

FAITH FORMATION

"Since Christ himself has said, 'this is my body,' who shall dare doubt that it is his body?" -St. Cyril of Jerusalem

When I took classes at the seminary there were quite a few men and women in particular class that were also Directors of Religious Education (DRE). That made sense since the class was a requirement for the DRE certification. There was one woman in this class that was a catechist and decided to take a few classes at the seminary because "her kids are grown and out of the house and she had time." Okay, cool. (Talk about devotion to being a catechist--dishing out college tuition to take a class??) One week we were discussing the Holy Trinity and a fellow student mentioned that she had difficulty teaching her students in faith formation about the Holy Trinity. The challenge was teaching little children that God is Three Persons and those Three Persons make One God. She knew the old 3-leaf clover description (funny the timing because it was not my intention to have this line up the Sunday before St. Patrick's Day) but she mentioned that she was looking for other ways to describe this idea. Other students offered suggestions and unbeknownst to me, these suggestions were getting the older woman catechist angry. I mentioned that I had recently heard using a 3-legged stool as an analogy. My comment must have pushed the catechist over the edge because she angrily looked at me and said, "that's incorrect, don't teach that or any of those other suggestions to the kids."

The catechist mentioned that all of those suggestions of using earthly things to describe the mystery of the Trinity were incorrect because it is a mystery that we cannot explain. She was so angry with the class by this point that even after I agreed with her that they don't explain the mystery she dismissed anything I said thereafter. What I was trying to explain to the angry woman in my class was not that these earthly items definitively explain the Trinity but if used and taught properly, they can be used to help guide young children to explore the idea of how such a mystery could be real. Basically, it makes an insane mystery relatable to children. There are many mysteries in the faith that cannot be properly understood or explained. The Trinity is one of them and another big one is the Eucharist.

In our journey in Catholicism we can look at a clover and say, "this is kind of like the Trinity--God is One in Three Persons." When we say that, people nod in agreement. The hiccup is when a priest holds up communion at the altar after consecration. It isn't just

any little hiccup either. It is one of those super loud and violent hiccups that makes your chest hurt for at least 10 minutes. Eucharist IS Jesus...body, blood, soul, and divinity. This isn't like the clover analogy where we nod our head in agreement. No, the Eucharist literally IS Jesus. We aren't holding up a clover at the altar and doing the sign of the cross. Of course not, because we know the difference between an analogy and the real deal. Right? The disconnect that happens is a result of our human brains. Our brains take information in by our senses and whatever our brain senses is what we perceive to be reality. Words are important. In a Catholic Church, the priest says "this is my body...this is my blood..." Over the centuries as more and more people have left the Catholic Church to start their own religions, people have argued that the Eucharist is like Jesus but in here we say the Eucharist is. People then want proof of that reality.

In a couple months we will have a small handful of children receive Eucharist for the first time. As they prepare, the students are told that the Eucharist is Jesus. They can feel the texture and weight of the Eucharist. They can taste the Eucharist. For the first few years after celebrating, that faith remains. But somewhere between First Communion and Confirmation, science takes over their brain's processing. Reality becomes defined by senses instead of senses and faith. So what happens? Confirmation day comes and what do their senses tell them? The senses tell them that oil was rubbed on their forehead. Do they physically feel or taste the Holy Spirit descend upon them? No. Well, for most, no. Once the teen (or whomever) stops using faith to define reality, why would they keep coming to Mass? Why would they even bother to stay in the Catholic Church? If a person only uses the senses of sight, sound, smell, taste, touch, then it will be easy for them to start nodding in agreement when someone holds up a wafer and says, "this wafer is kind of like Jesus' body."


If you would have asked me on the morning of my confirmation what the chances were of the Holy Spirit getting into my heart, I would have told you they were about the same as getting water from a stone.

My faith was fragile at this time in my life, primarily because I viewed it as exactly that — my faith. Something within my possession and subject to my own power. And I hadn't done the things I thought I needed to do in order to be the kind of Christian who knows the truth and lives it. I was waiting to be made stronger. I was waiting to be made more faithful. I was waiting for a transformation.

Little did I know, I was like the woman at the well, standing around talking about the coming of the Messiah, unaware that he was standing right in front of me. She wasn't ready; she was still living in her sin. She was caught so unawares that she left her water jar at the well, rushing out to tell what she had seen.

When I was anointed with the oil it no longer mattered that I wasn't strong enough to break open the stone that I was convinced encased my heart — God's grace gushed forth through the cracks. While I certainly didn't become a perfect Christian — and never will, in this life — I did learn that when God tells you to strike, it's probably best not to second-guess Him.

So the first reason the Latin Mass draws so many Gen-Zers and young Millennials is that it is beautiful in a way I'd say 80% of Novus Ordo Masses are not. Humans are naturally drawn toward beauty because it is a physical reflection of God's perfection. In the midst of a Latin Mass, it's easy to conceive that it is something that has been going on for thousands of years.

The second reason has more to do with the perennial pendulum swing of the generations: participating in something so old and traditional is a repudiation of societal norms. Every generation has its rebellion against the status quo, and for the youthful Latin Mass goers the reaction is both inter- and intra-generational. When the loud, radical members of the Left are shouting that patriarchy, Christianity and Western tradition needs to be abolished, it feels edgy to go to the service that underpinned all those things for 1500 years. After somehow retaining your faith despite years of vapid liturgies insisted upon by older generations, it's gratifying to go where your faith is validated.

The final reason the TLM is so popular among young adults is that it's a shortcut to a faith community. The age ranges, ethnic backgrounds and economic statuses of the attendees tend to cover a wide range.

So the reasons for the TLM's popularity among my generation are that it's (1) beautiful, (2) rebellious against the modern age and (3) a shortcut to an enthusiastic faith community.

THE WORD OF GOD AS THE BREATH OF LIFE by Mary Rice

Trust has vanished! The Israelites have never learned to trust in God. It was of no matter to them that they had been released from slavery, the miracle of the Red Sea crossing, the manna, the birds... Now they blame Moses for their problem--no water. Their anger is so great that Moses fears for his life: A little more and they will stone me!

God replies to Moses: ...Strike the rock and the water will flow from it for the people to drink. Moses named the place Massah and Meribah which meant "quarreling". The pervading question was: Is the Lord in our midst or not? An attitude of doubt and anger lingered. Poor Moses--There is no record of thankfulness.

The passage from Romans is in sharp contrast to the distrustful Israelites. Paul writes (to strangers whom he has never met) and speaks to them about their peace with God in Jesus Christ. He reminds them that the love of God has been poured into their hearts through the Holy Spirit (What a beautiful image!).

The death of Jesus is not ignored. Christ, while we were still helpless sinners and could do nothing for ourselves, Christ died for us. This ultimate sacrifice is predominately in our hearts during this season of Lent. The presence of the Stations of the Cross is a constant reminder.

The Christians in Rome were not in friendly territory, but they trusted in God's love. Trust overcame the obstacles. Their faith and courage in the face of danger have inspired Christians all over the world for centuries. Some days it seems as if the values of the world threaten our families and emotions run high.

Look back on tough times and remind yourself: I made it! The grace given to you at Confirmation, on was not a one-time gift of the Holy Spirit. Call on him for help.

<u>**Bible Study tip:**</u> Whenever water is mentioned in a passage (as in today's Gospel) know that an allusion to God's presence and power is intended.

It's about the anniversary time of my illness last year. Tardily, I want to thank all of you who prayed so faithfully for me during those days. I am very grateful to you!

When I think about the story of the Samaritan woman at the well, I think of my father. This Gospel reading that we use every year for the First Scrutiny of the RCIA was always my favorite to discuss with those who would be baptized in just a few weeks at the Easter Vigil. Not that many years ago, my father was one of those elect. That year, the story was more powerful than ever.

The woman went frequently to the well looking to get the water that would sustain her body. But in the story, Jesus tells her of a different kind of water, one that gives life and quenches even the driest of thirsts. The story tells us that she put down her water jar and ran to the town telling of her encounter with the One who may be the Christ. She left that jar at the well. She did not need it anymore.

I encounter people all the time that spend their days going up the hill to draw water. They are tired and spent. My father was one of those. But with the gift of baptismal water, that constant chore is now over. There is no need to travel up that hill.

This Lent, if you are one of the baptized, reclaim the gift of your baptism. Stop climbing that hill in search of something that can only quench your thirst temporarily. You encountered Christ and have the everlasting, living water already. Put down that water jar. Your new life has only just begun.

3 Reasons Why the Latin Mass Is So Attractive to Young People (According to a 22-Year-Old)

The Traditional Latin Mass isn't just extraordinary in its form — its attendance among 18- to 29-year-olds bucks the

downward trends in religiosity among that demographic. Pew Research data shows that only around a quarter of Catholics between the ages of 18 & 29 attend church once a week or more, compared to 98% of Latin Mass goers in the same demographic, according to data published by the Priestly Fraternity of St. Peter. Research shows that young people's move toward tradition is largely self-motivated rather than the outcome of outside influence: "We can see that personal preferences account for 58% of the total, while peer influences account for 18%. total. Thus, to the tune of 76%, the impetus to attend the Latin Mass among 18-39 year-olds seems to be largely coming *internally* from within their own generation, rather than being inherited from previous generations."
