## Fr. Ray's X-Rays

Howdy. The solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ is such a significant feast within the Church - it is what makes us Catholic! As Catholics, we center on the body and blood as a meal and find in celebrating and receiving it, the sustenance that we need to endure and be true disciples in word and action. The Second Vatican council offered us this definition (paraphrased): "the Eucharist is the source and summit of our lives as Christians."



As a meal that we gather around table to celebrate, it is a sustenance, in order that we may endure and persevere. In that mindset, it is frequently celebrated and encouraged that we receive this sacrament as often as we can.

We are able to receive such a sacrament believing through faith of the *real and true presence* of Jesus in the blessed sacrament. We have been taught that as we celebrate the Eucharist given to us as a memorial of the last supper and in doing what Jesus asked to do this in His memory, He is present to us. That real presence spurs us to be evermore, what we eat and what we drink in our everyday living.

Thus, the effects of such a sacrament are to be seen – witnessed – in how we live, even react, respond, interact and associate with others. We pray that our encounter with others is noted by them as they feel and experience through us, the Jesus we have celebrated and received.

### FOP (Families of Parishes)

As priests of this newly formed family - Downriver FOP, #3 – we will be meeting in the days to come to begin planning for a couple of significant jobs within our family - a mission direct coordinator and a mission support coordinator. Of these two positions, the former deals with the interactions (my term) of parish life – educations and worship for example, and work to bring unity among us in planning and working out these ministries. The other role is one of dealing with the administrative aspects for parish life finances for one in coordinating the work of our respective mission in this family.

To that end, we need to have input from you. I suggested that we need to have some type of mini synod that the AOD had in the Fall of 2016. We need to do so that you as people – a people of God – know and understand, as well as appreciate your roles in this process. Without your input, decisions made are uneven, one-sided. I don't want to find myself in such a situation.



**WHY DO WE DO THAT? - CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED**

**Question: Why are some saints honored as "patron saints"?**

**Answer:** Each person is unique and each of us has different gifts, interests, talents, and, yes, even struggles and areas where we need to grow. This is no less true of those holy women, men, and children who have been canonized or beatified.

Because we believe that the saints and blessed are both models of faith and intercessors, Christians have looked to certain holy people as role models and heavenly protectors for occupations, spiritual charisms, and even places. Although the Church sometimes names a person as a patron saint (e.g. Saint Philip Neri as the patron of Rome, Saint Clare of Assisi as the patroness of television, or Saint Aloysius Gonzaga as the patron of youth and young adults), more often it is popular devotion that inspires lay Christians to turn to a particular saint or blessed for heavenly help and support. This is how, for example, Saint Cecilia came to be honored as the patroness of musicians, Saint Toribio Romo as patron of migrants coming into the United States, and Saint Gertrude of Nivelles as patroness of cat lovers. Although there are official and unofficial lists of patron saints, we should always feel free to ask any and all the saints to give us their patronage and protection in whatever it is that we need.

We all know that person, don't we? Hey, maybe we've even been that person.

But the problem with this attitude is that it implies that churches don't matter. Community worship doesn't matter. Today, we are reminded exactly why that is so untrue. 




**Stewardship Thoughts Cycle B (Mark)**  
**THE MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST**

Today's Scripture readings emphasize the old and new covenants. In the Book of Exodus, Moses brings the ancient Israelites to an agreement with God through the sacrificial blood of young bulls. This action prefigures Jesus' ultimate sacrifice on the Cross for our sins, and the opportunity for eternal salvation. The author of the Letter to the Hebrews contrasts Old Testament sacrifices of goats and calves with the new covenant sealed in the very Blood of Christ. In St. Mark's Gospel, the evangelist describes Jesus' institution of the Eucharist at our Lord's Last Supper. This begins the new covenant with His disciples — a covenant that continues for us today. As faithful stewards, we believe in Christ's true presence, Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity, in Holy Communion. By receiving this tremendous gift, we become what we consume, finding strength to live virtuous and holy lives, deepening our love for God and neighbor in need. Learn when Eucharistic Adoration and Benediction are scheduled in your parish and spend some quiet time with our Lord and Savior.



Today as we celebrate the gift of the Body and Blood of Christ let us pray for those who are hungry, malnourished and starving.

**Pastoral and Sacramental Guidelines**

**Baptism**

Infant baptisms are celebrated on the second Sunday of each month at 11:30 Mass (or after). Parents requesting baptism of their child or children must contact the parish office, be baptized (or at least one parent), registered and active members of the parish. They must attend a baptism class at least one month prior to the baptism. Newly registered members must wait three months prior to a request.



**Marriage**

Couples seeking to be married at St. Roch's must contact the pastor to secure a date, contacting him at least six months or more, prior to their desired date. One member of the party must be a baptized Catholic, active and registered at St. Roch's (or through their parents). The couple will then be instructed in the marriage preparation program. Non-catholic members (of the party) or previously married members are not restricted from entering into marriage, so long as they are free to marry according to the laws of the Catholic Church.

**Anointing of the Sick**

Any member of the parish may be anointed prior to surgery, beginning therapies, suffering chronic illnesses, having reached old age and/or having been hospitalized. **This sacrament of healing is for the living (conscious and alert) and can be celebrated in church, at home or in the hospital.** Please contact the parish office for a visit to be arranged. Emergencies always take precedence.



**First Eucharist and Confirmation**

Please contact the religious education office for information regarding these initiation rites, requirements and subsequent celebrations.

**Reconciliation**

This healing sacrament is celebrated every Saturday afternoon at 3Pm in the church or by appointment.


Patron of Contagious Illnesses

**QUESTIONS OF THE WEEK**

**FIRST READING:**

Moses and the ancient Israelites ratified the covenant God established with them at Mount Sinai with the blood of a sacrificed animal. The sacrificed animal affirmed Israel's commitment: "We will do everything the Lord has told us." Why do you think Israel tied sacrificed blood to their verbal commitment?

**SECOND READING:**

The author of Hebrews teaches us that the sacrificed blood of Christ sanctifies us and offers us eternal redemption. How do you see this connected to ancient Israel's practice of sacrificing animals for their blood?

**GOSPEL:**

Mark's account of the institution of the Eucharist is linked to the Jewish Feast of Unleavened Bread when a Passover lamb was sacrificed. What do you think Mark is teaching us in making this connection?

As we gather today to reaffirm our faith in the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist, we are reminded that we are also the Body of Christ. THE MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST**


As our world faces so much turmoil and change, it is now more important than ever to remember who God is, who we are and where we are going. It is easy to get distracted and lose focus, especially when we are being pulled in so many directions. We can not only lose sight of God but one another. Maintaining our well developed and mature relationships with God and one another is essential to continuing to live, healthy, happy, and focused lives. In a message to young people, Pope Benedict XVI said, "the happiness you are seeking, the happiness you have a right to enjoy has a name and a face: it is Jesus of Nazareth, hidden in the Eucharist." What is true for those who are younger is even truer for those who are older. Regardless of how the particulars of life change over time, human beings are still hard-wired to seek the fullness of life and happiness. How we embark on this journey and what we choose along the way will indicate whether we meet success.
