

LIVE THE LITURGY

Inspiration for the week

Any human success requires vigilance. Opportunities and powerful moments of encounter can easily be missed when we are not attentive. It is all too easy today to live distracted and preoccupied lives. There is so much vying for our attention that it can be hard to be selective and really focus. Caught up in this whirlwind of busyness and anxiety, we become tired and almost sleepwalk through life. Advent is a time to selectively focus. These beautiful four short weeks are a time to look backward and forward and be attentive to the human journey and God's revelation. From the beginning of time, God has been seeking our attention. He constantly reminds us of the justice he desires to bring and the promise of his abiding unconditional love. Understanding and growing in these truths requires alertness so that we can be strengthened in our faith and prepared for whatever will come.



SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. John Damascene (676 -749) was the son of the chief of the revenue department in the city of Damascus. Through his father, he received a classical and theological education and attempted to follow in his footsteps by serving in a government position. However, the Lord was calling him to a different life, and a few years later he resigned from his position and went to the Monastery of St. Sabas, where he wrote books and composed hymns along with his adopted brother, Cosmas.

St. John Damascene is best known for his writings against the iconoclasts, who opposed the veneration of images; his treatise, Exposition of the Orthodox Faith, a summary of the Greek Fathers; and his work as a poet, one of the two greatest of the Eastern Church. His devotion to the Blessed Mother and his sermons on her feasts are well known.



NOTES FROM THE PASTOR... Fr. Roy Horning

The 1st Sunday of Advent has arrived! Advent is a season of joyful expectation and has a two-fold character: First, we look forward to celebrating the birth of our Lord Jesus on December 25th and secondly, we prepare for his glorious Second Coming at the end of time. How should we prepare for these two great events in human history? The culture has certainly influenced how Catholics celebrate Christmas. The world places emphasis on the gift giving and the economic stimulus that results, while often forgetting the Savior for whom the season is named. The birth of Jesus in Bethlehem can get lost in all the seasonal activities of family gatherings, office parties, etc. In a largely secularized society the spiritual dimensions of this feast are sadly overlooked or completely replaced sentimental feelings of Christmas' past. Charles Schultz noticed this in the 1960's and made the *Charlie Brown Christmas Special* in 1965, to remind a prosperous people what they were truly celebrating. The famous ending with Linus reciting the Christmas story of the birth of Jesus was perfection; it was the essence of how to evangelize and share the real meaning of Christmas. I believe that this simple formula and explanation for all the festivities is still timely. God became flesh and dwelt among us! The King of kings and Lord of lord's was born in a stable, in a backwater province of the Roman Empire, witnessed by a few animals with Mary and Joseph. The angels announced the good news of glad tidings to shepherds in the nearby fields tending their flocks. No gift that one may buy and wrap for a loved one, can compare to the gift that God the Father gave to the world on that night.

Christians around the world can point to this truth by simply celebrating the real meaning of Christmas. Christmas is a shortened abbreviation of *The Nativity of the Lord Jesus Christ* whose birth we celebrate with Christ's Mass; this Holy Day is far more than a secular holiday. Our celebration of Jesus' birth is truly the reason for the season. These are familiar clichés that convey the truth of our joyous celebration. Our Lord was under no illusion about humanity's weakness and short attention span, so what we have now is no surprise to Him. This is why he told his disciples that they were to be salt, light, and yeast in the world. It only takes a little salt to add flavor to a soup, a little yeast causes the whole loaf to rise, and a match struck on a clear night in the desert can be seen miles away from an elevated mountain top. So too, the joyous celebration of Christmas by one disciple can change how a family experiences a Christmas gathering. A Yule Log or Christmas wreath with three purple candles and one pink candle can convey the Advent Season. A Nativity set with an elaborate array of animals, wise men, angels with Mary, Joseph and the baby Jesus, or just a simple manger with the infant Jesus surrounded by Mary and Joseph points to the true meaning of Christmas. God became Incarnate, and was born in humble surroundings to bring salvation to men and women of goodwill. It is a message of love and hope for sinners.

The First Coming was a hidden mystery concealed by Divine Providence from the eyes of almost all of humanity. The Second Coming will happen with Jesus coming enthroned on the clouds in glory, with legions of angels and trumpets announcing his return. All humanity will see the Glorious Second Coming, and his followers will rejoice as they see their salvation with their own eyes. The first coming was mysterious in its almost hidden silence and the Second Coming will mysteriously be seen by all. Both speak eloquently of the divine mystery that is God. Some see God's presence in every moment, while others cannot perceive his presence at all. This is because we live in the era of faith. Faith perceives what the eyes cannot see, but in the Second Coming we will be in the eternal moment of Truth; every eye will see clearly the spiritual reality that our faith proclaims. All will see the truth of God's words to Moses when he asked, 'Who shall I say sent me? Tell them I AM WHO I AM has sent me to you.' The coming of the Lord will be a great and terrible day for humanity. Great for those who longed for his coming, and terrible for those who were spiritually blind and indifferent. We must take our lead from the example of John the Baptist and prepare the way of the Lord. Giving people the reason for our hope. God desires that all be saved and experience the healing power of his merciful love. In Christ all will be saved, but apart from Him all will be lost. Let us share the Good News of his birth and the message of Divine Mercy for those who love and know Him. The Church at her best is always a light shining in the darkness, so too may our lives reflect the Light of Christ during this Advent and every season that follows.
