Greetings!

As we celebrate the 4th Sunday of Advent with only a few days left before Christmas, how are you feeling? Many of us, myself included, can allow ourselves to get caught up in trying to make Christmas as perfect as we envision it, to the stress of not quite meeting those expectations we put on ourselves. Add in Covid-19 and trying to perhaps simplify our plans—foregoing the big gatherings of family & friends, and instead, choosing to celebrate only with those we live with. Or perhaps you have lost a friend or family member to Covid-19 or something else this year? One thing is for sure: Christmas 2020 will be different than any other Christmas in our lives. And many people feel particularly stressed out or are in pain.

A few years ago, the Catholic Review, the official publication of the Archdiocese of Baltimore, posted an article entitled, "Control holiday stress by emphasizing what Matters." The article shares advice from Fr. Frank Donio, S.A.C. Fr. Donio focuses on four key concepts: seeking, experiencing, thanking, and hoping.

What are we seeking? What do we want, where have we been, where do we want to go and where is God in that? How do we see God's presence in that? We can cope by seeking God's presence in our lives.

When it comes to experiencing the holidays and the people we see (even if on Zoom or Skype), are we engaging them in a non-anxious way? How do we experience God in everyday moments of life?

How are we in thanksgiving to God for what we do have? Fr. Donio through his ministry has seen people in all types of crisis, but no matter how bad things were, a person always had some aspect of life they could be thankful for.

Fr. Donio has given a number of talks on hope, and says, "the self-defeating piece, the thing I see often is people don't see how much God is actually present in their lives. We don't see where God is answering because we're not aware, we're not in that mode of seeking..."

ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

4th Sunday of Advent

In Blaise Pascal's work, *Pensees*, he says: "What else does this craving, and this helplessness, proclaim but that there was once in man a true happiness, of which all that now remains is the empty print and trace? This he tries in vain to fill with everything around him, seeking in things that are not there the help he cannot find in those that are, though none can help, since this infinite abyss can be filled only with an infinite and immutable object; in other words by God himself."

We have a difficult time accepting that fulfillment and happiness are not achieved by our own merits but through a relationship with God. We are hardwired for this relationship and it is in our DNA. The simple fact is that we come from God and are designed to return to God. If our beginning and our end define who we are, why would we not want to seek the One who can truly satisfy? The world does not realize that it is waiting. It is waiting for the birth of God in time, within one's soul and in eternity. We get so confused by seeking other momentary satisfactions that we misinterpret the hunger within. We crave God.

The union of God and humanity, revealed in Jesus Christ, is precisely what sets us on a straight path, orders our relationships, establishes proper focus and goals and tells us whose kingdom we really are meant to serve. We are so lost. God is with us. The prophet Nathan told this to King David, the angel said this to Mary and the birth of Christ brings this Good News to us. We do not need to be busily looking for more things but must learn to find contentment and blessing in the One Presence. This is the beautiful simple message of Advent!

If you are feeling unsettled, anxious, angry, disgruntled, disconnected, unhappy, worried, fearful, off center, becoming overly self-indulgent, unable to spend time alone and without distraction, then there's a good chance you are lost. Now is the time to allow God to find you! Ponder the holy simplicity of Mary's call to be the Mother of God. "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word." When we are helpless and at home with our emptiness, God will fill us. Our Savior has come. ©LPi

Pastoral and Sacramental Guidelines

Baptism

Infant baptisms are celebrated on the second Sunday of each month at 11:30 Mass (or after). Parents requesting baptism of their child or children must contact the parish office, be baptized (or at least one parent), registered and active members of the parish. They must attend a baptism class at least one month prior to the baptism. Newly registered members must wait three months prior to a request.

Marriage

Couples seeking to be married at St. Roch's must contact the pastor to secure a date, contacting him at least six months or more, prior to their desired date. One member of the party must be a baptized Catholic, active and registered at St. Roch's (or through their parents). The couple will then be instructed in the marriage preparation program. Non-catholic members (of the party) or previously married members are not restricted from entering into marriage, so long as they are free to marry according to the laws of the Catholic Church.

Anointing of the Sick

Any member of the parish may be anointed prior to surgery, beginning therapies, suffering chronic illnesses, having reached old age and/or having been hospitalized. This sacrament of healing is for the living (conscious and alert) and can be celebrated in church, at home or in the hospital. Please contact the parish office for a visit to be arranged. Emergencies always take precedence.

First Eucharist and Confirmation

Please contact the religious education office for information regarding these initiation rites, requirements and subsequent celebrations.

Reconciliation

This healing sacrament is celebrated every Saturday afternoon at 3Pm in the church or by appointment.

Catholic School Tuition Assistance




