

Inspiration for the week

It all really boils down to a matter of the heart, and actions do speak louder than words. We cannot hide from the truth. A problem with religion is that it is possible for someone to make everything appear to be right when actually it is not. We can say all of the right prayers, perform all of the proscribed rituals, claim that we adhere to orthodox doctrines and still lead a distorted, empty and sometimes pitiful life. Only actions springing from true and deep sacrifice demonstrate true integrity. Without sacrifice, even the noblest looking actions can amount to nothing. It is no wonder, then, that the widow who contributed from her poverty received great admiration from Jesus. While it may not always appear to be the case, God has a special care and regard for those who depend upon him in times of trouble and want. Only the person who is truly poor is the only one who can see this. Because of a lack of trust, the one who has much is afraid to take a risk and sees only what they possess as their only security.



SAINT OF THE WEEK

You may recognize the name St. Frances Xavier Cabrini (1850 – 1917) as the first United States citizen to become a saint. Known for her deep trust in God, she was a courageous woman doing the work of Christ.

Her life of service began when she was first refused admission to the religious order which had educated her to be a teacher. Not one to take things face value, she instead focused her charitable work at the House of Providence Orphanage in Cadogno, Italy, and in 1877, professed vows there and took the religious habit.

When the bishop closed the orphanage in 1880, he named St. Frances Xavier Cabrini prioress of the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart. However, she had a dream she was determined to fulfill. Since her early childhood, she had dreamed of being a missionary in China. Pope Leo XIII, however, urged her to see the need in the west. She traveled with six of her fellow religious sisters to New York City, where they worked with the thousands of Italian immigrants residing there.

Although she experienced many disappointments during this time, she persevered. When she arrived in New York, the house intended to be her first orphanage in the United States was not available. Rather than come back to Italy and the order she oversaw, she instead found a way to establish that orphanage elsewhere — plus a few more. Throughout her life, she is known for founding 67 institutions dedicated to caring for the poor, the abandoned, the uneducated, and the sick. She died of malaria in her own Columbus Hospital in Chicago in 1917.

A Note from the Pastor... Fr. Roy Horníng

Here is a short recap of the last two Sunday's homilies. The godlessness and the great falling away from the faith experienced in the Catholic Church and Protestant denominations is a result our fallenness and the worldliness, materialism, consumerism, etc. of our times. The point was that modern technology (television, internet, social media, etc.) is saturating our waking hours with worldly values and messages that are contrary to our Catholic faith. These cultural and worldly values are having influence on all of us, especially those under 40 years of age who were inundated with this messaging during their formative years; pre-teen, teen and young adulthood. How can we, the Church, respond to this cultural crisis? First, we must raise awareness of the powerful influence of media (especially marketing and advertising) on our values and behavior. Second, how do we as believers counter this influence? I propose three things: 1) Living lives rooted in Virtue. 2) Consciously keep Jesus and the Kingdom of Heaven constantly before our eyes. 3) Remain in and with Jesus through prayer, the Sacraments, devotions, and spiritual reading.

There is no holiness without virtue. Jesus told his disciples and us, "*Be holy as your heavenly Father is holy.*" Virtue is the foundation on which we can stay rooted in Christ. The Theological Virtues are faith, hope and charity (love) and are gifts from God for which we must pray for an increase. The Cardinal Virtues are prudence, justice, fortitude and temperance. These are the human virtues which we can increase by their practice until they become habits. Jesus is the embodiment of these virtues and taught them in his Sermon on the Mount; the Beattitudes are the virtues lived out in our daily lives. I will put an excerpt from the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* on a different virtue each week for our review. I encourage you to read them and reflect on them asking for insight from God on how they will help us grow in our relationship with God and our neighbor.

St. Ignatius of Loyola had one over-arching imperative for the Jesuits: *Always keep Jesus before your eyes.* What Ignatius meant by this was to keep Jesus on our mind throughout our waking hours. He understood that we will come to desire what is before our eyes, and that our desire will increase until the only thing that will satisfy us is to possess what we desire. Constantly keeping Jesus before our eyes will increase our desire for Him; until being with him forever in the Kingdom of Heaven becomes the whole goal of earthly lives. As our desire for Jesus grows, he will increase our capacity to receive his love. This grace will be like putting fertilizer on our flowers and garden, our whole lives will bloom and bear fruit in abundance; every relationship we have will grow and be mutually life-giving. The Kingdom of Heaven not only becomes a reward for a life lived in faith, but it also bears an abundance of life to our short time in this world.

A life lived in pursuit of Jesus begins with the basic fundamentals of the faith. We must have a disciplined and consistent life of prayer, spending time each day talking to and listening to the Lord. We will only know His voice if we spend time with Him. The Sacraments are the visible signs of the hidden reality of our salvation in Christ. The seven sacraments are the signs and instruments by which the Holy Spirit makes Jesus present to his people. We encounter Jesus in and through the sacraments. **Devotions** play a significant role in the lives of the saints. A common theme to their holy lives were spiritual practices that kept their minds on Jesus and the mystery of our salvation in Christ. The Rosary, the Divine Mercy Chaplet, the Stations of the Cross, Holy Hours, etc. keep us mentally and spiritually connected throughout the week to One who loves us. Spiritual reading fosters desire and instruction in the faith. The New and Old Testament are filled with the accounts of what God has done on our behalf. The wisdom and assurances of faith contained and transmitted to us in the Sacred Scripture remind us of the goodness and providence of God in our lives. The writings and lives of the Saints themselves inspire and encourage us to persevere in faith; their words and teaching help to guide our footsteps on the path of holiness.

These are perilous times for the Church. The Enemy (the flesh, the world, and the devil) has never been stronger or more filled with pride. It is pride that led to Satan's fall, and it was his seduction that led to Adam and Eve's Fall in the Garden. Humility before God and man is the appropriate response to these challenging times. These three proposals (virtue, Jesus and the Kingdom of Heaven, and lives rooted in prayer, the Sacraments, devotions and spiritual reading) set the table for the mysterious interaction of God's grace and our cooperation that is the eternal life that Jesus has promised to those who trust and believe in Him. They are his gifts to us that ultimately lead us back to Him. Let us be on our way
