FAITH FORMATION

"Why did you suffer for me, dear Jesus?
For love! The nails...the crown...the cross...
all for the love of me!" -St. Gemma Galgani

In this weekend's readings we hear one of Jesus' miracles of raising Lazarus from the dead. And not just making Lazarus come back to life after a few minutes or even a couple hours. Jesus woke Lazarus from the dead after Lazarus was in the tomb for full 4 days. Obviously that is a big deal and it is appropriate that homilies and discussions on this reading are focused on the miracle. For you and me, that teaches us that Jesus will, without a doubt, be able to raise us and bring us to glory at his Second Coming (if we are worthy).

It is my hope that you also learned something else in today's reading. No, there is no pop quiz on the city, or who said what, which women were present, etc. You should have also learned that Jesus wept. Jesus' eyes didn't just well up, he didn't "shed a tear." Jesus wept so profoundly that the witnesses said the following:

"Jesus began to weep. So the Jews said, 'See how he loved him!"--John 11:35-36

Lazarus was a friend of Jesus. I have heard it many times "Jesus must have felt awful that he did not help Lazarus sooner and that's why he was so sad." This view point has always been interesting to me. If Jesus had the power to heal the blind and the paralyzed AND raise people from the dead, why would the timing even matter to him? We know for a fact that Jesus did not weep because he was so embarrassed. How do we know that for a fact? We know because Jesus said and did all types of radical things and never once apologized or let criticism slow him down. So why would the timing of his arrival to Lazarus make him embarrassed?

I'm no theologian, but when I reflect upon Jesus weeping this way a few events come to mind. First, I think about The Fall and God must have been grieving when He discovered what Adam and Eve had done. They were supposed to live in perfect communion in paradise with God but God had to curse all of the descendants to a life of suffering and death instead. The second event that comes to mind is Jesus praying in the garden before he is sentenced to death. Jesus prayed and cried so intensely that it wasn't water that streamed down his face--Jesus cried tears of blood. And finally, I also think about Christ's crucifixion. We don't read about Jesus shedding tears in

the Bible and perhaps some of us picture Jesus being strong, brave, and without a single tear that entire day. Personally, I picture Jesus suffering with tears. Not the same type of tears that would have been seen the day he raised Lazarus from the dead. I picture Jesus crying tears with a dutiful silence.

All the tears--in Bethany for Lazarus, in the Garden of Eden, in the Garden of Gethsemane, and the journey to his death--they are all tears that are shed out of love for us. God weeps for you just like He wept for Lazarus. The tears and anguish in the Garden of Eden, God feels that every time we sin, no matter how small. The tears of blood are still shed for us every time we have to suffer and experience death. It was not intended to be this way. We were supposed to all be in communion for all of time, to be in paradise always, to always feel God's closeness and love. God loves you and me so much that He knew how He wanted us to be and when He wanted us to be. Unfortunately, we don't all get the opportunity to be in communion with Him. We can't blame it all on Adam and Eve either. Every day we choose whether or not to take a bite of the forbidden fruit. Every day we decide whether or not to receive the grace of the sacraments (especially Reconciliation). Every day we make choices that determine whether we will make it to heaven or not. God will love you and weep for you no matter what you do because He loves you so much.

Show Him how much you love Him in return, reconcile yourself with God and be in communion with Him--just as He intended.

Offer it up. My grandmother used this phrase with her children, and my mother, in turn, used it with me. It's a kind of verbal heirloom, a gift of wisdom from a generation that knew suffering all too well.

We know it to be true that God will work through our suffering if we invite him to. We know it and we have seen it — we have only to look at Lazarus and his sisters Martha and Mary.

But, often, I invite God into my suffering only to tell Him where I want Him to stand. I make an offering of suffering but expect God to do something very specific with it. Teach me this, please. Give me this specific grace. Show me this specific answer.

The happy ending in today's Gospel is not the alleviation of the sorrow Martha and Mary feel because it isn't alleviated, Lazarus is still human, and death still awaits him. Someday, his sisters will have to mourn at his tomb. That loss and pain will not be avoided.

The happy ending is that he is resurrected now, and in doing so, brings so many to belief. The happy ending is that Martha and Mary do not abandon discipleship because things didn't work out exactly the way that they wanted. They run out to meet Christ, eyes dim with tears. They fling themselves into his company and onto his providence.

They made an offering of their suffering, and their happy ending is that their offering was accepted.

GOSPEL MEDITATIONS

— Father John Muir

Of all Jesus' miracles, the most unsettling might be when he made a dead person alive. We know of three times when he did so: a girl, a young man, and Lazarus. The miracle teaches us he has the power of life and death. He anticipates his resurrection. Sin hurts us. Some sin kills us, spiritually. The three miracles reveal to us that no matter our circumstances, Jesus can give life to us.

The three miracles are instructive of the three ways we feel dead. The little dead girl symbolizes sin before it has time to mature. She's in bed and, once alive, gets right back to her life. The young man is lying in his casket in a funeral procession. This is sin allowed to fester, to grow and become somewhat normalized. Once raised, he has a short walk back home. Lazarus, a full-grown dead man, lies wrapped in burial bands in the tomb. Once he is raised, much needs to be done. He'll need to remove those bands, find new clothes, and travel all the way back home. That is sin allowed to go all the way, unchecked for months or years. It's the most spectacular of the three and reveals Jesus' glory more than the others.

What hope that should give us, for us and those whom we love! Jesus knows our sin hurts us and can even kill us spiritually. No matter the extent of the damage, he is always ready for the miracle of making the dead fully alive.

THE WORD OF GOD AS THE BREATH OF LIFE by Mary Rice

Jesus spoke to Lazarus, cold and lifeless in the tomb Come out! And sorrow's tear gave way to **LIFE**.

Then, as mourners stood and stared, movement—slight and unexpected, gave evidence at the same hour of **LIFE**.

Come out! He spoke again in regal voice.

Until him! - for the burial cloths bind his hands and feet,
veil the face that I have loved
in *LIFE*.

Yes, release him of all that holds him fast. Undo the ritual that marked his death and free him once again for **LIFE**.

But wait, where are the willing hands to carefully remove the winding cloths and "let him go" in joyful steps to **LIFE?**

Untie him! So that he may walk.
Untie him! So that he may speak.
Untie him! So that he may join in festive manner
As we celebrate

NEW LIFE.

Jesus spoke and all did hear but some among them listened well, obeying Jesus' words, of *LIFE*.

The Father answered Jesus' prayer and happy hearts rejoiced to see God's glory shine in power restoring **LIFE.**

PASSION SUNDAY

Prior to Vatican II, Passion Sunday was the 5th Sunday of Lent and Palm Sunday was observed on the subsequent Sunday.

For many centuries, the 5th Sunday of Lent was called "Passion Sunday," while the Sunday after it was called, "Palm Sunday." Currently the Roman Rite denotes Palm Sunday as "Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion," which combines the two observances.

This Sunday is called Passion Sunday because the Church begins on this day to make the Sufferings of our Redeemer her chief thought. It is called also Judica from the first word of the Introit of the Mass and again Neomania that is the Sunday of the new or the Easter moon, because it always falls after the new moon, which regulates the Feast of Easter Day.

Palm Sunday was the same celebration as it is today, with the procession of palm branches and the reading of the Passion narrative.

The Church simply saw fit to prepare the hearts of the faithful for the Passion of Jesus during the last two weeks of Lent by calling the 5th Sunday of Lent Passion Sunday. After Vatican II, the Church decided to combine the two Sundays.
