Fr. Ray's X-Rays

Howdy! Along the way of living out our summer months and our lives as disciples, a couple of things occurred that have touched me to which I want to respond; they deal with God.



First, in the midst of the pandemic that struck our nations and world and caused harm, death and uncertainty, the vaccine to fight against such a virus came to be. I applaud the scientists who through their insights, education and interest, develop such vaccines and one that benefits the world. These vaccines are able to combat the Delta variant that is traveling across our nation.

While I offer praise and thanks to God for a vaccine, some have stated that this virus was a result of God's plan. For at a recent retreat, our spokesperson said this: "God gave us the Covid19 virus!" I was only sitting a few feet from this speaker and offered a sigh while taken back by these words spoken and by the seemingly nonchalant way in which it was spoken to others like myself. Thus, I disagree.

In recent days, the city of Surfside, Florida experienced a devastating implosion of a condo living high rise. Two different news reports offered a prayer setting of a catholic liturgy, with a deacon offering words of solace to the neighborhood, yet included in this comfort, the question: "why does God allow such things?" Like the statement made at retreat that God gave us the Covid 19 virus, this question of blaming God plagues me.

In situations like these, many of us want to be able to answer these circumstances with a philosophical twist that satisfies. In that mindset, like people of old - whether found in scripture or in our own world history - a scapegoat is looked for in situations like these. But in more difficult situations or circumstances where a scapegoat does not suffice, God is blamed; God is the culprit of such trauma. And in blaming God, we find solace?

Family Of Parishes

We have just begun to enter into this new mode of ministry. We have much to learn, develop and offer to you as well as to ourselves - us priests - our roles and responses.

Included in this is finances. While we are in a "In solidum" ministry - a unity of individual parishes working together - we are to look at having a person oversee the finances of the parishes. This person would go from parish-to-parish to oversee the books. In this same mindset, a group of at least two folks from each parish will sit on a finance council to look at the same. Both this lay administrator of

finance (called in our new ministry, a mission support director) and the parish reps, will advise the moderator; final decisions are his to be made (with us, the other pastors having input).

Pray God to guide and direct us in our meetings praying the Holy Spirit enlighten us strengthen us and give us assurance.

If you are still prayerfully considering your CSA pledge, you may mail your completed pledge card in the pre-addressed envelope that was provided you.



Stewardship Thoughts Cycle B (Mark)**Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time**

In today's Scripture readings, those called forth to accomplish God's work experience difficulty completing their mission. God directs the prophet Amos, a lowly shepherd to prophesy to the Israelites in spite of the priest Amaziah's opposition. In St. Mark's Gospel, Jesus sends forth the Twelve Apostles, in the spirit of evangelization, to preach repentance, cure the sick, and drive out demons. He forewarns that they will encounter resistance and even rejection. In his Letter to the Ephesians, St. Paul reminds us of the Father Who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavens, and to be His adopted heirs.

As faithful stewards, we know the cost and sacrifice of discipleship. Our efforts to do God's will may be resisted or rejected. However, the Lord's gift of grace strengthens us to carry out His work regardless of the obstacles we may face. To help discover God's will, set aside a few minutes of quiet time each day to listen to the Lord.

To the best of our ability we try to create a flawless bulletin for your enjoyment and to keep you up to date on the happenings of the parish. Being human, and with time limitations, we know some mistakes have been and will be made; we trust that you will understand and forgive.



Recognize God In Your Ordinary Moments

What We Carry from Town to Town

In my experience, there are two kinds of people: the folks who kick off their shoes the second they walk through the door, and the ones who don't.

People can feel strongly about this on both sides. The main thrust of the Shoes-Off Brigade seems to be this: we track a lot of weird stuff on the soles of our feet. Little reminders of all the places we've been — whether it's a private home or a public bathroom — cling to our shoes long after we leave.

This same theory applies to our spiritual lives. As human beings and as disciples, we visit a lot of figurative towns and pick up a lot of figurative dust. Sinfulness. Shame. Defeat. Anger. Fear. Doubt. No matter how hard we try to keep free of it, these things have a way of attaching themselves to us, sometimes without us even noticing. We need to take a good look at what unhelpful and unconstructive baggage from our past we're tracking into our present and future encounters.

What is the "town" God is asking you to visit today in His name? Is it a tough conversation with a friend, a brief witness to a stranger in the checkout line, a call to be present to someone in your family? Before you go, remember, shake off the dust. Don't let a past disappointment constrain you. Don't allow yesterday's failures or burdens to keep you from the joy of today's witness, whatever form it might take.

Pastoral and Sacramental Guidelines

Baptism

Infant baptisms are celebrated on the second Sunday of each month at 11:30 Mass (or after). Parents requesting baptism of their child or children must contact the parish office, be baptized (or at least one parent), registered and active members of the parish. They must attend a baptism class at least one month prior to the baptism. Newly registered members must wait three months prior to a request.

Marriage

Couples seeking to be married at St. Roch's must contact the pastor to secure a date, contacting him at least six months or more, prior to their desired date. One member of the party must be a baptized Catholic, active and registered at St. Roch's (or through their parents). The couple will then be instructed in the marriage preparation program. Non-catholic members (of the party) or previously married members are not restricted from entering into marriage, so long as they are free to marry according to the laws of the Catholic Church.

Anointing of the Sick

Any member of the parish may be anointed prior to surgery, beginning therapies, suffering chronic illnesses, having reached old age and/or having been hospitalized. This sacrament of healing is for the living (conscious and alert) and can be celebrated in church, at home or in the hospital. Please contact the parish office for a visit to be arranged. Emergencies always take precedence.



First Eucharist and Confirmation

Please contact the religious education office for information regarding these initiation rites, requirements and subsequent celebrations.

Reconciliation

This healing sacrament is celebrated every Saturday afternoon at 3PM in the church or by appointment.

Catholic School Tuition Assistance

St. Roch Parish is able to assist families who are active members of the Parish, with Catholic School tuition assistance. Contact Fr. Ray and/or the Finance Council for more information.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? - CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

Question: What kind of religious practices should we begin, once we marry, to help us practice our faith each day?

Answer: Your spiritual life as a couple is important. The sacrament of Marriage is a gift and a grace, but living it well isn't always easy! It requires intentionality and perseverance. Growing your spiritual life as a couple also requires a plan. Life can be incredibly busy. There's never "enough time" for everything we want to do. But we can live by our priorities. If we don't prioritize prayer, we'll find it slowly disappear from our lives.

If you're not already praying individually, that's a good place to start. If your schedules are similar, take some quiet time at the same time to help hold each other accountable. Praying together is also important! You could start by looking at the religious practices of your family and of families around you that you respect. Talk with your spouse about the ones who make the deepest impression on you or were most meaningful when you were young. Think about what you want your future children to experience. Making faith a commitment now will mean it is engrained habit when you grow your family. Ultimately, these faith practices should help us grow in our love for God and for one another. ©LPI

LIVE THE LITURGY INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

God calls us to bring His Word to all corners of the earth. What does that mean for you and me? We are just simple and humble folks trying to find our way through the Gospel and our world. After all, we are not professional preachers but gentle servants. Jesus summons us to take his message on the road and bring it from the pew to the pavement. We cannot keep the joy of the Gospel to ourselves but must bring it into every aspect of our lives: our families, our schools, our work, our corporations, our politics, our social circles, and our philosophies. We cannot just accept the wisdom of the world as true and conduct our lives as if the Good News is a separate matter. They are one. Jesus never asked his friends to go and construct buildings where people could come to hear the truth. He asked them to go to their homes and meet them one on one, face to face. When the rubber meets the road and the message is challenging, rejection is quite possible. That's the litmus test for whether we're really doing what we have been asked. ©LPI

GOSPEL MEDITATION: ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE
15TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Maybe the work is best left to the professionals. That's how many people view the preaching of the Gospel. That's the stuff priests, religious, deacons, lay ministers, and other professional Church people do. It has little to do with me. Well, that's not really true. The fact of the matter is that preaching the Gospel has everything to do with you, with all of us who are baptized members of the Body of Christ. Nobody gets off the hook from that job. The question is, however, how do we do it? Well, there's a safe way, which many choose, to preach the Gospel — and the risky way. The safe way pretty much keeps the Gospel in church and around like-minded people. I say my prayers, go to Mass, contribute to the food pantry, tithe, and attend Bible Study. That pretty much covers the bases, right? Wrong.

The risky way is the more challenging way and for many, the “road less traveled.” Imagine those first disciples going out and into people’s homes. They must have had some amazing conversations with folks about God’s kingdom, changing their hearts, forgiving sins, and look-

ing at the world differently. They must have met people who were hurting, exiled from their communities, neglected, lost, or living self-insulated lives in a society that



The risky way involves example and conversation. We have to take the Gospel from church and carry it with us wherever we go. What kinds of conversations do we have with others? We interact with those closest to us, in our work, social circles, institutions, corporations, in politics, and beyond. Our conversations with others reveal a great deal about how we see things and what we consider important. If we are really interested in seeing God’s vision for the world succeed, then we will talk about it. It will become a part of our everyday conversation and find its way into our interactions with others. How will we preserve the dignity of human life and encourage others to have a relationship with God? We must be the example, live value centered, virtuous lives, stand against injustice, combating racism, and learn ways to resolve conflicts without violence.

If we are going to succeed going forward, we have to find a way to bring our prayer centered lives into the marketplace. Our conversations have to change. Not everyone wants to hear what the Gospel has to say. That’s a risk God asks us to take. ©LPi
