

Don Ferenz does a cool thing

There are all kinds of ways for volunteers to help around a senior center. Don Ferenz, an outgoing regular guest at the Scottville Area Senior Center, noticed a need and filled it—much to the surprise of the SASC team.

On one of his regular visits to play cards, Don learned that the counter-top refrigerator in the room that's used for cards, quilting and pool, had broken down with a refrigeration leak. The fridge, used to hold water and soft drinks for visitors, had to be taken out of service.

A few days later, Don showed up at the center with a brand-new fridge. Nobody had asked him. He just knew it was needed and decided to do something about it. The new fridge is now keeping folks cool with chilled drinks. Now Don's going to try to repair the broken one and donate it to someone else.

Don spent most of his life in Muskegon, although he has traveled extensively. He earned his Associates Degree in Accounting from Muskegon Business College (now Baker College). That led to a 27-year career in the accounting departments of two manufacturing companies. In 1988 he decided to go independent, and bought a 300-client tax preparation business. Over the years he built up his clientele to more than 1,400 people, and also had a painting business.

While he still does taxes for about 150 clients, he decided two years ago to embark on a new life adventure. He sold his house in Muskegon and moved to our area to be with Barb Ruba. They have plans to add new travels to their experiences.

Meanwhile, Don says, "I enjoy coming to the Scottville Senior Center—there are lots of things to do. I have played cards most of my life. I play in the Tuesday euchre and Wednesday pinochle groups there."

He's also a top-flight Cribbage player. "I've also been to eight different states to play in cribbage tournaments. My biggest tournament was this past March in Reno, Nevada. There were 482 players. I finished just short of the playoffs there, but I've won one tournament and finished second twice—winning \$900 in one of those second-place finishes, out of 134 players."



"I have two great kids," Don added. "Daughter Lisa, a retired Holland police officer, lives in Las Vegas. Son Kurt lives in Beaverton, Michigan; the long summer days will give us a chance to get in nine holes of golf once in a while, after he gets out of work."

Lisa was playing golf with him when he had the shot of his life. "I had a friend who was in the hospital. I told his wife I'd hit a good shot in his honor," he remembered. "When we got to the par-three 17th hole, I said to myself: 'this one's for you.' I don't know what was guiding my swing and the ball, but everything worked. Lisa got excited, saying 'it's going toward the hole! It went in, dad!' She witnessed my only hole-in-one...so far."

At the Scottville center, we hope Don gets another. We know he's an ace.

June is World Elder Abuse Awareness month! This month works to not only to educate people on the topic of elder abuse, but to also increase reporting numbers as elder abuse is under-reported and start discussions on how to recognize and prevent this abuse. The International Network for the Prevention of Elder Abuse and the World Health Organization at the United Nations (UN) launched the first World Elder Abuse Awareness Day (WEAAD) on June 15, 2006 in an effort to unite communities around the world in raising awareness about elder abuse.

Elder abuse is widespread. Every year an estimated 5 million, or 1 in 10 older Americans are victims of elder abuse, neglect, or exploitation. And that's only part of the picture: Experts believe that elder abuse is significantly under-reported, in part because so many of our communities lack the social supports that would make it easier for those who experience abuse to report it. This is where you can help by knowing the warning signs and reporting abuse when you suspect it. When we come together, we can prevent elder abuse from happening.

Some Warning Signs of Abuse

Elder abuse includes financial abuse/scams, neglect, physical abuse, sexual abuse, and emotional abuse. Cassie Caple, Contract Administrator with the Area Agency on Aging of Western Michigan and Kent County Elder Abuse Coalition Coordinator explains a few of these warning signs. "Whether you are a professional with an older adult client, or a family member checking in on a loved one, a few physical things you can look out for include unexplained bruises, reports of recent falls, and sudden weight loss. Or if you are having a conversation and they mention something along the lines of unpaid bills, feeling lonely, or perhaps not taking their medication, these can be signs of abuse as well. So, it is really good to check in, ask what they might need, and have that heightened awareness," Cassie shares. Taking the time to intentionally check in with the older adults in your life is a great first step. It is recommended that you have this conversation with the older adult alone so they can feel safe in sharing any concerns.

Reporting Abuse

Once you are educated on what to look out for, and feel that abuse may be occurring, it is time to take action. If you have concern that an older adult in your life is not in a safe and healthy living situation, you can report this to reputable agencies. Below are a few reliable places to start:

Adult Protective Services investigators protect vulnerable adults and staff will investigate allegations within 24 hours after the report is received. APS has a 24/7 Hotline: 855-444-3911 where anyone is able to make a report.

Survivor Benefits: Four Tips Widows Need to Know

Months before the first Social Security check was issued in 1940, lawmakers made changes to the planned benefits. Instead of the retired worker's benefit ending when he died, his widow could collect a survivor benefit for her lifetime. Since then, the eligibility rules for survivors have improved. The age requirements are lower, surviving ex-spouses are eligible, including surviving spouses and partners of same-sex relationships.

One thing that hasn't changed is that the surviving spouse is often unsure how to start claiming their survivor's benefits. We have some information to assist you in applying for benefits as a surviving spouse.

If you are a widow (or your ex-spouse died), you may be eligible to receive benefits on your late spouse's, or ex-spouse's, Social Security record. How much you receive will depend on your age, the amount of benefits you may receive on your own record, and whether you have dependent children.

You may be entitled to receive a survivor's benefit under the following circumstances:

- At age 50 if you have a disability.
- At age 60 (the benefit amount will be reduced).
- At any age if you have a child under your care who is under age 16 or who became disabled before age 22.
- If you were widowed and remarried after age 60.

If you're entitled to retirement benefits – but haven't applied yet – you have an option. You can decide to apply for either the retirement or survivors benefits first. You can switch to the other (higher) benefit later.

To help make this decision, it's important to know your Full Retirement Age (FRA). Your FRA is when you can start receiving your full retirement benefit amount. For instance, if you were born between January 2, 1943 through January 1, 1955, your FRA is 66. If you start receiving benefits before your FRA, your benefits will be reduced, generally for as long as you continue to receive benefits.

There are many variables involved. <u>Contact Social Security</u> to discuss which benefit to take first – before applying for either benefit. You want to be sure you're choosing the option that best fits your financial circumstances.

All the information you need is on the <u>Social Security website</u>. You must apply for <u>survivors benefits</u> over the phone or make an appointment to apply in person. You will also need to provide certain original documents.

Local Social Security offices are helping people in person with or without an appointment. This means staff will take applications in person and they will be available to help and answer any question you may have. I encourage you to call and schedule an appointment in advance to save time and so you have all the documents we need to help you in one visit. Please share this information with your friends and family – and post it on social media.

Gardening for Fun, Flowers and Foodstuffs!

How does your garden grow?



Ours is thriving! We don't have any "silver bells and cockleshell," but we've got some fine-looking lettuce, basil, chives, lavender and flowers. And our cherry tomato plants have ripened nicely.

Here's how our back patio looked as we neared the start of July. By now, we're enjoying the recipes below, as well as grilled Romaine and other summer dishes fresh from the four raised planters.

The planters were built and the crops sowed by teams of seniors and students from the Mason County Central Schools Spartan Academy. Now we're harvesting the fruits—and veggies—of our labors.

If you have some similar plants in your garden, perhaps you'd like to try these recipes.

Caprese Salad: I use cherry tomatoes, cut in half, mozzarella balls (cut in half...or mozzarella cut into bite size pieces.

Dressing: 1/2 c lemon juice

1T thyme

2T chopped basil

1 t Dijon mustard

2 t oregano

3/4 c olive oil

Mix. Leave at room temp. Add to caprese salad. Add torn basil leaves as well.

If in a hurry, use Newman's vinaigrette.

Ask Sharon

This month I am going to write about a few things that I think will help most of you. I usually stick to one topic, so this is a change for me and for you.

- Q. What programs does the Scottville Senior Center provide?
- A. The Scottville Senior center provides transportation to medical appointments within a hundred miles, respite care to provide relief for care givers, grandparents raising grandchildren with monthly meetings, home making services and hot lunches. Call the center for information on these services. They are free or low cost
- Q. Tell me about the lunch program.
- A. Meals include a salad bar that includes Salad fixin's, fruit and often yogurt, coffee and milk. Tasty meals made by MCC's senior meals cook are served. You'll find the menu at the beginning of the newsletter. The cost is just three dollars (\$3.00). Which is a real bargain.
- Q. I know a lot of people are raising grandkids or other young family members who would benefit from a support group to exchange ideas and problem solve. When does the group you mentioned meet?
- A. This group meets the third Wednesday of the month at 5:30, at the senior center. Dinner is provided and there are activities for children. There is no meeting in July, but the group will continue as usual in August. Please call the Scottville Senior Center for more information.
- Q. Are there any new scams we should be aware of?
- A. I know this won't apply to many of you, but if you have family or friends with babies who rely on formula please pass this along. Online scams are popping up and tricking desperate parents and caregivers into paying high prices for formula that never arrives. Please check into any site before you order anything online.

Remember the Senior Centers are open daily to help seniors maintain their independence. Someone will be able to help you if you call or come in. Or if you are tired of being alone stop in (wearing a mask or not), have a conversation and a cup of coffee or join us in our activities. YOU ARE ALWAYS WELCOME!
