Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Of all Jesus' miracles, the most unsettling might be when he made a dead person alive. We know of three times when he did so: a girl, a young man, and Lazarus. The miracle teaches us he has the power of life and death. He anticipates his resurrection. Sin hurts us. Some sin kills us, spiritually. The three miracles reveal to us that no matter our circumstances, Jesus can give life to us.

The three miracles are instructive of the three ways we feel dead. The little dead girl symbolizes sin before it has time to mature. She's in bed and, once alive, gets right back to her life. The young man is lying in his casket in a funeral procession. This is sin allowed to fester, to grow and become somewhat normalized. Once raised, he has a short walk back home. Lazarus, a full-grown dead man, lies wrapped in burial bands in the tomb. Once he is raised, much needs to be done. He'll need to remove those bands, find new clothes, and travel all the way back home. That is sin allowed to go all the way, unchecked for months or years. It's the most spectacular of the three and reveals Jesus' glory more than the others.

What hope that should give us, for us and those whom we love! Jesus knows our sin hurts us and can even kill us spiritually. No matter the extent of the damage, he is always ready for the miracle of making the dead fully alive.

Notes from the Pastor... Fr. Roy Horning

There is a passage from the Book of Judges that was on my flip calendar for March 12th that is very timely. I've been using this same calendar for 23 years; it has a scripture quote and short reflection each day. Over the years I have added friend's birthdays and anniversaries, as well as the day a friend or family member died with the year. The quote for the 12th was "In those days there was no king in Israel; every man did that which was right in his own eyes (Judges 17:6)." The Book of Judges recounts the chaos and idolatry that became part of Israel's history as successive generations became more and more historically distant from the events of the Exodus. God's chosen people had entered the promise land under Joshua's leadership, however they frequently did not do as God had commanded them. Living amongst people who did not know the God of Israel, and inter-marrying with them inevitably led to the worship of foreign gods and the practice of false religions. No longer strongly united by the Mosaic Covenant, the twelve tribes were often victims of neighboring tribes/city states looting and pillaging their cities and lands following the harvest season. The author of Judges points to the people's lack of obedience to the covenant as the cause of their chastisement. Hardship and suffering would increase until it became unbearable and the people would cry out to God for deliverance. In response, God would raise up judges (Gideon, Jephthah, Samson, etc.) to lead his people and deliver them from their adversaries. This was the Israel's history over 300 years leading up to the time of the Kings which began around 1050 BC. Three times the author of Judges states that these things happened because 'every man doing what was right in his own eyes.'

This is the story of our time as well. There was a time not long ago that the Western world was known as the Christian West. The worldview and moral compass for ordinary families and nations was strongly influenced by the Judeo-Christian faith. Morality was firmly rooted in the Ten Commandments and the teachings of Jesus Christ. Sadly, this is no longer the case. In the United Kingdom less than half the people identify as Christian. The practice of religion has declined precipitously in the United States to the point that one-third of people under 40 years of age self-identify as "nones", meaning no religious affiliation. Without a King, we are reaping what modernity has sown. Prosperity, technology, religious indifference and the collapse of traditional families have created a spiritual wasteland. 'Every man is doing what is right in their own eyes. The result is the current culture wars and increasing violence in our schools, cities and amongst nations. The lack of a unifying set of moral values has brought us to a place in which evil is called good and good is called evil. Everything has seemingly been turned upside down. The popular mantra is 'Your truth is your truth, not my truth.' These are challenging times...the question is whether mankind will cry out to God for deliverance like the Israelites of old. There is reason to have hope: We have a King who has conquered sin and death, and Jesus continues to call sinners to life.

The Raising of Lazarus is more than the miracle of Jesus raising a dead man from the grave. There are two key moments in John's account that are applicable to this historical moment. Jesus tells Martha "I am the resurrection and the life." The truth of this statement is one of the central tenets of our Catholic faith. We see his authority and power when he cried out in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" The dead man came out, tied hand and foot with burial bands, and his face wrapped in a cloth. So, Jesus said to them, "until him and let him go." Can you see how it is applicable to our generation? Lazarus was dead and tied hand and foot by burial bands. One can say it is an image of modern man, who is spiritually dead and held in bondage by his sin. All that man needs to do is to cry out to Jesus for deliverance. And he will say "Until him and let him go." Like Lazarus, a new generation will experience a new life in Christ in this world. May our Lenten penances bring about such a rebirth and renewal in our spiritual lives!


