

OUR SACRAMENTAL POLICY

Six month Parish registration and participation are required for Baptism, Confirmation and Marriage.

Baptism: Arrangements must be made in advance and parents must attend a baptism class. The Church requests that at least one of the parents be a practicing Catholic, and the Godparents must be practicing, fully initiated Catholics at least 16 years of age. If there are two godparents, one

must be male, one must be female. If there is one godparent, they may be male or female.

Marriage: Arrangements must be made at least nine months in advance. Call the Rectory office. Officiate at the ceremony must be the Parish Pastor, Deacon, or a family member.

Funerals: Officiate must be the Parish Pastor of Immaculate Conception, or a family member

Please note: the services of the Parish Organists are used for all Weddings and Funerals.

Lk 10:1-12, 17-20


At that time the Lord appointed seventy-two others whom he sent ahead of him in pairs to every town and place he intended to visit.

He said to them,

"The harvest is abundant but the laborers are few; so ask the master of the harvest to send out laborers for his harvest. Go on your way; behold, I am sending you like lambs among wolves. Carry no money bag, no sack, no sandals; and greet no one along the way. Into whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace to this household.' If a peaceful person lives there, your peace will rest on him; but if not, it will return to you. Stay in the same house and eat and drink what is offered to you, for the laborer deserves his payment. Do not move about from one house to another. Whatever town you enter and they welcome you, eat what is set before you, cure the sick in it and say to them, 'The kingdom of God is at hand for you.' Whatever town you enter and they do not receive you, go out into the streets and say, 'The dust of your town that clings to our feet, even that we shake off against you.' Yet know this: the kingdom of God is at hand. I tell you, it will be more tolerable for Sodom on that day than for that town."

The seventy-two returned rejoicing, and said, "Lord, even the demons are subject to us because of your name."

ST. ELIZABETH OF PORTUGAL - JULY 5

St. Elizabeth was born to Peter III of Aragon and his queen Constantia in 1271. Like most royal girls of the time, she was betrothed at an early age, and was married to King Diniz (or Dinis, English: Denis) at the age of 12. Although her husband's infidelities and life of sin caused much scandal, Elizabeth was a good and pius queen. She attended Mass daily and dedicated her life to helping the poor. She established orphanages and shelters for the homeless. She also founded a convent of Poor Clares at Coimbra, Portugal.

Often called Peacemaker, Elizabeth was from her birth a reconciler of conflict. Her birth brought her father and his estranged father James to peace. Later when her own son and husband came to war out of jealousy, she rode between armies and reconciled the two men.

After King Diniz died in 1325, she went to live as a lay member at the convent of Poor Clares that she had founded. But her fight for peace was not over, she undertook a long ride to keep the army of her son Afonso IV, from fighting that of Alfonso XI of Castile. Although she was successful, she died shortly after from a fever.

Saint Elizabeth was canonized on May 25th, 1625, by Pope Urban VIII. In the United States her memorial has been transferred to July 5th since July 4th is Independence Day, a national holiday.

HOMESCHOOL CO-OP

FALL 2022

Beginning this September, the Immaculate Conception Homeschool families are starting a co-op on Tuesdays from 9AM-2PM. The day will begin with morning Mass, followed by classes in Science, Art, Music, and P.E. The classes are for grades K-8, with opportunities for high school students, as well as a Preschool classroom. Registration for the co-op will be open through the month of July. The cost will be minimal, only to cover materials needed for the classes.

Parents will be expected to volunteer in some capacity, and must be on location during the classes.

The co-op is open to any homeschool parishioners of Immaculate Conception and other regular Mass attendees at the parish as space permits.

ASK DEACON JOE

If the orans pose is not allowed, why are there still some who do it? Do they not know any better? Maybe this should be explained why the faithful are not to use the orans pose during Mass.

Since we are currently celebrating Mass Ad Orientem, that is with the priest and deacon facing in the same direction as the congregation, I do not know for how many of our parishioner are praying the Our Father using the orans posture, with hands extended. But I am not sure the question should be, "Why is it allowed?" Maybe a better question would be, "Is it appropriate?"

The orans posture is praying with extended hands. It is a posture that signifies offering up prayers to God on behalf of the community. In the Roman Missal, which is the guide to how the Mass is to be properly celebrated, there are many instances when the priest is instructed to offer prayers with hands extended. These are times when he is offering up prayer in the name of the congregation. But when the priest prays with the people, as at the Gloria and at the Creed, he instead prays with joined hands. There is one contradiction, however. When praying the Our Father together with the congregation, the priest prays with extended hands as a matter of tradition. Prior to 1958, the congregation did not pray the Pater Noster, the Our Father in Latin—the priest prayed it for them and did so with extended hands. That tradition has carried over into the current Roman Missal. The Missal gives instructions on the actions of the priest and deacon. It gives instructions for the actions of the congregation as well, specifically when they should sit, stand, or kneel. With regard to the recitation of the Our Father, it indicates that the priest is to extend his hands. It doesn't say that the deacon should also extend his hands,

and so I don't—I pray with joined hands. I am not instructed to extend my hands, and it would be inappropriate because it is a posture reserved for the presider. The Missal doesn't say anything about the posture of the lay faithful, other than to indicate that they are to stand at this time. It doesn't tell them to extend their hands or to hold hands with their neighbor. These are not typical prayer postures. When we recite the Our Father together at Mass we are praying together, not offering prayer on behalf of someone else. In my opinion, assuming the orans posture at Mass by members of the congregation, or by me as a deacon, is

members of the congregation, or by me as a deacon, is not appropriate. With all this being said, however, there is much confusion in the Church. Since Vatican II, some bishops have pushed for liturgical reforms that would actually require the congregation to use the orans posture during the Our Father. But in the end, our current Roman Missal, approved by the Holy See, did not allow for those changes to take place.






