

LIVE THE LITURGY

Inspiration for the week

Human beings did not come to believe in God just because of someone's private testimony about him. Rather, belief in God became real when human beings understood that all of human history is being guided and lead, kept and sustained by a God who is incredibly in love with all that he has made. It is this realization that leads us to thanksgiving and gratitude for the one who gives us "this land flowing with milk and honey." It also leads us to adoration and worship as we continue to see the creative power of God's presence in all of the events of our lives. The Church stands as a living witness to all of these things and calls us this Lent to reflect and remember. There is a great temptation for human beings to leave the truth of who they are, where they came from and who created them. Falling into this temptation we cease giving thanks to and worshipping our Creator as we pursue our own self-sufficiency, power, and prestige. While having more may seem better, the only thing we really need more of is love. This fortifies us and keeps us from falling.



SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Catherine of Bologna (September 8, 1413 – March 9, 1463) came from an upper-class family in Ferrara, a city in Italy, and received an education at the court, where she learned reading, writing, singing and drawing. But despite her advantages, her heart yearned for God.

She joined a group of religious women in Ferrara at the age of 18. Four years later, that same group joined the Poor Clares, an order founded by St. Francis and St. Clare of Assisi. In 1456, she and 15 other sisters were sent to establish a Poor Clare monastery in Florence.

As abbess, St. Catherine of Bologna worked to establish the new community and maintain a semblance of peace throughout. She was a model of piety and reported experiencing miracles and several visions of Christ, and the Virgin Mary.

In 1463, St. Catherine of Bologna became seriously ill, and she passed away. She was buried without a coffin and her body was exhumed 18 days later because of many cures attributed to her at her graveside and the sweet scent coming from her grave. Her body was discovered incorrupt (meaning it was not decaying) and remains so today.



NOTES FROM THE PASTOR... Fr. Roy Horning

As you I announced several weeks ago, the Church has started a process of listening to active Catholics, lapsed Catholics, and also those with no religious affiliation in preparation for the 2023 Synod of Bishops in Rome. Dioceses around the world are preparing for this in different ways depending on their culture and the unique characteristics of their local Church. One of my classmates shared a "gem" from one of his parish gatherings. It was a quote from the meeting notes that stated 'Church doesn't fit my lifestyle.' Now I don't want to rush to judgement on the spiritual life of the individual quoted, because I don't know whether it was their thought, or whether they were simply conveying what someone else had stated. Pope Francis and Bishop Boyea both emphasized that the synodal process is about listening to our neighbor and discerning how the Church can effectively engage our brothers and sisters with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. This being said, the phrase is very telling of our generation and needs to be examined. On the surface the statement reflects a lack of understanding of the Catholic faith, but at a deeper level there is a lack of understanding in what it means to be truly human. The Church has been very effective in conveying her teachings on sexual morality and the value of life; but the quote above shows that we have missed the boat on a far more serious sin. Pride is the one sin we rarely if ever talk about from the pulpit, yet it is the sin that does the most destruction to the image of God in each of us. The 'quote' taken by itself indicates the prideful folly of idolatry of the self; we see ourselves as god unto ourselves. The Church gives us the great Season of Lent to examine our lives in the light of Truth, that we may become more and more the human creature made in the image and likeness of God.

Lent is a period of spiritual reform and renewal. It challenges us to examine our lives in the light of Christ; who is the Way, and the Truth, and the Life. Fundamentally, we should be asking the important questions of what it means to be human, what is the purpose of our lives, and what is the ultimate goal of our lives. The book of Genesis tells the origins of man and creation. Embedded in the account of Adam and Eve is the truth that we are made for relationship. Relationship with God and with our fellow human beings. Our Catholic faith is fundamentally about the restoration of our relationship with God the Father, through his Son, in the power of the Holy Spirit. Our restored relationship with God leads to right relationship with our neighbors. The teachings of Jesus and his Church provide us with the template for the life changing renewal and reform of our lives. Jesus is the divine physician, who in himself is the remedy for the wound of original sin. The Church is his chosen instrument to bring sinners into an intimate encounter with himself. In the proclamation of his Word and the celebration of the Sacraments God is truly present to his people. It is through Christ's presence in the sacraments that we encounter Him in the new life of grace. He is the Lover that seeks out his beloved, bestowing himself as gift upon mysterious gift to those who respond to his love. As we encounter Him, we are transformed and experience the life-giving process of conversion and the renewal of our souls.

In his Gospel, St. Luke presents Jesus to his audience as the Divine Healer. In Chapter Five, Luke tells the story of the calling of Levi the tax collector. Levi gave a great banquet for Jesus in his home, in which many tax collectors and others were in attendance. The Pharisees and their scribes complained to his disciples, saying, "Why do you eat and drink with tax collectors and sinners?" Jesus said to them in reply, "Those who are healthy do not need a physician, but the sick do. I have not come to call the righteous to repentance but sinners." Jesus came to heal the sick. We can live in denial about our brokenness and our need for repentance, but I don't believe anyone will deny that they have sinned. Pride is the root of all sin. We sin willfully, in ignorance, and sometimes unwittingly...but the fact is that you and I sin. Remember it is not the fact that we sin that makes us a sinner, rather it is because we are sinners--that we sin. One could say the same about what makes us male and female. We are human, and human beings are either male or female and our physical anatomy attests to this truth. The Story of Salvation concludes with the complete restoration and elevation of those who love God to the Kingdom of Heaven. This was and is the purpose of the Incarnation of the Son of God. He died our death in order to conquer sin and death in his Resurrection. In Christ, we too will conquer sin and death; living in and with God for all eternity. The Church exists to proclaim and live lives of faith that bear witness to Jesus Christ. To state that the 'Church doesn't fit my lifestyle', is to say unwittingly "I'm already dead and there is nothing I can do about it." And they would be right! Only God can save us, and the Good News is that he has already done it for those who trust and believe in Him. Without the Church how would any of us or anyone else know this incredible truth?


