Notes from the Pastor... Fr. Roy Horníng

These are interesting and spiritually challenging times in which we live. The Lord is active and doing incredible things in the lives of disciples. It is clear that the fountain of his mercies are being poured out on those who are open to receiving his love. His grace is working in individuals to build up the Body of Christ in faith, hope and charity. In reality there is nothing extraordinary in this, rather it is the ordinary way that the Church has been built-up and renewed down through the two centuries since Pentecost. Prayer, the Sacraments, devotions and communal life are the ordinary means of growing in faith and sanctity. But, due to the lack of formation in the faith in the lives of God's people, coupled with all the distractions of modern life, and the activities of the powers of darkness many within the Church and outside of the Church, do not understand some of the basics about living a life of faith. Our generation is much like that of Jesus' own generation, in that many are looking for miracles rather than looking for God in the ordinary events of our lives. This has sadly always been the case, but it seems more pressing in our age. Understandably so, as this is the historical moment for which we were created by God to live. A power outage, a forest fire, or a once in 1000-year flood is felt more acutely by those who find themselves affected by these types of events, than by those who blessedly are not in the crucible of these kinds of trials or tribulations.

So, what exactly does the Church mean when she says we are to live by faith? *The Catechism of the Catholic Church* states that faith is both a gift and a human act by which the believer gives personal adherence to God who invites his or her response, and freely assents to the whole truth that God has revealed. It is this revelation of God which the Church proposes for our belief, and which we profess in the Creed, celebrate in the sacraments, live by right conduct that fulfills the twofold commandment of love: to love God with all our heart and our neighbor as ourselves. I firmly believe that most active Catholics desire to live lives in accord with the teachings of Jesus and belief in Him for the salvation of our souls. Lives lived in such a manner reveal the light of Christ and shed his light and love to all the ends of the earth. Thus, fulfilling Isaiah's prophetic words in this Sunday's first reading. St. Paul reminds the Corinthian Church of these same truths when he writes: *You have been sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be holy, with all those who call upon the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, their Lord and ours.*

St. Augustine had to remind the people in his time of these same truths. He wrote: '*The fool says in his heart there is no God.*' Few men would actually say this, but consider the crowd of evil-doers, people lost to shame, and the Christians living among them who are afraid to speak out and correct them lest the voice of the virtuous be drowned by the cries of the wicked. (In modern times to be "canceled" by the popular culture). If you say in your heart, 'Oh well, God takes wickedness for granted', it is tantamount to saying, 'There is no God', for wickedness offends him, since if he exists he is righteous."

"Scripture (which cannot err) says Christ will come to judge the world—but evil-doers say, 'He will come to forgive us all, it's not true that he will say to us: "Go into the everlasting fire prepared for the devil and his angels." Brethren, how can this be? It is a lie. It is saying, 'There is no God'. Take care to hold on to the truth, for he is a righteous God. You may say, 'I am no thief', 'I am not and adulterer', but if you count such among your friends, if you take pleasure in their life style even if you don't share in it, you are taking part in their deeds. When you know of evil, and far from blaming it you compound it by saying nothing, so as to not give offence, "wickedness and deceit are on your lips."

Augustine's point is that we are called on to live lives of faith that bear witness to the Lord Jesus, who is Truth incarnate. We do not need to be afraid of the world, or those who have chosen themselves to be arbiters of the what is good or evil. Our faith is in God and the fulness of his self-revelation revelation in Jesus Christ. As Jesus reminded Philip, "Anyone who has seen me has seen the Father." The miracles that he worked testified to the truth of his statement. Jesus promises us that "whoever has my commands and obeys them, he is the one who loves me. He who loves me will be loved by my Father, and I too will love him and show myself to him." An old adage seems fitting, "the proof is in the pudding." In other words, things must be judged by trying them ourselves to determine whether they are true and of value. Two Thousand years of Christian experience and the lives of the saints testify to the power of faith to change lives and the world in which we live. Let us endeavor to live lives of faith boldly and courageously for our good and the glory of God.
