

After all the people had been baptized and Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, heaven was opened and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove. - Lk 3:21-22a

JERRY'S JOURNAL

There is an oddity in the gospels which begs for an explanation: Jesus, it seems, doesn't want people to know his true identity as the Messiah. He keeps warning people not to disclose who he is.

Scripture scholars refer to this as "the messianic secret", suggesting Jesus does not want to reveal his true identity until the time is ripe. This, however, raises another question, specifically, what constitutes the right time to make this revelation known? Two of the Gospels, Mark and Matthew take entirely different approaches to answer Jesus' question.

In Mark's Gospel, Jesus asks his disciples: "Who do you say that I am?" Peter answers: "You are the Christ!" However, instead of praising Peter, Jesus sternly warns Peter to keep his answer to himself. Why the secrecy?

Simply put, Peter has stumbled into giving the right answer, but he has a false notion, an incorrect conception of what it means to be the Messiah.

In the centuries leading up to the birth of Jesus, and among Jesus' contemporaries, there was no shortage of opinions, thoughts and requirements surrounding the identity of the Messiah. Most of this thinking was based on fantasy, not reality. The Messiah, it was envisioned, would be some type of super-hero who would vanguish all forms of evil, humiliate those who were sworn enemies of God's chosen people and make the Israelites a super-power who was not to be messed with. The Messiah would simply annihilate anyone or anything that stood in his way. Such a Savior would not be subject to any weakness, suffering, humiliation or death. His superiority would have to be acknowledged by one and all, either willingly or begrudgingly. There would be no holdouts, no doubters, no back talkers. The Messiah would be capable of winning the Nobel Prize, the Stanley Cup, an Oscar or Emmy and all varieties of accolades imaginable. So, when Peter says: "You are the Christ!", that is how he sees Jesus. Peter is focused on earthly glory, worldly triumph, someone so

captivating and compelling that all would worship the ground on which the Messiah was walking on. Hence, Jesus' strong reprimand. In effect Jesus is telling Peter: "Don't you dare tell anyone about these flawed and erroneous notions you have. You are sadly mistaken."

Jesus then goes on to instruct Peter, and all those who aspire to be his disciples, what type of Savior he really is. He is not Superman, nor a Greek god, who is going to razzle-dazzle people on a daily basis so that all will drop to their knees in adulation. So exactly what kind of Messiah is Jesus?

Jesus is a *dying* and *rising* Messiah, someone who in his own life and body will demonstrate that evil is not overcome by miracles but by forgiveness, compassion, empathy and nobility of the soul. These attributes are not the result of crushing an enemy, but rather forgiving and loving an adversary. Jesus takes the paradoxical route, in the minds of many, to demonstrate exactly who he is. The glory of the Messiah is not proven by feats of strength and spectacular deeds. Rather, it is demonstrated by accepting with proper love and graciousness the slings and arrows of life, the unavoidable pain, humiliation, frustration and, ultimately, the willingness to lay down his life for the sake of others. However, when someone lives and dies the way Christ does, there is the subsequent rising to real glory of a heart so stretched and so enlarged that it is capable of transforming evil into good, hatred into love, bitterness into forgiveness and humiliation into glory. That is the work that the Messiah came to do and to demonstrate to others.

In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus asks the same question of Peter and Peter gives the same answer, but Jesus' response to Peter's answer is very different. In the Gospel of Matthew when

Peter says: "You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God", rather than chastising Peter, Jesus praises Peter's answer. Why is there such a difference? Because Matthew revamps the scene so that, in this version, Peter *does* understand the Messiah correctly, and Peter is then rewarded by Jesus who says the following: "Blessed are you, Simon, son of Jonah. For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my heavenly Father. And so, I say to you, you are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church, and the gates of the netherworld will not prevail against it" (Matthew 16: 17-19). Peter is then rewarded by Jesus and given the power to forgive sins because he has given the correct answer for all the right reasons. Peter understand the Messiah perfectly.

How do we imagine the Messiah? How do we imagine power? triumph? glorification? If Jesus looked you straight in the eye and asked: "How do you understand me?" Would that answer be lauded for being insightful and correct, or would Jesus say: "don't tell anyone what you just said?"





Our Christmas season has "officially" drawn to a close and we begin "Ordinary Time". however, is not so "ordinary" as we celebrate the Baptism of the Lord. We all know that baptism is a sacrament of initiation. It is the "gateway" sacrament on which all the other sacraments build upon. Through the waters of baptism we become an adopted daughter or son of God the Father, sister or brother to Jesus our Lord and Savior, and become one family in Christ.

The logical question to be asked is: Since Jesus is God, who is sinless, why did he need to be baptized? The truth of the matter is that he didn't! baptism in the Jordan by John the Baptist (a baptism of repentance and not our sacramental baptism) wasn't for him it was an example for us, then and now! If you think about it all that Jesus has done, is doing, and will do is for us!

When Jesus allowed his baptism by John he publicly accepted his mission as God's suffering Through his baptism, his death and servant. resurrection are prefigured. He "dies" by being submerged under the waters of the Jordan River and rises to "new life" when he comes up from under the water. Through his baptism by water and the Spirit we are given the sacramental of Holy Water and the Sacrament of Baptism itself. So you see, it wasn't about him at all, it was for us! (See the

Catechism of the Catholic Church 535-537).

When things are done for us given us, we have the responsibility to use the gifts we have been given. We, by virtue of the grace of baptism, are called to "bring up others" from the depths to the faith by the example of our lives. At our baptism our souls are given an indelible mark left by grace by the Holy Spirit. Because of this we are called to live in such a way as to be a positive influence on others, just as Jesus is! I know that's not an easy task. Yes, we will all fail at times to live up to that task. That is why we have the other sacramental graces. We have the Eucharist so that we have Christ within us to give us strength. We have the sacrament of reconciliation (confession) to know that we are forgiven when we fail, and we ALL fail and need that sacrament.

The bottom line in all this is; to live up to our baptismal promises, we must make use of the other sacraments. That is why Jesus gave us the seven. They are gifts wrapped up in beautiful packages. If, however, we leave them wrapped up sitting on a shelf, they are merely decorations which do not serve their intended purpose. Unwrap and use the gifts as Jesus intended. When we use what we've been give we experience God's...



I HOPE I AM LIKE HIM

"Who is this Christ? Is he like you?"

Perhaps you've heard this story, often attributed to the life of St. Teresa of Calcutta. A sick man asked her this question, as he marveled at her tireless service to himself and others in the name of someone named Jesus Christ.

"He is nothing like me," the saint is said to have answered. "But I hope I am like him."

Though the authenticity of this exchange cannot be verified, its message rings perfectly true: all the value of our stewardship lies in its relativity to the one in whose name we perform it.

Consider the figure of John the Baptist — a magnificent, towering character even purely from a literary or historical perspective. A martyr who fed on wild locusts and boldly spoke truth to power — a man so great some mistook him for the Messiah.

But why is he great? Because he prepared the way. All his accomplishments and escapades mean nothing if they are taken out of the context of salvation history. He only makes sense relative to Christ — and this is exactly as he wanted it. "One worthier than I is coming," he insists. And because of that humility and that total embrace of God's will, he is given one of the greatest honors in the New Testament — he baptizes the Son of God.

Let's examine our lives in the light of their relativity to Christ. How do we prepare the way? When Christ comes to us, what do we do? How do we leave ourselves open to be actors in God's plan?






