

This weekend we celebrate the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord. The account of the Epiphany is one that most of us know by heart. The Magi travel to Jerusalem to inquire about the location of the newborn king of the Jews. The Magi had observed a star at its rising and they had come to pay the king homage.


The appearance of the Magi is unique and only found in the Gospel of Matthew. You may be aware that Matthew does not call the Magi astrologers or kings, nor does he report from exactly what country or countries they came from. In fact, Matthew never even specifies the names of the Magi. We have traditionally presumed there were three Magi since three gifts gold, frankincense and myrrh – were presented to the Christ child.

The Magi, in many respects, provide a preview of what will later take place in Matthew's Gospel. The reactions of various people to the birth of Jesus parallel the effects that Jesus' teaching will have on those who hear it. Herod reacts with anger and hostility. The chief priests and scribes, ordinarily mortal enemies of one another, become collaborators to have Jesus killed.

Matthew also reminds us that the Magi, nonbelievers in the eyes of the religious leaders of the day, possess something unique, something seldom appreciated by the chief priests and scribes. The Magi possess the humility and the openness of mind and heart to seek and welcome the Son of God who has come into the world. Their following of the star is a journey of faith, a search for meaning, for purpose and for the presence of God in their lives. They were not deterred on their journey, even as they had people who had the potential for keeping them from achieving their goal. The Magi's search mirrors our own life-long search for compassion, justice, love, peace and forgiveness. That is the heart of the message of this celebration of the Epiphany.

In addition to the Magi's search for God, there is something else which speaks to us. The Magi are "outsiders", foreigners to the people of Israel. In the eyes of many, they would have been unworthy to encounter God. To have any encounter with God was reserved for only God's chosen people. Yet, in being welcomed to experience the presence of Christ by Mary and Joseph, the Magi serve to remind us that the gift of the Savior is given to the whole world – Jew and Gentile alike. All of us are, to a certain extent, foreigners, not because of the country of our origin, but because of our behaviors, our sins, our struggles and our brokenness. The message of Matthew's Gospel, proclaimed on this Feast of the Epiphany, is that all are welcome to encounter Christ. No one is excluded from God's love, mercy and forgiveness.

There is one more lesson that can be gleaned from the Magi. We are told they "prostrated themselves and did Him homage" and their lives were undoubtedly changed forever. When the Magi returned to their homes, they unquestionably would not have been able to contain themselves. They would have shared with others what they had seen and experienced. This serves to remind us that as those who encounter Jesus through our reception of the Eucharist, are living an incomplete manner if we live a life that is closed in on ourselves. We are incomplete if we live only for ourselves. We are complete when we receive the good news of the Gospel and witness and share that good news with all whom God has placed in our lives. What we have been freely given by the Lord the love of God - we must share with those whom we live, work and interact with.



Ever have one of those moments when you can't get a song out of your head? Such as: We three kings of orient are; bearing gifts we traverse afar; field and fountain, moor and mountain, following yonder star. O star of wonder, star of night, star with royal beauty bright; westward leading, still proceeding, guide us to thy perfect light. Uh-oh.....are they stuck in there now?

The aforementioned words are the lyrics and refrain from "We Three Kings." These are very profound words. They are an epiphany all by themselves. An epiphany is an ah-ha moment when we realize God's presence among us. Specifically, it means a manifestation of God, and in the case of the Magi, it is Christ.

The Magi are in search of "something." They really do not know exactly what they are searching for. They see a bright light in the sky, a star. This star is so intriguing that they just have to follow it to see where it will stop and what this star is pointing to. They believe that this star and it's light signifies that there is a new king "in town." At least that's the scuttlebutt. They just have to see who this king is and what sort of king. They set out on a journey, a long one, to fulfill their desires. They really don't know where they will be led, or where it will end, but never-the-less, they head on out.

Here is a thought—we are "modern magi." No, we are not kings of the orient, but by our baptism we were anointed as "priest, prophet, and **king**." Like the magi's journey, our life is a journey, and we too traverse afar. Maybe not in terms of great distances but in time, a lifetime. We see many "stars or bright lights" on our journey of life that can lead us, or that we follow. They can lead us to many places, some good, some not-so-good, some downright awful.

The question that you and I must ask ourselves is "whose, or what star, or light do we follow?" Does the star we follow lead us toward or away from Jesus, our King? Do we really follow the light that provides grace, and truth, and life? Do we follow reflections of light, false light, light that only leads us towards shadows and darkness? Sometimes it's hard to discern the difference, given all the strobe light of worldly things we are bombarded with. But discern we must! The magi allowed a star to guide them to Jesus. We must find our own "star" that will lead us to Christ. The Church is a great beacon of light in the darkness, so is Sacred Scripture, and Tradition. Family and friends can also be guides. We must keep the faith!

If we are on the right track we can experience epiphanies. Maybe not in the way the magi experienced the manifestation of God, in actually meeting the second person of the Trinity, Jesus. But we can look for the presence of God in natural wonders, God's awesome creation, like a shooting star. We can look for the presence of God in others by the way we are treated by them, or by the example that they provide. These are the light of God at work.

Will you be that guiding star for someone else? You truly can! You must keep the faith and use the grace and gifts God has enlightened you with. You can show God's presence by the way you give peace, show God's love, and share your blessings. When you do, you in return, will be enlightened by God's...

# The Epiphany of the Lord

In his Apostolic Exhortation, The Joy of the Gospel, Pope Francis references a thought from Pope Benedict XVI: "Being a Christian is not the result of an ethical choice or a lofty idea, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and a decisive direction." Today we celebrate an encounter with the Person of Jesus Christ! This simple but holy event in time dramatically changes human life, pointing it toward a new horizon and giving it a decisive direction. This is a message and truth that is not meant to be shared with only a select few who qualify but with the entire world. Pope Francis continues saying, "Thanks solely to this encounter or renewed encounter with God's love, which blossoms into an enriching friendship, we are liberated from our narrowness and self-absorption. We become fully human when we become more than human, when we let God bring us beyond ourselves in order to attain the fullest truth of our being."

Look around at people. Where is life heading for them? What gives them direction? Even we who are people of faith can get distracted and lose our focus. God, in all of His fullness, is revealed in Jesus Christ and we can encounter Him! God is tangible, real, vulnerable, poor, and full of wonders, surprises, and opportunities. For those who are struggling and lost, today is a day of great joy. All they have to do is reach out and touch the truth of Christ. This presence is revealed in the poor, exploited, and vulnerable ones who cry out for compassion and love. But it is also found in the faithful ones who see in the Epiphany of God a liberation from structures and systems that hurt us, a narrowness of mind and heart that constricts us, and an absorption in our self-agenda that prevents us from seeing anything other than ourselves as important.

We have been given the charge of preaching this Good News. If only we could find a way to be more effective, it might stand a chance of doing what God intended it to do. There is always tomorrow and our memory of that bright new light that shone so brilliantly that Bethlehem night pointing us to truth and reminding us that we are loved.

# **DROPPED HOST**

<u>Question</u>: What happens to a consecrated host if it accidentally falls to the ground?

<u>Answer</u>: This a very practical question because, as we all know, accidents happen, even during the most careful celebration of the liturgy. The short answer to this question is that nothing happens to the consecrated host. The Real Presence of Jesus remains in the consecrated host or any consecrated wine that might accidentally be spilled.


Another question we might ask is: How should the minsters respond if the Eucharist is dropped or spilled? If this happens, the priest, deacon, or extraordinary minister of holy Communion should immediately pick up the dropped host and consume it. If it is a case of the Precious Blood being spilled, the would minister use the additional purificator (and purificators if needed) to clean the spill and then the area should be reverently washed as soon as the Mass is over and the water poured into the sacrarium (a special sink that is located in church sacristies for reverently disposing of holy water, the water used to clean sacred vessels, etc.).

# ST. ELIZABETH ANN SETON

### January 4

The patron saint of Catholic schools. St. Elizabeth Ann Seton (August 28, 1774 -January 4, 1821) was born in New York City to a prominent family of the Episcopal faith. When she turned 19, she married а wealthy businessman with whom she had five children. He later died of tuberculosis in 1803, leaving her a young widow. After discovering the Catholic faith in Italy, where her husband had died, she returned to New York and converted to Catholicism in 1805.

After several years struggling as a single mother, Elizabeth moved in 1809 to



Emmitsburg, Maryland, where she founded the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph, the first community for religious women established in the United States. She also began St. Joseph's Academy and Free School, which started a chain reaction of Catholic-based education in the United States that continues today.

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton was canonized September 14, 1975 in St. Peter's Square by Pope Paul VI and was the first citizen born in the United States to be given the title of "saint."

# The Light of the Moon

If you own a television that has been turned on at any point in the last month or so, chances are you've caught at least a scene or two of the 1946 classic film "It's a Wonderful Life."

If you're not familiar with the movie, it follows the life of George Bailey from childhood through adulthood. A dreamer by nature, George has big plans for himself that involve world exploration and adventure — but family and community obligations keep him tethered to the same spot on the map, leading an altogether ordinary life.

One of the most memorable scenes from that movie is of George dancing with his sweetheart Mary while they sing "Buffalo Gals — Won't you come out tonight/And dance by the light of the moon?"


That lyric always catches my ear. Of course, the moon doesn't have any light of its own. All the moon has is the ability to reflect the light that shines upon it.

The same holds for us, doesn't it? Our stewardship is purely a reflection of the grace granted to us by another. "Upon you the LORD shines," writes Isaiah, "and over you appears his glory." Every good action we will ever take begins in the mind of God. The fact that we have the honor of carrying it out on His behalf is a beautiful gift. In the end of the movie, George Bailey realizes that he had a far greater life because, instead of being the hero of his own story, he allowed himself to reflect goodness onto others.
