

### Question:

Besides the Wise Men, what is significant about the Epiphany?

#### Answer:

Epiphany means "manifestation," or public display. The feast is usually celebrated January 6. In the US, it is celebrated on the Sunday nearest to January 6. It originates from a story unique to Matthew (2:1-12). Magi from the East come to offer homage to the newborn King, presenting him with gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.



This part of Matthew's infancy narrative differs from Luke's account of the birth of Jesus. In Luke there are no Magi, star, nor gifts. Luke has Jesus being born in a stable after Mary and Joseph's long travel from Nazareth to Bethlehem. Matthew seems to have the family living in a house in Bethlehem, where the Magi find them.

Why these differences? They stem from the needs and concerns of the audience the authors were addressing, as well as the theological stance of each author. Knowing the original intention helps get at the correct interpretation of the text.

Since Matthew was writing primarily to a Jewish community, his concern was to show that Jesus did not come just for Jews, but for Gentiles as well. From his very birth, Jesus not only manifests himself to Jews, but also to Gentiles, who are prominently included in the manifestation, symbolized by the Magi and their journey. This is the most significant aspect of the feast of Epiphany. How do you manifest Jesus to all with whom you come into contact?

### The Nativity of the Lord

Our hearts are aglow with the joy of Christmas! Our senses are alive with the season, from the rich smells of evergreen and gingerbread to the feel of crisp air on our skin and the warmth of a loved one's embrace. At some point in the holiday hustle and bustle, take a few moments of quiet. In the silence, reflect on the other senses of the season. Imagine the cool damp of an animal stable, the earthy smell of hay and feed, and the crisp night air blowing in softly. Imagine kneeling beside an exhausted, joyful mother and a relieved, protective father. Imagine an infant wrapped in cloth scraps held out to your open arms. Imagine holding the infant Jesus. As his eyes meet yours, welcome into your heart the greatest gift of Christmas.

#### Question:

I have been away from the Church for a few years and really want to get active again, not so much for me, but for my children. Is this a bad reason to come back to Church?

#### Answer:

If you are on your way to the supermarket, and you are forced to detour from your usual route because of road work, does the food you buy taste different? Is the meal less filling? Are the vegetables less tasty? Of course not. In our faith journey, there are many detours called sin. Some are greater than others, some are even a bit longer. But God's grace comes to us in ways we understand and recognize and need. Your children leading you back to the Church is not as important as the fact that you are back.

### November 23, 2021 UPDATED

Masks are highly encouraged.



From Archbishop Vigneron and The Department of Communications shares the following reminders for COVID-19. With the recent increase in COVID-19 cases in Michigan, and the approaching winter season, we wish remind clergy and parishes of the Archdiocese of Detroit's current guidelines for liturgies:

- \*The Archdiocese of Detroit encourages Mass-goers, regardless of vaccination status, to wear face-coverings and to practice social distancing to reduce exposure to COVID-19
- \*The Archdiocese of Detroit strongly recommends that each pastor/In Solidum team should evaluate their

location in the Archdiocese and implement the following protocols:

- \*Establish an area where social distancing is observed
- \*Strongly encourage masking and social distancing for all Mass-goers
- \*Require all who distribute Holy Communion to wear face-coverings and use hand sanitizer
- \*Hang signage indicating masking and social distancing are strongly encouraged
- \* Ensure that hand sanitizer is readily available at church entrances and near the sanctuary Evaluate space for the choir, and strongly recommend that those who are unvaccinated do not participate in

the choir at this time

\* The faithful are reminded that particular dispensations from the obligation to participate in Holy Mass remain in effect for people who are ill or who find themselves in other specific circumstances. #### COVID Liturgical Protocols which remain in place

- 1. Parishes should continue to provide signage about current COVID protocols.
- 2. Parishes should keep doors open to ventilate churches as they are able.
- 3. Parishes are encouraged to continue the COVID arrangement of vessels for bread/wine on the altar.
- 4. Clergy and Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion should continue to wear masks while distributing Holy Communion.
- 5. Parishes are encouraged to maintain sanitization stations at the locations of the distribution of Holy Communion.
- 6. Parishes are to continue to refrain from the distribution of the Chalice to the faithful (except for a Bride and Groom on their wedding day).

These revised liturgical protocols should be a sign that we have made great progress from March 2020. But we still need to be vigilant in the weeks and months ahead. As we continue to adapt to a new reality, it will be crucial that each of us exercises heroic patience with one another. For some these changes are a welcome adjustment. For others, it will take more time to feel comfortable with the adjustments. For all, this is an opportunity for Christian charity and a renewed commitment to exercise another Unleash the Gospel virtue: unusually gracious hospitality.

If you have a sick family member at home, or you have been recently exposed-STAY
HOME


### Mary, Mother of God Ouestion:

If God is eternal and infinite, how can He have a mother? Why don't we call Mary just the mother of Jesus?

#### **Answer:**

The tile of "Mary, Mother of God" can be confusing. We aren't implying that Mary existed from eternity or that she is divine herself. We aren't promoting some kind of Marian superpowers. The Church has fought for this title throughout the centuries for one simple reason: Christ's identity is at stake.

As the Church grew in the early centuries, theologians wrestled with what it meant for Jesus to be both God and man. Many distortions of his identity began to emerge. One of these was propagated by a man named Nestorius. Nestorius and his followers denied that Jesus' human nature and his divine nature were inseparable. Following that logic, Mary could have only conceived Jesus' human nature. But people don't give birth to a "nature." They give birth to a whole person. For Jesus, his whole person is both human and divine. In 431 A.D. the Council of Ephesus denounced Nestorius. The bishops affirmed that Jesus is both fully human and fully divine and proclaimed Mary Theotokos. Translating the Greek to English, that means "God-bearer." Note that this isn't "God-generator" or "God-creator." Mary bore Jesus, God and man, in her womb and gave him birth. She is mother to the whole person, the whole Jesus, and therefore Mother of God.

### WHAT IS SPIRITUAL COMMUNION

It has long been a Catholic understanding that when circumstances prevent one from receiving Holy Communion it is possible to make an Act of Spiritual Communion, which is a source of grace. Spiritual Communion means uniting one's self in prayer with Christ's sacrifice and worshiping him in his Body and Blood. The most common reason for making an Act of Spiritual Communion is when a person cannot attend Mass. We ask Jesus to unite Himself with us. The basic elements of An Act of Spiritual Communion are an Act of Faith, an Act of Love, and a desire to receive Christ, and invitation for him to come into our heart.

My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament, I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul,

Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart,

I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You.

Never permit me to be separated from You Amen.

### **SACRAMENTS**

Please note . These guidelines apply under normal conditions policy and procedures may change , as needed, in response to the COVID 19 pandemic. Please call the parish family office for more details.

### **INFANT BAPTISM**

Baptisms can be scheduled for the First Sunday of each month at St. Cornelius, the Second Sunday at St. John the Evangelist, with the exception of Lent. Parents must be registered and active members of the clustered parishes for a minimum of three months prior to the arrangement of their child's baptism.

Parents expecting a child are encouraged to contact the parish office prior to the birth of their baby. Both parents and godparents are required to attend the preparation class prior to the baptism. Please contact the office for class times and locations.

### **MARRIAGE**

At least one member of the couple requesting marriage must be registered and active member of the clustered parishes for a minimum of three months prior to filling out the wedding application. (Engaged couples should not be registered under his/her parents.) Applications must be completed a minimum of six months prior to the proposed wedding date to ensure adequate marriage preparation.

#### **PARISH MEMBERSHIP**

The Sacrament of Baptism makes us members of Christ's Body: The Church. As disciples of the Lord we at the parish family of St. Cornelius, St. John the Evangelist live out our Christian faith through the Roman Catholic Tradition. The rights and expectations of the members of the community include: the sacraments, one's spiritual, educational, and social formation, as well as a Christian burial. The community for its part expects that those choosing to be members will keep holy the Sabbath Day, as well as other days of Obligation. Members are encouraged and expected to contribute their time, talent, and financial resources according to their ability in order to maintain, up-build and strengthen the community of faith to which they belong.
