PRIDE

The ancient Greeks believed in many different gods. One of those gods was named Narcissus. He had the appearance of a young man and was

extremely attractive. While going through the mountains one day, he was noticed by a nymph named Echo. She fell in love with him immediately, but he rejected her. Another goddess named Nemesis, the goddess of revenge, decided to punish Narcissus. She led him to a pool of water and had him look into it, so he could see his own reflection. He fell in love with his reflection, not knowing it was a reflection. He made efforts to connect with the person he saw. However, since his love couldn't be reciprocated and he couldn't have the object of his desire, he killed himself. Sometimes our pride can turn on us and destroy us.

In the name Narcissus we get the adjective that comes from it "narcissistic." The adjective describes a person who in his or her life shows a significant concern for his or her own self and a minimum concern for others. God tells us, "love our neighbor as ourselves." Jesus tells us this is one of the two greatest commandments. It is often referred to, even by different religions, as the Golden Rule. If we are to live in peace with one another, we have to establish a certain sense of balance between our concern for ourselves and our concern for others.

Now pride, which this is all about, is a tricky thing to deal with because there is a kind of healthy pride we feel when we have done a good job or accomplished something significant. Healthy pride moves us to take

responsible care of ourselves, to dress appropriately, to use to use our talents to serve ourselves and others in a positive way. Then there is a neurotic pride, a form of pride that pushes everyone else out of our way. It tries to push us to heights of importance greater than we can possibly be. Then, when we fail, it condemns us or makes us feel as if we are an absolute failure. Perfectionism is a form of neurotic pride because none of us are always perfect – only God is.

Today we hear about Jesus at a wedding banquet. At this celebration, he observed certain guests putting themselves as being especially important. The seating at a formal dinner indicated a person's position on the social ladder. Some of the guests were not satisfied where they were seated and they wanted a seat that would spotlight their high importance. I think there was some humor in Jesus' suggestion about taking a less prestigious position so that the host would invite the person in the low position to move up higher. This probably didn't change a proud person's mindset if their reason for taking a lower place was primarily to be invited to take a higher position. The important lesson Jesus was trying to teach is near the end of today's gospel: don't just invite people to a dinner or a celebration who you know will pay you back. When you throw a party, do the same; invite people who will not be able to pay you back. Jesus is not taking about throwing parties or going out to dinner. He's talking about doing any kind of a good deed for anyone, whether it gets noticed or not, whether people think what a wonderful person we are, or whether our only reward is the pleasure of having helped someone in need.

We don't need to throw a party in order to find ways we can follow the lesson Jesus teaches us in today's gospel.



Saint Gregory the Great lived in a most turbulent time. There were devastating episodes of plague, the sacking of Rome and the breakdown of strong Roman rule, invasions by Lombards and Franks, floods, and a widening gap between imperial Byzantium and the Roman Church.

Born around 540 into a noble Roman family, Saint Gregory was probably trained in law, and started his public service as a Prefect of Rome. However, upon the death of his father, he converted his family home to monastery, where he resided as a monk. He built six more monasteries in Sicily and one in Rome

"MARC" MY WORDS

In today's Gospel Jesus is dining with a leading Pharisee and his guests. Notice that "the people were observing him carefully." So they weren't just there to share a meal. In turn, Jesus was watching them carefully as well! Jesus tells them a parable about attending a wedding reception and seating arrangements. A "who's who" of seating arrangements. He offers them some sage advice! This sage advise is for us as well. Jesus' message are truly timeless.

Jesus said, "When you are invited to a wedding banquet, do not recline at table in the place of honor. A more distinguished guest than you may have been invited by him, and the host who invited both of you may approach you and say, 'Give your place to this man,' and then you would proceed with embarrassment to the lowest place." Great advice, for starters, but there is more from Jesus! Jesus doesn't leave it there, he also offers a better way. Jesus continued, "Rather, when you are invited, go and take the lowest place so that when the host comes to you he might say, 'My friend, move up to a higher position.'" Then you will enjoy the esteem of your companions at the table.

Jesus is telling them, and us as well, to be meek, humble, and unassuming. It is indeed better to be moved up than put in our place. If we take the lowest place as our proper place we have nowhere to go but up. I'd rather be moving up on many

fronts than to have to backstep or be taken aback!

But wait, Jesus isn't done yet! There is more. Jesus then preaches an excellent homily for the Pharisee and guests. He tells them that when they hold a dinner party don't invite relatives, friends, or wealthy neighbors because you know that they will reciprocate. Instead invite those who can't repay you. Invite the poor, crippled, lame, and blind. Jesus says that you will be

rewarded, that is, blessed by God because of their inability to make repayment. Jesus says that repayment comes at the resurrection of the righteous.

A diaconal candidate shared an experience offered a reflection on it with me. It really goes to the point of the Gospel so I'm including it. I've "Reader's Digested" it, and formatted it to fit in this space: "A man approached me on the streets while working, and was panhandling. He asked me for spare change, for food, and water. I was quick to dismiss him but almost immediately I could hear a voice saying to me, 'whatever you do for the least of these.' It made me rethink the situation. So, when I completed the work I was doing I found the man who had asked me for water and I gave him a bottle of water from my backpack."

It is very easy for us to follow society's stigmas and dismiss the needy and poor. And yes, some of them may be gaming the system, but that is not for us to determine. It is up to us as Christians to be compassionate and live our faith.

Jesus can come to us as a guest in many ways, especially in the poor. When we give the poor places of honor by helping them without expectation of repayment we will receive God's...



We encourage all adults to prayerfully consider joining this rewarding ministry!



HUMILITY AND STEWARDSHIP



WOMEN'S RETREAT


To the Women of St. Paul of Tarsus:

SIGN BEFORE THE GOSPEL

Question:

I have been going to Mass for years and have always wondered: why do we make the three signs of the cross before the Gospel?

Answer:

Certainly, many people go to Mass or other devotions, doing and saying things out of habit or reverence and not really understanding the reasons behind some of these things. But everything we do has a meaning or purpose that helps us to worship better, proclaim our beliefs, or focus the attention of the people on something that has a greater importance or significance. A review of the meaning of various gestures and practices can help us have a deeper appreciation for what we do.

There is a little prayer that goes with the three crosses before the Gospel: "May the words of the Holy Gospel be on my mind, on my lips and in my heart." In standing to hear the Gospel, we acknowledge that Jesus is present, and the words of the Gospel are addressed to us. All of the gestures and special postures we adopt before the Gospel are intended to help us prepare for hearing the Word as well as act on it. The incense, the Alleluia, the deacon or priest, and the special dialogue and announcement that introduces the Gospel help us focus our attention on the Good News we are about to hear. The three signs of the cross show our desire and good intention to hear and live the Gospel.

medieval papacy and Apostle of the English, Saint Gregory was proclaimed Pope by acclamation in 590. Although he was reluctant to assume this post, preferring the cloistered life, his accomplishments were many. He was an extremely capable manager of Church estates and tenants and is known for his reform of the liturgy. He was instrumental in the consolidation of papal power and led the fight against the many heresies promoted by small Christian groups at the time. Through his prolific correspondence he oversaw monastic life, curtailing the power of grasping bishops, correcting abuses, and enforcing discipline. He was particularly concerned with the conversion of England, sending 40 monks from his monastery including Saint Augustine of Canterbury to evangelize there.

Saint Gregory died in 604 and was sainted immediately. He is one of four key doctors of the Western Church, including Saints Augustine, Ambrose, and Jerome.




