NEXT SUNDAY'S READINGS

EASTER SUNDAY OF THE RESURRECTION OF THE LORD

Acts of the Apostles 10:34, 37 -43 "Jesus went about doing good and healing those oppressed by the devil, for God was with Him." The battle between good and evil is one of the most prevailing themes in all of literature, not to mention the Bible. This is because it is so central to our human condition. Jesus chose to do God's will rather than His own.

Colossians 3:1-4 We are reminded once more that what is of this wonderful earth is passing away. What will survive - love, beauty, joy, kindness, charity - is what we were born for and what we will rise again into. We are to die to all the rest.

John 20:1-9 Peter and the other disciple ran to the tomb, but the other disciple arrived there first. Perhaps the real contest of Easter is not who gets there first but instead between those who go to the tomb and struggle to comprehend its meaning and those who don't make the journey at all. The only way to encounter a miracle is to stand in its presence.

Mary Magdalen did that and then went and announced the One she encountered.

FROM FATHER RYAN

“The Lord is close to the brokenhearted” (Psalm 34:18).

By now most, if not all of you, have heard that our Pastor, Fr. Shaun Lowery, has been placed on administrative leave pending an investigation by the Michigan Attorney General. None of this is easy for anyone. Echoing the words of the Psalmist in Psalm 34, I want to remind all of us that the Lord is close to the brokenhearted. As we move through this time of uncertainty together, let us be mindful in acknowledging whatever thoughts, feelings, and desires exist within our hearts and let us relate them to the Lord in prayer. The Lord is close to each one of us in this time of uncertainty, frustration, sadness, anxiety, maybe even anger and fear for some. This is an opportunity for all of us to lean into the Lord and depend on him all the more.

We are nearing Holy Week and, as a community, we will walk those stations of the Cross together with Jesus as he made his way to Calvary. He mounted the Cross to conquer what you and I are experiencing right now. This is *our* Holy Week. One of my favorite lyrics from an ancient hymn typically sung during Holy Week says, *Hail the Cross! Our only hope!*

I want to assure all of you that I am here for you. I am walking this journey with you for as long as the Lord wants me here. We are all in this together. I understand that this is difficult and one of the most difficult aspects of this is the lack of information. It is frustrating. Let's acknowledge the frustration and relate it to the Lord. But, let me also say that I trust our Bishop and his staff and have known them to be people who care deeply for the People of God – all of us.

I have had the opportunity to meet with our amazing staff and I look forward to the opportunity to meet all of you more personally. As I told the staff, my focus right now is communication (as best I can), the staff, and getting to Easter. Once we move through and pray Holy Week together, I will be able to get a little more grounded in the community. For now, I just want to encourage all of us to steer clear of division, gossip, and calumny. All of those will be temptations that must be rejected.

One last reminder. Fr. Shaun is still our Pastor and I hope that we all hold him up in our prayers. Like all of us, he needs the graces that come from a community of prayer.

Our parish namesake, St. Mary Magdalen, was rich in mercy. Let us pray, through her intercession, for the grace to forgive whatever might need to be forgiven both now and in the future. St. Mary Magdalen, pray for us!



THE TRIDUUM

THREE DAYS THAT MATTER



The Triduum, the three day celebration of Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday is almost here.

The Triduum celebrates the pass over of the Lord Jesus from death to life, a wonderful truth that is the very core of what we believe as Christians.

Triduum is another name for the special Liturgy that begins on Holy Thursday evening with the Mass of the Lord's Supper. That service does not really end, we simply leave with the Lord to watch and pray with Him in the garden. The next day, Good Friday, we gather in silence to witness His condemnation and execution. Again, the service does not end, we simply depart until we gather on Holy Saturday evening to witness and celebrate the resurrection.

We invite you to truly celebrate your faith by joining in the Triduum (April 1, 2 and 3) All of the Liturgies will be livestreamed and recorded for broadcast on our parish website: www.saintmarymagdalen.org.

RCIA

Holy Week for RCIA

Holy Week is very busy for those in RCIA. We start with an Easter Vigil Retreat on Monday night. Here, we reflect on the upcoming week and how becoming Catholic will change their lives. Because there is no Seder Meal this year, the next time we meet will be Holy Thursday. On this night, the Candidates will have their feet washed on the altar by Fr. Ryan. After that, they will be Dismissed for the last time, and they will spend some time in the “Garden” waiting for Christ. Good Friday, they remain in Mass with us, venerating the Cross. Holy Saturday morning, they will attend a morning of reflection to prepare for the Vigil that evening. The Vigil will be their big “Welcome!” as this Mass is all about the RCIA folks. We hear many readings about our Salvation History before they are made one with us. Then the adults will be Confirmed. Finally, they will join us at the Table of the Lord in Holy Eucharist.

Please keep them in your prayers as we head into this final week of preparation.

CURRENT PARISH GUIDELINES

- ◆ Indoor weekend Liturgy celebrated in the main worship space. Masks must be worn. No assisting liturgical ministers, socially distant seating, socially distant reception of Holy Communion.
- ◆ Indoor weekday Liturgy in the main worship space celebrated minimally (i.e., no singing, no assisting liturgical ministers, socially distant seating, socially distant reception of Holy Communion). Masks must be worn.
- ◆ Drive up reception of Holy Communion, at the main entrance under the portico, will be available Saturdays 5:45—6:15 pm and Sundays 12:15—12:45 pm.
- ◆ The parish staff has normal work schedules. The parish office remains closed to visitors.
- ◆ Gatherings and meetings are held online.
- ◆ Outdoor gatherings of 10 and no more than 50 people permitted with strict social distancing.

If you have any condition that will compromise your immune system (or if you care for someone with such a condition) PLEASE STAY HOME! There is no obligation to attend Mass and there is no obligation to receive Holy Communion through May 16, 2021.

GETTING THE VACCINE

Some people have expressed moral concerns about getting the COVID-19 vaccine. Much of this is based on misinformation and lack of understanding of Catholic moral principles.

Bishops throughout the world, and the Vatican, have issued statements indicating *there is nothing immoral about receiving this vaccine*. Those who worry about the way this vaccine and other vaccines were developed do not understand that receiving the vaccine does NOT mean participating in anything immoral. In fact, it may be immoral (that is to say, not supporting the Common Good) to forego receiving the vaccine unless you have a legitimate medical reason not to receive it.

RELIGIOUS FORMATION

Holy Week: The Model for Catechesis

Beginning this weekend with Palm Sunday, and continuing through the liturgies of the Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday,) the Church, in her wisdom, provides us with what I think should be the model for catechesis and formation programs everywhere. At its best, catechesis is meant to do more than just teach facts about the faith, it should facilitate an encounter with Jesus. When we immerse ourselves in the story of the faith, we realize it is our story too. When this happens, we are sure to meet the person the story is about—Jesus!

An immersion in the story of the Gospel, especially the events surrounding Christ's passion and death, is exactly what the liturgies of Holy Week provide. On Palm Sunday, when the Passion is dramatically read and we as the crowd shout "crucify him!", we realize our own sins helped lead to what Christ would undergo. On Holy Thursday at the Mass of the Lord's Supper, we are reminded of the reality that we all too often witness, but fail to fully appreciate when we attend Mass: Christ's words "do this in memory of me" are fulfilled in our celebration of the Eucharist. As we pray at the altar of repose, we, along with the apostles, try to keep watch with Jesus in the garden. And when we kneel down on Good Friday, how can we fail to notice the awful silence following Christ's final breath on the Cross?

If you have never been to some of the Triduum liturgies that will take place this week, I highly recommend you and your family find a way to do so! If you are still not attending Mass in person, try to find a livestream you like. You and your family can learn more through a faithful participation in these liturgies than we could ever teach in the classroom!





Invitation to learn about and discuss Catholic Social Teaching

"Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me." (Mt. 25:40)

What are the moral questions that we as Catholics and Christians should be concerned with – hunger, poverty, abortion, racism, immigration, criminal

justice, others? What principles of Catholic Social Teaching should guide us in our reflection about these issues? How can we, as Catholics, learn what Christ and the Catholic Church teach about social responsibilities – about how we should act as moral persons?

Mark Shea, a popular Catholic writer and speaker, recently wrote "A Primer on Catholic Social Teaching: the church's best-kept secret", and it is a very readable 145 pages! Shea devotes two chapters to each of the four pillars of Catholic social teaching: the dignity of the human person, the common good, subsidiarity, and solidarity.

Deacon Devon Wolfe will host six sessions over six weekends discussing this book. Sessions begin at 6:30 PM on Sunday, April 11, 2021. Zoom is used to provide safety and convenience for participants. 
