

WHY DO WE DO THAT? CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

Question:

Why is the Church against stem cell research, especially if it offers the possibility of cures for diseases like Alzheimer's and Parkinson's?

Answer:

Like so many issues, the truth about stem cell research is more complicated than a few sound bites and vague promises of cures. For the Church, the problem is with *embryonic* stem cell research, not the research itself. The destruction of human life, even for a seemingly noble cause, is never acceptable. The ends cannot justify the means. Stem cells can be obtained in other ways, including from the placenta as well as from adults. So research is possible without the destruction of other life.

On the other hand, stem cell research shows much promise, but no concrete results. Some scientists also dispute what diseases might be cured by new discoveries. The research is still in its early stages. The question for our country is whether we should invest a lot of money in research now, looking for cures that will probably remain out of reach for most people, or should we invest that money in other programs with more immediate benefits, especially those that stress prevention and education. It is indeed a complex issue that requires close scrutiny and investigation before we jump to inaccurate conclusions or make decisions based on good, but misinformed, intentions.





Communications shares the following reminders for COVID-19. With the recent increase in COVID-19 cases in Michigan, and the approaching winter season, we wish remind clergy and parishes of the Archdiocese of Detroit's current guidelines for liturgies:

*The Archdiocese of Detroit encourages Mass-goers, regardless of vaccination status, to wear facecoverings and to practice social distancing to reduce exposure to COVID-19

*The Archdiocese of Detroit strongly recommends that each pastor/In Solidum team should evaluate their location in the Archdiocese and implement the following protocols:

- * Ensure that hand sanitizer is readily available at church entrances and near the sanctuary Evaluate space for the choir, and strongly recommend that those who are unvaccinated do not participate in the choir at this time
- * The faithful are reminded that particular dispensations from the obligation to participate in Holy Mass remain in effect for people who are ill or who find themselves in other specific circumstances. More information is available at <u>aod.org/emergencyresponse</u>

COVID Liturgical Protocols which remain in place

- 1. Parishes should continue to provide signage about current COVID protocols.
- 2. Parishes should keep doors open to ventilate churches as they are able.
- 3. Parishes are encouraged to continue the COVID arrangement of vessels for bread/wine on the altar.
- 4. Clergy and Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion may continue to wear masks while distributing Holy Communion. (Optional)

5. Parishes are encouraged to maintain sanitization stations at the locations of the distribution of Holy Communion. These revised liturgical protocols should be a sign that we have made great progress from March 2020. But we still need to be vigilant in the weeks and months ahead. As we continue to adapt to a new reality, it will be crucial that each of us exercises heroic patience with one another. For some these changes are a welcome adjustment. For others, it will take more time to feel comfortable with the adjustments. For all, this is an opportunity for Christian charity and a renewed commitment to exercise another Unleash the Gospel virtue: unusually gracious hospitality.

SAINT OF THE WEEK -EXAMPLES OF OUR FAITH

Saint Germaine was born in Pibrac, France in 1579 to poor parents. Her story is a heart wrenching one. She was born with a deformed right arm and hand, and her mother died when she was an infant. Her father remarried, but her stepmother brutally abused and neglected her. As a child Germaine suffered from scrofula. a disfiguring form of tuberculosis which causes swelling and lesions on the side of the neck. Already sick, abused, and starving, she was forced to sleep in barn with sheep she tended.

Despite everything,

Germaine lived each day tending her flock with joy and in prayer. Mary and Jesus became her friends. She shared what little she had and taught the children of the village about God's love. A rosary made of string knots was her constant companion. She attended Mass every day, leaving her sheep in care of guardian angels. Her flock was never attacked by wolves and never wandered. Some claimed to see the waters of the flooded river part so she could get to Mass. She is often portrayed with an apron full of flowers because one winter day her stepmother accused her of stealing bread from the house and hiding it her apron. But when she was seized and forced to open the apron an abundance of spring flowers tumbled forth. It was this incident that compelled the villagers and even her parents to recognize her holiness. Germaine died at 22, her poor body was found by her father, in the barn where she slept. She was buried in the village church. More than forty years later, her body was accidentally exhumed and found to be incorrupt. She was canonized by Pope Pius IX in 1867 <u>©L</u>Pi and inscribed into the canon of virgins.

PRAY THE ROSARY WITH CREATION

GOSPEL MEDITATION

In creative celebration of the Most Holy Trinity, pray a rosary with creation. Find a quiet place outside or sit near a window. Contemplate the amazing Divine Gift that is before you. Admire it. Study it. Become one with it. Ask for the guidance of Brother St. Francis as you pray: "You, Holy Father, are King of heaven and earth. You are three in one, God above all gods. You are good, all good, and supreme good, Lord God, living and true. You are love. You are beauty. You are gentleness. You are joy. You are hope and happiness." Admire the wonder and majesty of God in all that is around you. Ask for wisdom and understanding.

Begin each decade with the Our Father and conclude with the Glory Be.

Decade one: Contemplate God the Father. As you pray each bead with a Hail Mary, get lost in the grandeur of all that you see. Imagine the thousands and thousands of years of history that is before you. Envision a time when nothing existed. What is nothing? Lift your eyes, heart, and soul to the power and magnificence of the universe, its expanse and its endlessness. You are one with it all. God's creative power.

Decade two: Contemplate God the Son. Behold the squirrels, birds, and critters all conducting life's business. They have heartbeats just like yours. Praying each bead, become one with the incarnate divine life that flows through you and flows with the smallest of creatures. It is holy innocence and blessed life. Tenderness. Compassion, Mercy. Reverence. All want to be held, have a home, and be loved. God in all things. Emmanuel.

Decade three: Contemplate God the Holy Spirit. The changing of times and seasons happens often without notice. It is all within God's care and guided. We all belong. Behold the living, dying, and rising to new life. You are one with all time from beginning into eternity.

Decade Four: Contemplate God as One.

Decade Five: Contemplate God as three. All different while remaining one. The divine dance is being danced before you. Rest in what you see. Become what you see. We are all connected: God of the Holy Trinity, creation, our brothers and sisters, the animals, and the plants.

The rosary you have prayed celebrates the circle of connectedness and the intimate relationship we share with all things: a glimpse of the Trinity.

It has long been a Catholic understanding that when circumstances prevent one from receiving Holy Communion it is possible to make an Act of Spiritual Communion, which is a source of grace. The most common reason for making an Act of Spiritual Communion is when a person cannot attend Mass. We ask Jesus to unite Himself with us. The basic elements of An Act of Spiritual Communion are an Act of Faith, an Act of Love, and a desire to receive Christ, and invitation for him to come into our heart.

SACRAMENTS

Please note . These guidelines apply under normal conditions policy and procedures may change , as needed, in response to the COVID 19 pandemic. Please call the parish family office for more details.

INFANT BAPTISM

Baptisms can be scheduled for the First Sunday of each month at St. Cornelius, the Second Sunday at St. John the Evangelist, with the exception of Lent. Parents must be registered and active members of the clustered parishes for a minimum of three months prior to the arrangement of their child's baptism.

Parents expecting a child are encouraged to contact the parish office prior to the birth of their baby. Both parents and godparents are required to attend the preparation class prior to the baptism. Please contact the office for class times and locations.

MARRIAGE

At least one member of the couple requesting marriage must be registered and active member of the clustered parishes for a minimum of three months prior to filling out the wedding application. (Engaged couples should not be registered under his/her parents.) Applications must be completed a minimum of six months prior to the proposed wedding date to ensure adequate marriage preparation.

PARISH MEMBERSHIP

The Sacrament of Baptism makes us members of Christ's Body: The Church. As disciples of the Lord we at the parish family of St. Cornelius, St. John the Evangelist live out our Christian faith through the Roman Catholic Tradition. The rights and expectations of the members of the community include: the sacraments, one's spiritual, educational, and social formation, as well as a Christian burial. The community for its part expects that those choosing to be members will keep holy the Sabbath Day, as well as other days of Obligation. Members are encouraged and expected to contribute their time, talent, and financial resources according to their ability in order to maintain, up-build and strengthen the community of faith to which they belong.
