

Spirit-Inspired

HEN JESUS WAS GIVEN THE SCROLL of the prophet Isaiah in the synagogue of Nazareth and he read a passage of his choosing, he was really making public his mission statement.

His Spirit-inspired mission was to give an experience of God's favor to those who were most in need of it: *the poor*, be they the materially poor or the spiritually poor; *the captives*, be it those who were enslaved by their economic circumstances or enslaved by a way of life that was contrary to God's will for them; *the blind*, be it the physically blind or the spiritually blind. He intentionally chose that passage to read in that synagogue. Jesus is up to something.

The Spirit of the Lord is upon him, the same Spirit that descended upon him at his baptism, that filled and led him in the wilderness, and with which he returned to Galilee. Something is stirring within him.

And he speaks to them in the town in

Jesus is naming what God is concerned about in this world. He is naming a truth and our responsibility for bringing that truth into existence. He's describing the work and direction of his life. He's taking a stand, a very public stand.

Today's gospel (Luke 14:14-21) asks us to make a choice, to take a stand that put us in conflict and even opposition with others – ourselves, our family, our country, our religion. It is true I have some real anxiety about preaching and living the gospel. It scares and challenges me. And I don't think I am the only one. I think we all have fears and concerns about taking stand, about living the gospel.

why we usually see Jesus as being on our side, and the side of our church, our party, our country.

Jesus doesn't just preach; he deals with the situation. Jesus is trouble for the status quo and an interruption to business as usual. He did not come to bring peace but a sword (Mt. 10:34). His world is one in which the hungry are filled with good things. That's the promise within today's gospel. Jesus promises a new life and a new ordering of that life. And today we are the keepers or breakers of that promise. There is no neutral stand when it comes to Jesus.

The only question is where we stand. This is less about what we believe and more about how we live. It's about taking a position and not just asserting a proposition. That's the challenge Jesus set before the people in the synagogue. It is a challenge Jesus sets before us today. This remains Jesus' mission today. He wishes to continue to proclaim this year of God's favor through us, his followers.

In today's second reading (1 Cor 12:12-30), Paul speaks about the community of the Lord's followers, the Church, as the body of Christ. All of us together are now Christ's body in the world. The Spirit of the Lord that empowered and directed Jesus' mission has been given to us, the members of Christ's body. As Paul says at the beginning of that second reading, "In the one Spirit we were all baptized, Jews as well as Greeks, slaves as well as free, and one Spirit was given to us all to drink." The Spirit of the Lord will bring what is best in our life to full expression, and whenever that happens the poor experience good news and those who are captive discover a new freedom.

Paul reminds us in that reading that there is great diversity in the body of Christ. We each have different gifts of nature which the Spirit of God can bring to life. We each have a unique contribution to make to the Lord's mission in today's world. The Lord looks to each of us to place our gifts and our energies at his disposal, at the disposal of the Holy Spirit, so that he can continue to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor in our world today.

Dear brothers and sisters, we who worship in this church know the term "Corpus Christi." It is Latin for "Body of Christ." When we hear the term "Corpus Christi," we probably instinctively think of the Eucharist, the body of Christ that we receive in the Eucharist. The term "Corpus Christi," "Body of Christ," also refers to all of us who gather to celebrate the Eucharist, the community of the baptized. It is only when all the members of Christ's body are making the contribution that the Spirit enables them to make, that, in the words of the gospel reading, the *poor* will hear good news, *captives* will be freed, and the *blind* will receive new sight.

As Paul again says in that reading, "In the one Spirit we were all baptized, Jews as well as Greeks, slaves as well as free, and one Spirit was given to us all to drink." Let that Spirit of the Lord encourage us to stand for the values of the gospel. +
