings, etc.—all the busyness of life.

There is another calendar for us to consider. It's called the liturgical calendar and it begins with the first Sunday of Advent. Our spiritual life is reflected in this year of Our Lord as we prepare for his coming and impact on our lives.

A change in enumeration of years has brought about a change in reference to time. The letters A.D. (meaning *Anno Domini*—year of the Lord- in Latin) designated years following the birth of Christ.

Some think that we far too sophisticated to use this expression. Some great (?) minds decided that Common Era (C.E.) was a more inclusive way to describe the years following the birth of Jesus. As you have may have noticed, I avoid this usage. I refuse to submit to a practice that essentially removes the truth of the Incarnation from attention.

I believe this change is a not-so-subtle attempt to erase Christ-consciousness from our practical and intellectual lives.

As the end of our liturgical calendar draws near, our readings reflect the consideration of the Second Coming of Christ. When will this happen? Jesus tells his followers that no one knows: *But of that day or hour, no one neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father* (Mark 13:32).

Meanwhile we wait. Psalm 16 gives us gives us the key to gratitude and peace of heart. With an attitude of utter contentment, the psalmist speaks of his joy: *Therefore, my heart is glad and my soul rejoices*. He goes on with a spirit of one who loves the Lord without question: *You will show me the path to life, fullness of joy in your presence, the delight at your right hand forever* (Ps.16:1).

Sometimes predictions of the return of the Son of God seem to be frightening but we have nothing to fear. To see Christ come in his majesty and glory will be overwhelming, of course, but the psalmist prepares us for his return.

...with him at my right hand I shall not be disturbed.

GIVING UNTIL IT HURTS

In the time of Christ, sacrifice was nothing new to the Jewish people. The Israelites were experts at sacrifice. So, after centuries of every kind of offering imaginable, what was so special about Christ's? What made it so different from the sacrifices offered by the Levitical priests for centuries before his death?

Well, to adequately answer that question would consume whole volumes. And, of course, the first and most important reason is that Christ was the son of God and the savior of the world, not a random (if "unblemished") lamb offering. It was only by the blood of Christ that we could be redeemed.

Another answer is this: Christ's sacrifice cost him. In fact, it cost him everything. The offerings made by the Israelites through their priests cost them too, of course. They gave of their flocks, of their household stores, of their wealth. But Christ gave differently. He gave of himself. He gave until it was all gone.

Such is the highest form of stewardship: the gift of self to the point of discomfort. It can take a multitude of forms and I am not saying we are all called to be nailed to the cross. In fact, for most of us, our gifts will not involve physical discomfort at all. But certainly, stewardship demands discomfort. It demands that we go against our human nature of putting ourselves first, of thinking primarily of our own needs and desires.

And most of all, it demands love. For that, above all else, distinguished the gift Christ gave us. ©LPi

Reading With Your Child

Research has shown that reading aloud is the most important activity for language development. It stimulates literacy and language skills even before a child can talk! It's a way for parents and other important adults to interact with babies and children and build strong relationships.

Tips for Reading with Your Child

- Make reading part of every day, even for just a few minutes.
- Talk about the pictures-you do not need the book to tell a story.
- Make silly sounds, like animal noises.
- Make the story come alive by creating voices for the characters.
- Have fun! Having a positive attitude towards reading helps to promote love of reading in children.

What books should I read with my baby? 6-12 months old

- Small books sized for small hands.
- Brightly colored board and cloth books to touch and explore.
- Books with pictures of familiar objects-balls, bottles, dogs.

What books should I read with my young toddler? 12-24 months old

- Sturdy board books they can handle and carry.
- Books with only a few words on the page.
- Books that show kids doing familiar things, such as sleeping, eating, and playing.

What books should I read with my older toddler? 24-36 months old

- Books with board pages but also books with paper pages.
- Books with rhyme and rhythm and repeated text they can learn by heart.
- Books about food, animals, trucks and other favorite objects.

What books should I read with my preschool child? 3-5 years

- Ask "What happens next" in familiar stories.
- Let your child try to tell the story.
- Point out words and pictures that begin with the same sound.


