FR. RAY'S XRAYS

Howdy! The Ordinary Time of our liturgical calendar is celebrated now through the beginning of Lent and returns after the Easter season. In



this OT period we listen to Luke's gospel - detailed gospel at points in time of his writing, but with an emphasis on Jesus' ministry and mission culminating in Jerusalem. Luke is also author of the Acts of the Apostles accounts, which immediately follows the gospels in our New Testament and Luke takes from what happened in Jerusalem and expands upon that.

His emphasis here is to give the Early Church the attention and for this young church to grow and develop from what has been started. I like envisioning Luke's writing as the greater and lesser than signs, used in math. The greater than sign is his gospel writing, funneling all the prophecies and expectations into his gospel message. The lesser than sign meets the small end of the greater than sign - Jerusalem - and now writes of the commissioning of the disciples of Jesus, to go out and make disciples, baptizing, etc.... This is what became the early church, and subsequently, the Christian church (so named in Antioch) and the historical church and the modern church that we are today. This is our ancestry.

Parish Ministries in FOP

We evolve and have entered into a family of parishes (FOP) that brings together six parishes in our immediate area. This FOP will be given a name shortly, so that we can refer to it as a personal entity versus something just out there! We hope that as a local FOP, we evolve as did the early church. (see my thoughts above). While early in the process, we have to envision changes that will occurmasses times for one. Perhaps too, we might see changes in the area of faith formation classes consolidated, and in that mindset, greater emphasis on family faith formation and adult formation classes.

This could also apply to parents preparing for the baptism of their children and young adults preparing for confirmation. The RCIA process too, might be consolidated in our area, bringing all interested folks together into one class of initiation.

In the midst of Winter, stay warm. In the continued midst of this pandemic, stay safe and be wise. My prayers and God's blessings.

Pastoral and Sacramental Guidelines

Baptism

Infant baptisms are celebrated on the second Sunday of each month at 11:30 Mass (or after). Parents requesting baptism of their child or children must contact the parish office, be baptized (or at least one par-



ent), registered and active members of the parish. They must attend a baptism class at least one month prior to the baptism. Newly registered members must wait three months prior to a request.

Marriage

Couples seeking to be married at St. Roch's must contact the pastor to secure a date, contacting him at least six months or more, prior to their desired date. One member of the party must be a baptized Catholic, active and registered at St. Roch's (or through their parents). The couple will then be instructed in the marriage preparation program. Non-Catholic members (of the party) or previously married members are not restricted from entering into marriage, so long as they are

free to marry according to the laws of the Catholic Church.

Anointing of the Sick

Any member of the parish may be anointed prior to surgery, beginning therapies, suffering chronic illnesses, having reached old age and/or having been hospitalized. This sacrament of healing is for the living (conscious and alert) and can be celebrated in church, at home or in the hospital. Please contact the parish office for a visit to be arranged. Emergencies always take precedence.

First Eucharist and Confirmation

Please contact the Faith Formation Office for information regarding these initiation rites, requirements and subsequent celebrations.

Reconciliation

This healing sacrament is celebrated every Saturday afternoon at 3Pm in the church or by appointment.

GOSPEL MEDITATION ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

2nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

God delights in you. How do you feel when you hear that? Delight usually comes with an exuberant flow of joy that seemingly arises from one's toes with the expression of great glee. Reflecting upon the deep measure of joy God has in us can be a source of joy for ourselves. Delight is infectious. A very young brother and sister were playing on the beach when the all too familiar ice cream truck made its daily rounds. The boy shook with excitement and delight as he took his sister's hand and exclaimed, "The ice cream man is here, isn't it great!" As they ran off toward the truck, one could hear the girl reply, "Yeah, I can't wait!" The experience of a child's delight in something so simple as ice cream, lifts our spirits from our burdens and transports us to the lighter, more innocent side of life.

Life is not meant to be a burden. Believe it or not. God actually wants us to be happy! In fact, the wedding feast at Cana shows us that God even puts His blessing on our happiness. It is okay to celebrate the wonder of ourselves and others. Life is good. It is always interesting to note that Jesus saves the good wine until last. You would think it would be the other way around. The superb quality of Jesus' wine points to the superior quality of life we find in Christ. It is not a life of burdens but a life of wonder and delight! In Christ, we are lifted from the superficial and mundane to a life of purpose, hope, and love.

God is with us through the long haul, through the challenges and sorrows as well as the successes and accomplishments. In spite of the fact that we often wander from the path, God's celebratory delight in us remains. As spouses are asked to remain faithful to each other through whatever life brings, God remains faithful too. This promise remains through this life and into the next. All we have to do is take the advice of Jesus' mother to heart when she says, "Listen to him." It Takes All Kinds

"If every flower wanted to be a rose," wrote St. Therese of Lisieux, "spring would lose its loveliness."

Who is God asking you to be today? There is an obvious answer that springs to mind right out of the gate. God wants me to be a good person (a good father, a good husband) today; today, God wants me to be a saint.

But this answer fails to get to the heart of the question. We are all striving today to serve the same Spirit, but we are given different gifts to do so. Are we asked to be the disciples, to bear witness to a miracle and to give our testimony? Are we called to imitate the Blessed Mother herself and give encouragement to follow God's word?

Let us examine our gifts and listen in the silence of our hearts to the direction of the Spirit. Then and only then, let us do whatever He tells us.

St. Sebastian | January 20

Not much is known about the life of St. Sebastian (256 - 287), except that he was a Roman martyr whose name has been mentioned throughout history since early 350.

We see St. Sebastian many times in art, especially from iconic paintings from Guido Reni, Andrea Mantegna and Hendrick ter Brugghen. Historical scholars now agree that a spiritual story has the beloved saint entering the Roman army because only there could he assist Christian martyrs without arousing suspicion on himself. Eventually he was found out, brought before Emperor Diocletian and delivered to Mauritanian archers to be shot to death. Pierced with arrows, he was left for dead, but managed to survive. He recovered from his wounds but still refused to leave.

One day, St. Sebastian took up a position near where the emperor was to pass. He confronted the emperor, condemning him for his cruelty to Christians. This time the sentence of death was carried out, and St. Sebastian was beaten to death with clubs. Today he is the patron saint of athletes. ©LPi

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


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
