

Saint Stephen December 26

The Acts of the Apostles tells the story of St. Stephen, the first Christian martyr. A man filled with grace and power, he worked great wonders among the people. Some Jews debated with St. Stephen but could not match his wisdom and spirit. Eventually, a charge of blasphemy was brought up against him, and the local population demanded that he be tried and sentenced. He was seized and carried before the Sanhedrin.

Despite the danger he faced, in front of the Sanhedrin and his accusers, St. Stephen gave a long speech about the history of Israel and the blessings that God had given upon His chosen people. He talked about how Israel had become disobedient despite God's abundant mercy. This enraged his accusers, and eventually the crowd dragged him out of the city and stoned him to death.

Even in his final moments, St. Stephen displayed great forgiveness and even asked God not to hold the sins of his attackers against them. Hundreds of years after his death, he is still a role model for us to follow.

Saint John the Apostle December 27

Saint John was one of the Twelve, part of Jesus' inner circle, among the few that witnessed the Transfiguration, the raising of Jarius' Daughter, and the Agony in the garden at Gethsemane. He and his brother James were the sons of Zebedee and Salome. When Jesus called them, they left their father mending nets and followed him. Jesus called the brothers "Boanerges," meaning "sons of thunder" — they were passionate in their faith and Jesus had to rebuke them for their fiery zeal on more than one occasion. John, the younger brother, possibly the youngest disciple, was the only one present at Jesus' death.

Saint John the Apostle is traditionally thought to be the author of the fourth Gospel, the three Epistles of John, and the Book of Revelation. However, there has been some debate among scholars from antiquity to the present. Tradition also gives him the title Beloved Disciple and John's Gospel sees him seated next to Jesus at the last supper and the one to whom Jesus gives the care of Mary at the crucifixion.

Although Church tradition says that John survived the other disciples, living a long life, much of it is steeped in myth and legend. Some say he retired to Ephesus after the crucifixion with Mary and remained there until he died. But in other traditions he is more active. For a time he remained in Jerusalem with the other disciples, then founded churches in Asia Minor. In a legend of his persecution, during the reign of the Emperor Domitian, John is taken to Rome and thrown into a cauldron of boiling oil but preserved from death. He is then exiled to the island of Patmos where the Book of Revelation was written.

Most accounts agree that after his exile and the Assumption of Mary he returned to Ephesus where he died sometime after 98, during the reign of the Emperor Trajan.

GOSPEL MEDITATION

December 25, 2022 The Nativity of the Lord

As we age, time seems to pass more quickly. Years seemingly fly by as one holiday flows into the next, January quickly becomes December and life maintains its hectic pace. What do we accomplish in all of that busyness? Perhaps technology is responsible for some of the frenzy, keeping us isolated in our social media worlds, communicating through texts rather than in person, and always connected to world events. We're over stimulated in many ways by information, noise, opinions, and ideologies. Yet, we still find the time to decorate our homes, purchase gifts, and plan Christmas gatherings. We know, however, that the true meaning of Christmas is not found in twinkling lights, beautifully adorned trees, perfectly set tables or exchanged gifts. We are being called to something deeper and more authentic.

Christmas reminds us to look for God along the way of our lives and not get distracted by the illusions around us. Our world's complexity can leave us feeling displaced, desperate, alone, neglected, and unimportant. Joseph and Mary felt that way too. In the midst of all that captures and intrigues us in our self-created virtual worlds, is this longing for the anchor of faith to keep us grounded and make sense of it all. Only faith can give us the perspective to see what truly matters in life. We discover our divinely humanity. The uncertain and challenging journey to Bethlehem gives way to the tender moments of birth and its embrace. Christmas softens us and slows us down a bit. It shows us Jesus as the light who enlightens everyone. It shows us the truth.

The faith that comes from Christmas calms our fears and allows us to go into the nighttime of our lives courageously. We are never lost or alone. We need to stop and savor more of life's moments before they slip away in time. God is with us, loving us, and leading us where we need to be. God is born again and again in every soul willing to give birth to His presence. God connects us and provides us with a place where we feel safe and welcome home. Merry Christmas!

My Shock Absorber

My decades old impulse to call him when something big happens surfaced a couple weeks ago. I was leaving the parking lot of Kroger when a police situation developed. It was dramatic, terrifying and left me completely trapped. Feeling the shock, I grabbed the phone to call Dad. Taking a deep breath, I paused. He is no longer there at the other end of the phone. Just two months ago, he left for heaven. He would have been 90 today as I write this reflection. I miss him.



From the time I was young, Dad was there to catch me. When I was 19 and totaled my car, I called Dad. When I lost my credit card and panicked because I couldn't

buy my books at college, I called Dad. Even well into my adult years I'd call him. When my furnace broke, when my husband lost his job, when the kids were sick, when I was sick, when the house flooded, when my daughter had a bad car accident, I called Dad. In addition, there are those moments too personal to mention here that I called Dad. He functioned as my earliest shock absorber. Always there to buffer the blows, soften the impact, ease the tension and provide support in oh so many ways. In my most vulnerable states he kept me safe, helped me pick up the pieces, pull myself together and continue on.

Dad's early life was fashioned by shocking details. His mother, destitute and abandoned by her husband, had little choice but to put her four year old son in foster care and ultimately release him for adoption. It was during the Great Depression, she had many children but no means to care for them all. She was in a desperate and shocking situation. Two years later Dad was adopted by two loving people, my Grandma and Grandpa, who adored him and became the shock absorbers in his young life. I am so grateful for all of them, even the one who abandoned his family. It humbles me to know that my existence, as well as that of my six siblings, four children, four (almost five) grandchildren and several nieces and nephews came forth from such a sad and tragic situation. But isn't that true in some way for all of us? Somewhere in the history of our families we find (or would find) shocking details followed by the discovery of the shock absorbers. The ones who lay down their very lives so others can live. Out of death comes life. I believe I come from a long line of shock absorbers and have assumed the role myself. This is one of the basic job requirements for parents, grandparents, extended family, friends and communities of faith.

Christmas is the celebration of the incarnation of the greatest of shock absorbers. Everything about the story of the birth of Jesus is dreadful. Our imaginations can't help but be transfixed by the thought of a long journey on a donkey while nine months pregnant, having to give birth in a cold stable in an occupied country, away from family and friends, using a dirty manger for a crib, and having to flee from an angry King who wanted to kill the baby. In this story, God came into a cold, heartless world. Shocking, shocking,

If it weren't for the fact that we know how the story goes would we even find the Nativity scene heartwarming at all? Probably not. We'd find it disturbing and unappealing. But I think it's meant to disturb us. It's meant to force us to contemplate suffering around us and maybe consider how we can function as shock absorbers. We are called to go beyond our comfort zones, to the most vulnerable "babies in the manger", to seek them out and bring them gifts.

The one who heals, born in such tragic circumstances is eventually brutally crucified. In the face of such violence, he counters with nonviolence, with mercy and love. All of this story should shake us up. Jesus willingly took upon himself the sin of the world and liberated humanity from the bonds of sin and death. We must ask ourselves, as the ones who follow His Way, how can we live like this?

My Dad's death was like a sonic blast. Although I saw it coming, it still catapulted me into a free fall. Dad was my first major shock absorber but he wasn't the last. I feel so fortunate to have my faith, my husband, my children, my siblings and friends who all help to absorb the shock of losing him. In that parking lot at Kroger, I pivoted my impulse and called my baby sister.

As we gaze upon our Nativity scenes this Christmas Season may the Spirit of Holiness captivate us and illuminate those in our path, in our families, neighborhoods, schools, and places of work who are most vulnerable. May our hearts be cracked wide open and may we discover the gift of serving as their shock absorbers.



The Nativity of the Lord

Is 52:7-10 | Heb 1:1-6 | Jn 1:1-18

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

The day we have been awaiting has arrived: Christ is born! All of our Christmas preparations - wrapping gifts and preparing holiday meals to be shared among family and friends - are meant to glorify and reflect God's own work for and in us. That is, God's greatest gift of himself, clothed in mortal flesh, who would one day offer himself as the bread of life: "The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us." Jesus came to the world in the form of the most helpless of us all, a newborn infant, so that through him we would be reconciled to the Father, for "to those who did accept him he gave power to become children of God." We celebrate the Incarnation of the Lord, for Christ is our salvation! It is through Christ and the power of the Holy Spirit that we are adopted into God's family and receive the fullness of his grace. The fullness of God's truth is revealed in Jesus Christ, "The Lord has made his salvation known"; "he has spoken to us through the Son." Let us give thanks and rejoice this day!

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

The Good News of Jesus Christ is not meant to be kept to ourselves. Today's Gospel reading reminds us that John the Baptist testified to the light of Christ before Christ had yet publicly appeared. Sharing the Good News is not optional! Even the earth proclaims the Good News in Isaiah, "announcing salvation, and saying to Zion, 'Your God is King!'" Indeed, Christ the King – God in human flesh – has arrived. Just as John was sent before the Lord to proclaim his coming, so are we charged: Sent out to the world to go and announce the Gospel of the Lord, "so that all might believe."

witness How might you go out and proclaim the coming of the Lord? Don't forget: sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ isn't limited just to speaking to others. It includes *living* as Christ did – feeding the hungry, caring for the sick and the poor, defending the helpless – because we are Christ's body in the world.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

Being The Sign

I think the real challenge of evangelization in the modern age is the reality that pretty much everyone has already heard of Jesus Christ — or, at least, they think they have.

To our 21st-century eyes, the angel who shared news of the birth of Jesus with the shepherds had an easy job. All he had to do was announce it.

Our baptism compels us to do the same — to announce the coming of Christ over and over again, always and everywhere. But our audience is not a group of illiterate shepherds in ancient Judea. Our audience is a world that has heard so much about Jesus they often claim weariness of his name. So how do we do it? If we walk into a crowd of strangers and tell them we want to talk about Jesus, their reaction will probably be either "I already know about Jesus, thanks," or "I've heard of him, and based on the behavior of those who claim to follow him, I'm really not interested in hearing more."

Because in the end, our very lives are how we "announce his salvation" in the present day. We announce it in our actions to strangers. We announce it in our treatment of people who have wronged us. We announce it in our interactions with those who disagree with us.

How long had the coming of the Messiah been foretold to the Israelites? So long that, no doubt, many of them despaired of his coming altogether. So, God had to give them a sign: "You will find an infant wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger."

Now we are the sign.


