Notes from the Pastor... Fr. Roy Horníng

The first reading from the Book of Sirach speaks to the incredible gift of freedom that God has given to every human being. "If you choose you can keep the commandments, they will save you; if you trust in God, you too shall live; he has set before you fire and water; to whichever you choose, stretch forth your hand. Before man are life and death, good and evil, whichever he chooses shall be given him. Immense is the wisdom of the Lord; he is mighty in power, and all-seeing. The eyes of God are on those who fear him; he understands man's every deed. No one does he command to act unjustly, to none does he give the license to sin." There it is, you and I get to choose where we will spend eternity. If we choose to obey God's commandments and trust in him; we shall live. In Christ Jesus, we recognize the fulfilment of this promise. However, let us not deceive ourselves about sin and its consequences; if we choose evil we will have death. No one is given the license (actions without consequence) to sin. When we stand before the Just Judge, we will see ourselves as we truly are; and our actions for what they truly were. No deception, no self-deceiving, no denial...we will see ourselves in light of Truth; we will know to the core of our being what we chose; life or death.

The question is 'What we are willing to sacrifice in order to have life in its fullness?' We have to choose between the desires of flesh and those of the spirit. The flesh wants comfort, pleasure, and self-indulgence. The spirit/soul desires and seeks spiritual goods that will never pass away; and is willing to sacrifice and practice self-denial to attain them. However, the wound of original sin has introduced disorder into our lives. The soul animates the body in this world. But, original sin has wounded our intellect and far too often the desires of the flesh overwhelm our reason and the spirit. Throw in the influence of a fallen world and the temptations of the devil, and quite easily reason can and will make an erroneous decision; choosing evil because it is perceived as a good. The will acts in accord with the intellect (our reason) and is unaware of error in our judgement. These actions are often times sinful; wounding the soul and alienating us from God. Sin weakens our conscience and over time we become less sensitive to sin and its consequences; this becomes the hardened heart so often spoken of in the scriptures. We can avoid this by disciplining the flesh and denying its desires. Not just the excesses, but in ordinary everyday things that are good for us. Food is good for us, as it is eaten and converted into energy. Fasting, mortification, abstinence, and silence strengthen the spirit; and the soul becomes stronger in its pursuit of spiritual goods. As the flesh becomes accustomed to discipline and sacrifice it becomes less assertive in seeking immediate gratification of its self-indulgent desires. In fact, it will want to engage in the battle to attain spiritual goods and their rewards. The last thing the flesh wants is to die. Discipline leads to perseverance, and perseverance to godliness. Once enlisted and trained in the rewards of sacrifice and self-denial, the flesh can become armor in the spiritual battle against temptation. Body and soul working together to attain spiritual goods, while always cooperating with God's grace leads to fullness of life.

St. Paul attests to the fullness of life that awaits the faithful in Christ. He writes to the Church in Corinth: "We speak God's wisdom, mysterious, hidden, which God predetermined before the ages for our glory...As it is written: What eye has not seen, and ear has not heard, and what has not entered the human heart, what God has prepared for those who love him, this God has revealed to us through the Spirit." Paul sees that the rewards for those who have faith in Christ exceeds even the life promised to those who choose to keep God's commandments. Indeed, keeping God's commandments is embodied in Jesus' two Great Commandments; love God with all your heart, all your soul and all your strength, and love your neighbor as yourself. The problem is that sinner's sin, and all fall short of the glory of God. Yet, God in his infinite love and mercy not only redeems us through his Son's passion, death and resurrection but raises us higher than the paradise from which we fell. The love and goodness of God exceeds anything that man can imagine; He freely pours it out upon those who love him. As we prepare for the great season of Lent, let us examine our lives in light of the readings from the Book of Sirach and look for the evidence that we indeed love God with faithfulness and fidelity.

Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

It's often said that the Catholic Church lays heavy rules on her members, rules that can almost seem impossible. Mass every Sunday? No lying ever? Sexual purity all the time? I recently said to some non-Catholic friends that more than fifty adults were baptized at my parish at the Easter Vigil. One responded spontaneously with shock, "Why would anyone do that?" In other words, why would someone willingly place themselves in a system with such demanding and rigorous rules?

Of course, no one in the history of religions is more demanding and rigorous than Jesus himself. In the Sermon on the Mount, he says you have to be holier than pharisees or you're out. He says if you call someone a fool, you go to fiery Gehenna. He says you can't even look at a woman with lust or you're guilty of adultery (which was punishable by death). To top it all off, he says you can't even get divorced and re-married. Doesn't he know these are basically impossible demands? What world is he living in?

The new one, actually. He is the new world. Jesus' words aren't meant to condemn. They are meant to signal something new, a restored humanity. Jesus doesn't just give external laws; he gives us his Holy Spirit to internalize the law through love. He wants to fill us with his love. That's what the Church exists to do. Love demands extraordinary things. The "demands" of the Church only make sense because she is filled with Jesus' love. That wildly demanding love is why we are Catholic. — Father John Muir
