OUR SACRAMENTAL POLICY

Six month Parish registration and participation are required for Baptism, Confirmation and Marriage.

Baptism: Arrangements must be made in advance and parents must attend a baptism class. The Church requests that at least one of the parents be a practicing Catholic, and the Godparents must be practicing, fully initiated Catholics at least 16 years of age. If there are two godparents, one

must be male, one must be female. If there is one godparent, they may be male or female.

Marriage: Arrangements must be made at least nine months in advance. Call the Rectory office. Officiate at the ceremony must be the Parish Pastor, Deacon, or a family member.

Funerals: Officiate must be the Parish Pastor of Immaculate Conception, or a family member

Please note: the services of the Parish Organists are used for all Weddings and Funerals.



Then he said to the crowd,


"Take care to guard against all greed, for though one may be rich, one's life does not consist of possessions." Then he told them a parable.

ST. ALPHONSUS LIGOURI- AUGUST 1

Saint Alphonsus was born into a well-respected family in 1696, in Marianella, in the Kingdom of Naples. He received an exceptional education through private tutors and was conferred degrees in civil and canon law at 16. He practiced law for 8 years before he turned to the Church. He was ordained a priest in 1726.

Saint Alphonsus traveled for 26 years in Kingdom of Naples preaching. His style of ministry was called "mission among the people," he and a group of priests or lay brothers would go to rural areas, staying for a time to teach, preach, and pray with the people there. Saint Alphonsus was a brilliant preacher, he was able to connect with ordinary people and his teaching and sermons were marked by his compassion. In a time of restrictive Church rule, where fear of God was truly fear, Saint Alphonsus taught about God's redeeming love. He also had a special devotion to Mary, praying to her for intercession and including devotions to her in his teaching. He wrote extensively, more than 100 books which have been through thousands of editions. His books are still available today and have been translated into more than 60 languages.

In 1762 Saint Alphonsus was made a bishop by Pope Clement XIII, however, he was eventually allowed to resign his post because of his ill health. He was paralyzed for a time from rheumatic fever in 1775, and had rheumatism so severe it was deforming, bending his head so far forward that his chin rested on his chest.

He died peacefully at the age of 90 in 1787. He was canonized in 1839 by Pope Gregory XVI, and in 1871 he was named a doctor of the church by Pope Pius IX. In 1950 he was declared patron of moral theologians by Pope Pius XII.

ASK DEACON JOE

How do we get God's grace?

Well let's start by distinguishing between the two kinds of graces: actual grace and sanctifying, or habitual, grace. Actual grace is external from us; it refers to the nudges that we receive from God to respond to his call. God may give us a special call to conversion or to a vocation, for example, and then it is up to us to respond. Sanctifying grace, on the other hand resides within us and lives in our soul. It is a free gift, a favor, from God that allows us to become adopted sons and daughters of God. The Catechism of the Catholic Church puts it this way: "Sanctifying grace is an habitual gift, a stable and supernatural disposition that perfects the soul itself to enable it to live with God, to act by his love. Habitual grace, the permanent disposition to live and act in keeping with God's call, is distinguished from actual graces which refer to God's interventions, whether at the beginning of conversion or in the course of the work of sanctification." (CCC #2000)

To sanctify means to make holy, and we need to be holy to enter the Kingdom of Heaven; we need to have sanctifying grace within us. Because of original sin, we are not born with sanctifying grace; we receive it for the first time in the Sacrament of Baptism. (Mary was conceived without original sin and was thus born with sanctifying grace, and that is why at the Annunciation the angel could say: "Hail

Mary, full of grace.") We receive additional graces through the other sacraments, especially through frequent reception of the Eucharist and Reconciliation, that help us to grow in holiness. The Catechism states: "The sacraments are efficacious signs of grace, instituted by Christ and entrusted to the Church, by which divine life is dispensed to us." (CCC #1131) When we commit a mortal sin we lose our sanctifying grace; we no longer have divine life within us. It can only be regained by going to Confession. We can also merit graces through our prayer and charitable actions.. The Catechism states: "Moved by the Holy Spirit and by charity, we can then merit for ourselves and for others the graces needed for our sanctification, for the increase of grace and charity, and for the attainment of eternal life. ... These graces and goods are the object of Christian prayer. Prayer attends to the grace we need for meritorious actions." (CCC #2010) **Deacon Joe**
