Shortly after I received the Sacraments of Initiation on Easter Vigil in 2014, I was bombarded by a couple of women that were Jehovah Witnesses in a 7-Eleven parking lot. The women were very friendly and handed me a brochure before even mentioning why it was being handed to me. With a big smile on their faces, one asked "do you know Jesus Christ?" I said, "yes, I am Catholic." The other woman smiled and said, "that's good, but Jesus wasn't born on December 25th." I paused a moment and wondered why that would even matter and why that would be their first argument against Catholicism. I smiled and responded, "okay, thank you for your brochure. I will look it over." I wasn't lying. I did look it over but not because I was interested in being a Jehovah Witness. I looked it over wondering what about their church made them confident enough to hand random strangers in a parking lot brochures and take jabs at their beliefs. I noticed that the Jehovah Witness brochure came off as "we know it all and everyone else is wrong" but with a warm and fuzzy approach. I thought it was interesting. What those women actually made me do was dig deeper into the Catholic faith so that I could more confidently tell them they were wrong--haha.

However, the women weren't wrong. We don't actually know when Jesus was born. But on the other side of the same coin, we don't even know when the idea of celebrating it on December 25th came about and why. Sure, there are many theories but many of those theories lack legitimate support. At the end of the day, what day it is celebrated is not a huge deal. We know Jesus was born and born of the Virgin Mary, nine months after the Holy Spirit descended upon her. Even the Catechism of the Catholic Church does not define the date of Christ's birth but rather focuses on the mystery of the day (CCC 525-526). I mention all this, not to take away from today, but to highlight what is important to our Catholic faith--the mysteries and what we know to be True. If we are ever to doubt what is True we should turn toward two texts--the Bible and the Catechism of the Catholic Church. The two texts go hand in hand. The Bible is obvious--it is God's Word. The Catechism is what I often refer to is the "guide/rule book to the Catholic faith." If you know the Catechism, you not only understand the teachings of the faith but also how they came to be from the deep

analysis of Sacred Scripture.

I will admit, both texts can be difficult to read and decipher. Fortunately, Ascension Press has been making our lives much easier! On Jan. 1, 2020 they launched the podcast and reading plan *The Bible in a Year* which can be started at any time and at any pace that works for you. Each day you listen to Fr. Mike Schmitz read the Bible, explain the readings with a short "homily," and in total it takes about 30 minutes or less of your time each day. Ascension Press has been listening, and next week, on Jan. 1, 2023, they will be launching the brand new *The Catechism in a Year* podcast. Just like *The Bible in a Year*, each day a portion of the text will be read and discussed in an order that makes it easier to connect the dots. The best part? I think the real challenge of evangelization in the modern age is the reality that pretty much everyone has already heard of Jesus Christ — or, at least, they think they have. To our 21st-century eyes, the angel who shared news of the birth of Jesus with the shepherds had an easy job. All he had to do was announce it.

Our baptism compels us to do the same — to announce the coming of Christ over and over again, always and everywhere. But our audience is not a group of illiterate shepherds in ancient Judea. Our audience is a world that has heard so much about Jesus they often claim weariness of his name. So how do we do it? If we walk into a crowd of strangers and tell them we want to talk about Jesus, their reaction will probably be either “I already know about Jesus, thanks,” or “I’ve heard of him, and based on the behavior of those who claim to follow him, I’m really not interested in hearing more.”

Because in the end, our very lives are how we “announce his salvation” in the present day. We announce it in our actions to strangers. We announce it in our treatment of people who have wronged us. We announce it in our interactions with those who disagree with us.

How long had the coming of the Messiah been foretold to the Israelites? So long that, no doubt, many of them despaired of his coming altogether. So, God had to give them a sign: “You will find an infant wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger.” Now we are the sign. The world has heard of Christ by now. But have they all seen him? It’s our job to show them.

The Letter to the Hebrews holds its serious tone as we are led to understand that Jesus is far superior:

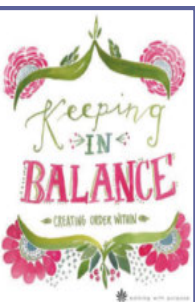
To the angels: Let all the angels worship him.

12 Ways to Have a Healthy Holiday Season

Brighten the holidays by making your health and safety a priority and ready to enjoy the holidays.

1. Wash hands often to help prevent the spread of germs. It's flu season. Wash your hands with soap and clean running water for at least 20 seconds.
2. Bundle up to stay dry and warm. Wear appropriate outdoor clothing : light, warm layers, gloves, hats, scarves, and waterproof boots.
3. Manage stress. Give yourself a break if you feel stressed out, overwhelmed, and out of control. Some of the best ways to manage stress are to find support, connect socially, and get plenty of sleep.
4. Don't drink and drive or let others drink and drive. Whenever anyone drives drunk, they put everyone on the road in danger. Choose not to drink and drive and help others do the same.
5. Be smoke-free. Avoid smoking and secondhand smoke. Smokers have greater health risks because of their tobacco use, but non-smokers also are at risk when exposed to tobacco smoke.
6. Fasten seat belts while driving or riding in a motor vehicle. Always buckle your children in the car using a child safety seat, booster seat, or seat belt according to their height, weight, and age. Buckle up every time, no matter how short the trip and encourage passengers to do the same.
7. Get exams and screenings. Ask you health care provider what exams you need and when to get them. Update your personal and family history.
8. Get your vaccinations. Vaccinations help prevent diseases and saves lives. Everyone 6 months and older should get a flu vaccine each year.
9. Monitor children. Keep potentially dangerous toys, food, drinks, household items, and other objects out of children's reach. Protect them from drowning, burns, falls, and other potential accidents.
10. Practice fire safety. Most residential fires occur during the winter months, so don't leave fireplaces, space heaters, food cooking on stoves, or candles unattended. Have an emergency plan and practice it regularly.
11. Prepare food safety. Remember these simple steps: Wash hands and surfaces often, avoid cross-contamination, cook foods to proper temperatures and refrigerate foods promptly.
12. Eat healthy, stay active. Eat fruits and vegetables which pack nutrients and help lower the risk for certain diseases. Limit your portion sizes and foods high in fat, salt, and sugar. Also be active for 2-3 hours per week and help kids and ten stay active.

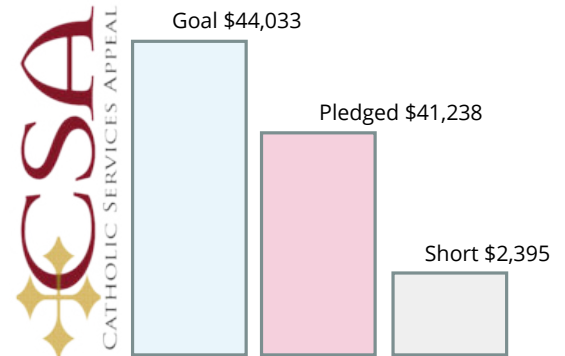

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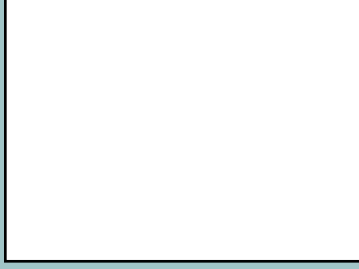

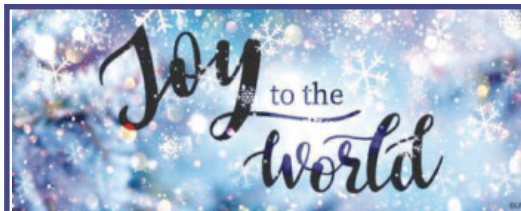
