

We are all works in progress and we all come from homes that are broken by imperfection. In whatever life brings us and in whatever family we find ourselves, may the promptings we feel toward faith and hope lead us to greater love.



SAINT OF THE WEEK

The Acts of the Apostles tells the story of St. Stephen, the first Christian martyr. A man filled with grace and power, he worked great wonders among the people. Some Jews debated with St. Stephen but could not match his wisdom and spirit. Eventually, a charge of blasphemy was brought up against him, and the local population demanded that he be tried and sentenced. He was seized and carried before the Sanhedrin.

Despite the danger he faced, in front of the Sanhedrin and his accusers, St. Stephen gave a long speech about the history of Israel and the blessings that God had given upon His chosen people. He talked about how Israel had become disobedient despite God's abundant mercy. This enraged his accusers, and eventually the crowd dragged him out of the city and stoned him to death.

Even in his final moments, St. Stephen displayed great forgiveness and even asked God not to hold the sins of his attackers against them. Hundreds of years after his death, he is still a role model for us to follow.



NOTES FROM THE PASTOR... Fr. Roy Horning

On behalf of St. Mary's and Holy Rosary staff and myself, I want to wish you and your family a Blessed Christmas and a joyous New Year. The Christmas proclamation is a timely and much needed message of hope and assurance in these challenging times. The angel said to them, "Do not be afraid: for behold, I proclaim to you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For today in the city of David a savior has been born for you who is Christ and Lord. And this will be the sign for you: you will find an infant wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger. And suddenly there was a multitude of the heavenly host with the angel, praising God and saying: "Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests." As we come to the end of 2021 and enter a new year that will undoubtedly have its own challenges, these are words of comfort and quiet assurance that God is with us. Bishop Gregory Mansour, (Holy Rosary Class of 1973) celebrated Mass at Holy Rosary on the first weekend of Advent. His message was one of encouragement and a reminder of God's true nature. The Son of God took flesh and became like us in all things but sin with a mission. He came to "heal the sick and brokenhearted, forgive sin, and to redeem all creation." This is something we can easily lose sight of.

It seems that we often fall prey to the lie that God will judge and condemn us for our sinfulness. There is truth in this lie; the truth is that God will indeed judge sin at the final judgement. Justice demands that sin be condemned, but that does not mean that sinners will collectively be condemned because in our weakness and fallen condition we have sinned. Remember, through baptism into Christ Jesus, we have become adopted Sons and Daughters of God and have received the gift of the Holy Spirit. It is not our sins that make us sinners, rather it is because we all bear the wound of the original sin of Adam and Eve. You and I are not the sum of our sins. We were created good and for those who love God there is forgiveness of sins through Jesus' blood. The Christmas proclamation is one of hope, restoration, and life for all people...it is Good News! Fast forward to Jesus' resurrection appearance to his apostles in the Upper Room. His first words were "Peace be with you!" and again he said, "Peace be with you! As the Father has sent me, I am sending you." And with that he breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive anyone his sins, they are forgiven" (John 19 -23). Jesus accomplished what he came to do: to take the punishment for our sins upon himself, and to die our death in order that we might share in his life. God desires that no one perish, he is the God of mercy and salvation.

St. Anselm gave a beautiful sermon that was in the Office of Readings from the *Liturgy of the Hours* on the Feast of the Immaculate Conception. Here are his profound words: "For God begot the Son, through whom all things were made, and Mary gave birth to him as Savior of the world. Without God's Son, nothing could exist; without Mary's Son, nothing could be redeemed." Likewise, St. Peter Chrysologus (c. 380- c.450) Bishop of Ravenna and Doctor of the Church wrote: "When God saw the world falling to ruin because of fear, he immediately acted to call it back to himself with love. He invited it by his grace, preserved it by his love, and embraced it with compassion." Is this not the message of Christmas? This is the work that Jesus would accomplish through his life, death and resurrection. On this Feast of the Nativity of the Lord, we should marvel and wonder at the infinite and gracious love revealed to us in the infant wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger. The Eternal Word and Son of God is the love of God incarnate, whom St. John the Evangelist tells us: That which was from the beginning, which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we have looked at and our hands have touched—this we proclaim concerning the Word of life. The life appeared; we have seen it and testify to it, and we proclaim to the eternal life, which was with the Father and has appeared to us. We proclaim to you what we have seen and heard, so that you may have fellowship with us. And our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son, Jesus Christ. We write this to make our joy complete (1John 1-4). Gazing at Jesus in the manger is it any wonder that as we look upon Love Incarnate that we respond with love and awesome wonder? May your Christmas Season be filled many graces and every spiritual blessing.






My daughter, love has brought Me here, and love keeps Me here. My daughter, if you knew what great merit and reward is earned by one act of pure love for Me, you would die of joy.

The Theological Virtues

The human virtues are rooted in the theological virtues, which adapt man's faculties for participation n the divine nature: for the theological virtues relate directly to God. They dispose Christians to live in a relationship with the Holy Trinity. They have the One and Triune God for their origin, motive, and object.

The theological virtues are the foundation of Christian moral activity; they animate it and give it its special character. They inform and give life to all the moral virtues. They are infused by God into the souls of the faithful to make them capable of acting as his children and of meriting eternal life. They are the pledge of the presence and action of the Holy Spirit in the faculties of the human being. There are three theological virtues: faith, hope and charity.
