





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GOSPEL MEDITATION


December 26, 2021 The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph

Families can be very difficult things to negotiate. This is true not only of our families of origin, the current family of which we are a part, the family of our Church, our society, and our global family as well. Everything human can be found in family stories. Those stories speak of wonderful life-giving successes as well as painful spirit-robbing abuses. Our greatest joys and our greatest wounds are usually connected with the experience of family. Our needs, experiences, and unresolved baggage often color what we bring to our familiar relationships. They contribute to our level of defensiveness, how guarded and protected we become, and what prejudices we believe.


In order to break the cycle of dysfunction we have to remember that it is not only by human effort that we negotiate the difficult and challenging events of our lives. There is a Divine Effort at work as well. For sure, the human effort can create quite a mess and easily destroy lives. This is true of any family with which we are associated. Today's Feast of the Holy Family serves to help us understand that there is a Divine Story being told as well. It is a story of perseverance in the face of hardship, determination in the face of despair, healing when we see nothing but wounds, and light where there is darkness.

Do we believe that God is always working, guiding, restoring, and leading? Unless we do, we will never be free from the imperfections and wounds that bind us and never be able to understand what it really means to forgive. Pope Francis tells us that the "light which comes from the Holy Family encourages us to offer human warmth to other families." While this is most certainly true, we can only really begin to do this when we realize that we are still works in progress, not anchored to the wounds and sins of our past, and still a leading star in God's continually unfolding story of love. The Holy Family persevered and radiated warmth because they knew they were not alone. We can too.

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Presents under the Christmas tree are nice, but they can't heal a hurting marriage. Retrouvaille is for couples with marriages that are struggling, not communicating well, or those considering separation or divorce. It is also for those who are already separated or divorced that want marriage help. Some couples attend during the initial signs of a marriage problem. Other couples are in a state of despair and hopelessness when they attend the program. Some couples have been married for many years, while others have been married only a short time and encountered trouble. This is the BEST Christmas gift you could ever give yourself, your spouse, your children, your family and your friends!!

From the Office of Faith Formation

Sacrament Preparation

First Reconciliation:

To Begin Again Retreat will be held on Tuesday, January 25, 2022 6:30-7:15 pm in the Church. All children preparing to receive the sacrament should attend with a parent.

Confirmation Preparation:

As Christians we are called to care for the poor, the weak, the suffering, the disenfranchised, the oppressed. We are called to fight for the outsider, the voiceless, those who have not been given the tools to fight for themselves.

We do this not to make ourselves feel good or because we want to get into Heaven and not because we are the Good News to them. We do this because they are the Good News to us. They reveal to us what is wrong with our systems. When we listen to the outsider, the poor, the oppressed, the suffering, the marginalized they speak to us of a problem within our society. A problem that needs correction. They are the voice of God, the sight of God, stronger than any army. When we seek to change the oppressive systems, this is Social Justice. Social Justice is something the Church has always been engaged in. In preparing to be Confirmed, the candidates commit themselves to service and learning what it means to be connected to the Church in this way. Families play an essential role in helping these young people to serve. It is in the home that it all begins. From there we grow to see the bigger picture, how we are complicit in systems of oppression and how we can fight for change.

Candidates are working on the *Chosen to be Sent* Journals parts 3 & 4. In this section, the candidate is asked to engage in a mini Bible study on the story of creation. In chapter three of the book of Genesis we learn of a situation where suspicion is introduced to the first humans with the intent to break the trust between them and God. It worked. The suspicion yielded negative consequences and the relationships began to unravel. Part three of the journal makes the connection between what is described in Genesis 3 and the candidate's own experience with the subsequent *blame, shame and defame* game that defines much of what we experience in the world today.

After reading the description of the tale of Adam and Eve and the introduction of the world where opposites no longer exist in harmony the candidate is asked to explore his or her own experience with the tension of opposites.

In part 4, candidates reflect on the unfolding of God's plan to restore *Original Blessing* to humanity. This is a perfect section to work on during the Christmas Season as it initially focuses on the Incarnation of Jesus. The Old Testament prophets brought messages of rescue, repentance, hope and restoration from fallen human nature. Jesus is the fulfillment of those messages and we learn from Scripture that His ministry centered on *healing and restorative justice*.

Candidates will use their imaginations and reflect on their own experiences of observing and dealing with rejection and conflict. These are experiences Jesus also encountered and addressed. By studying how Jesus lived and what he taught we can learn to deal with these situations in the best possible way. These are important lessons for those seeking full initiation in the Catholic Church. They are necessary for growing as a disciple of Christ.



St. Thomas Becket Feast Day December 29

Despite being good friends, King Henry II of England and Thomas Beckett (1118 — 1170) engaged in a perilous struggle to determine the line of authority between church and state. King Henry appointed Thomas as his chancellor, a position of responsibility and power second only to that of the king himself. Thomas proved to be an extraordinarily supportive and capable assistant.

King Henry want to consolidate his power making Thomas archbishop He proposed the idea to Canterbury. Thomas upon the death of Archbishop Theobald in 1162. Thomas hesitated, but allowed the king to carry out his plan. Thomas was ordained a priest and soon was consecrated archbishop of Canterbury in a spectacular event. Thomas took his new position seriously and began declaring independence from Henry by resigning his office of chancellor. He began to fast and pray with earnest devotion.

Systematically, and in bold and dramatic ways, Thomas began to untangle the church in England from civil authority. In 1164 Thomas openly broke with Henry. For his own safety, Thomas fled to France. In July, 1170, Henry and Thomas reconciled and Thomas return to Canterbury. The issues of church and state, however, remained unsettled. Emotions raged and tempers flared. Henry, in a fit of passion, let slip some unguarded words which, however they may have been intended, were construed as orders from the king to eliminate Thomas. Four of Henry's knights went to Canterbury and murdered Thomas in his church, at the foot of the altar, in 1170. Within three years after his death, Thomas Becket was canonized as a martyr.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Some of my fondest childhood memories are of my dad leading my three sisters and me in song as we made the hour-long drive to visit my grand-parents every other weekend. Granted, our silly car songs don't qualify as "singing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs," as Paul advised the Colossians, but I do think they reveal that my dad took to heart Paul's advice about family and faith. Paul writes that in putting on holiness, kindness, gentleness, and forgiving one another, we "put on love, that is, the bond of perfection." Whatever we do, in word or deed, we ought to do in the name of the Lord Jesus. Fathers, mothers, and children are to love one another, seeking and choosing the good for one another, and helping each other along life's journey – on long car trips as well as in a lifetime of situations. On this feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, we honor their perfect holiness and love, and pray that God may continue to perfect us in holiness and love within our own families, that we may bear good fruit for the Kingdom.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Three Days? Mary and Joseph couldn't find Jesus for three days! Any parent who has had a child missing for a few seconds understands the anxiety Mary and Joseph experienced in three long days of searching for Jesus. In the end, though, all is well – they find him, and the peace of Christ casts out their fears. It is a remarkable scene: Jesus' parents are astonished to see him teaching in the temple, and Jesus is curious as to why they were looking for him – did they not know where he would be? This event marks a sort of milestone in their lives together, as Jesus has hinted at his future public ministry, and his parents have experienced that first bit of soul-piercing that Mary will later fully undergo. For each of them, love is what directed their actions. Joseph and Mary put aside everything to search for their son; Jesus put aside everything to serve his Father; and they joined together in humble obedience to God's will for them. The Holy Family models a way of living for us to imitate, and to witness to others in that imitation.

SERVE/STUDY Perhaps you have some down time in this coming week between Christmas and New Year's. As a family, choose an activity that allows you to think outside yourselves and serve others. Or make a plan to read the Scripture for each day of the upcoming week; everyone can choose a favorite verse to memorize each day. You may be surprised how often these verses enter your mind throughout the week.


