







A note from the Pastor . . .

Just as Jesus began to assemble his group of friends by calling Simon and Andrew plus James and John, as we heard in today's Gospel, we too are called to be followers of Jesus as part of a group. And while we, as a parish community, are one large group, there are many opportunities for us to become involved in smaller, more intimate and accessible groups here at OLQM. One such group that is sprouting a new ministry here at OLQM is a once a month opportunity for men of the parish to gather for coffee and conversation on Saturday mornings. The first gathering was a diverse cross section of school dads and dads with grown children, Knights of Columbus, St. Vincent de Paul, coaches and teachers.... We plan to meet again in February and we hope to grow in numbers so keep an eye on The Witness and OLQM communications for more information. This group is open to all men and I believe it will be come a strong spiritual base for OLQM men in 2023.

All parishes consist of a number of subgroups that exist among the greater parish community. Sunday of the Word of God

This Sunday, the Third Sunday of Ordinary Time, we celebrate the **Sunday of the Word of God**. In 2019, Pope Francis instituted the Sunday of the Word of God “so as to appreciate the inexhaustible riches contained in that constant dialogue between the Lord and his people” (*Misericordia et Misera*, 7). The Scriptures are treasures filled with countless riches! From Genesis to Revelation, God speaks to us in human language. By speaking to us, God reveals his part in this great love story: “God is love, and whoever remains in love remains in God and God in him” (1 John 4:16).

The Scriptures are not dead letters on a page, but living words that have been given life by the Holy Spirit, who also gives light to our minds when we read them. Nor is the Word of God a list of rules, but an invitation to share the life of the living God, their author.

In his letter establishing this special celebration, Pope Francis shares, “It is fitting, then, that the life of our people be constantly marked by this decisive relationship with the living word that the Lord never tires of speaking to his Bride, that she may grow in love and faithful witness” (*Aperuit illis*, 2). Every story told in the Scriptures, even the most challenging, reminds us that God loves his people and will always be faithful to the covenant he has made with us. God sent us his Son, the Word Incarnate, not only to *speak* these words of faithful love, but also to *show* us the depths of faithful love by dying on the cross and rising from the dead. Every word of Scripture points to this message of love enacted in the person of Jesus Christ, who is the Word himself.

In the Archdiocese of Detroit, we hear a lot about the power of the Word of God. We speak of the Gospel as something to be unleashed. We recognize that the Word of God has the potential to change hearts. When we proclaim the Word to others, they encounter the *power* of the Word and the *person* of the Word: Jesus Christ. But have you personally spent enough time hearing what Jesus is saying to you through the Word?

Pope Francis is asking everyone in the Church, every diocese, parish, family, and parishioner, to read and listen to the Word of God anew. Consider your favorite Scripture passage. How has God used it to speak to you, change your heart, lead you, or bring you peace? Ask yourself how can I be open in these coming days to receive the gift of loving the Word of God more?

In honor of this celebration, thank the readers at your parish who proclaim the Word of God and the priests and deacons who preach it. With your family or other parishioners, find a time today to re-read today's Gospel and plan a time this week to read next Sunday's Gospel. What does God need to teach you and cure within you so you can proclaim the Good News of his kingdom to others?

GOSPEL MEDITATION

January 22, 2023

The 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

When I was a young seminarian, I asked a wise old priest how to pray better. He said simply, “Don’t lie when you pray.” He helped me to see how much energy I waste in trying to appear acceptable to God when I pray. For me, prayer was showing off for God and hiding what was ugly.

It's stunning that the Gospel of Matthew tells us of Jesus, “He left Nazareth and went to live in Capernaum by the sea, in the region of Zebulon and Naphtali...” This isn't just the Lord's relocation up north. It's his moving into places of shame and defeat. This region was where the enemy invasion of Israel began centuries before. Jesus left the comfortable confines of Nazareth and sought out a place of darkness, not to bring shame, but to announce the dawning of his light.

When we pray, we usually prefer Jesus to stay put in our little Nazareths — where we feel comfortable, successful, and in control. But he moves. He re-locates into the Zebulons and Naphtalis of our shame, embarrassment, fear, and sense of being defeated. The question for us is: will we allow him to take up residence in those places in our prayer time? Will we talk to him honestly about our places of darkness? If we do, we're no longer lying when we pray.

Catechist Spotlight

Mrs. Maria Hutzley teaches grade seven in our Monday after school faith formation program. She has been teaching for more than fifteen years. Mrs. Hutzley taught grade one at Shrine for seven years before coming to OLQM and teaching grade one here. She has also taught grades two and eight and is now in her third year of teaching grade seven. Early on Maria was assisted in the classroom by her daughters, Vanessa and Samantha and when they went off to college her husband, Bruce, became her number one assistant. Maria has worked for 24 years as an educator in the Birmingham Schools teaching ESL and as a paraeducator. When asked what she likes best about teaching grade 7 she said “the dialogue, the conversations we have in class about the topics regarding our lessons, sharing the faith, and talking freely about God and other topics of concern the students may wish to discuss.”

Mr. & Mrs. Hutzley bring their deep love of Christ and creativity in passing on the faith to the classroom. They help with children enter into prayer with creative and effective methods.

Mr. Bill Phillips also teaches grade 7 faith formation for our Monday program. This is his 6th year as a catechist and he has taught both seventh and eighth grade. Bill and his wife, Michelle, have been part of our OLQM community since 2003. Bill obtained a degree in engineering from the University of Houston. He has held positions at GM, Chrysler and with various suppliers but he has always loved teaching the most and after retiring from engineering, Bill took a position at Marian High School teaching Statistics and Advanced Statistics.

When asked what he likes best about teaching grade 7 Bill says, the students are “beginning to be able to think conceptually -- not everything has to be concrete. We can really explore what it means personally to be a member of a community, what the value of prayer can be, what it would have been like to be a disciple when Jesus was on earth and what it means to be his disciple now.” He explains that at this age they are very engaged in conversation. He says, “Sometimes I open their eyes to something new, and frequently they surprise me with their maturity or insight as well.”

We are so grateful for The Hutzleys and for Mr. Phillips.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Since the Fall, the world has been riddled with strife and divisiveness. From the disobedience in the Garden, to Cain and Abel, to conflicts and wars throughout the centuries, it's clear that we humans are prone to picking sides and fighting over them. We hear about this even within the early Church from St. Paul in today's second reading. There were rivalries, and Christians were saying things such as, "I belong to Paul" or "I belong to Cephas." But Paul wisely asks: "Is Christ divided? Was Paul crucified for you? Or were you baptized in the name of Paul?" Clearly not. There is only one source of Truth – Jesus Christ – and Paul never hesitated to refuse credit for himself, and to instead glorify the Lord in his word and deed. This is the model set for us – to refuse to set ourselves or God-made-in-our-own-image over and against the Triune God who created us. Christ came to unite us with himself and to one another, in reconciliation with the Father. His words are now our words: Repent and believe in the Gospel. Pray for the grace to come together as the body of Christ so that we can be his hands and feet in the world and carry out the work he began.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

In Jesus Christ the kingdom of God enters into human history, fulfilling God's promise of salvation for his people. Christ inaugurated the kingdom on earth, and as members of his Church we are responsible for continuing to build it – here and now. As Christ called his first disciples and made them "fishers of men," so he calls us, that we might go forth "proclaiming the gospel of the kingdom, and curing every disease and illness among the people."

PRAY The Lord has commissioned us to take the Gospel to the ends of the earth. Where we cannot go physically or in person, we can go in prayer. Bring before the Lord all who yet need to hear his voice and repent and believe. Pray for those who are persecuted for their belief in Jesus Christ.




Saint Francis de Sales: Pastor of Souls



St. Thomas Aquinas

January 28

St. Thomas Aquinas (1225 - 1274; of Aquino, Italy) was an Italian philosopher and theologian known as the Angelic Doctor. Born of a wealthy family at Rocca Secca, near Naples, in Italy, he disappointed his family by joining a poor order of preachers (1244) that followed the Rule of Dominic and were therefore known as Dominicans. In 1245, he began to study in Paris, France with Albertus Magnus ("Albert the Great") whose favorite pupil he became.

In 1248, he accompanied Albert to Cologne, Germany. From there, Thomas returned to Paris (1252) where he became known as a great teacher and theologian. He spent some time in Rome as a papal advisor, returned to Paris to teach for a period and then returned to Naples to found a house of studies (1272). In 1274, on the way to a church council at Lyons, France, he took sick and died at the age of 49.

His works show him to be a brilliant lecturer, a clear thinker and an Aristotelian. In an age which was uncomfortable with the notion that the universe could be known apart from revelation, he pioneered the use of the Greek philosophy that featured the power of reason to demonstrate that God and his universe could be understood by reason guided by faith. His large girth and slow, deliberate style earned him the nickname "The Dumb Ox!"

Besides being a gifted thinker, he was the composer of several religious hymns such as *O Salutaris Hostia* and *Pange Lingua* which are the most familiar to modern worshippers. His many writings include *The Summa Theologica* (1267-1273), which earned him a lasting reputation among scholars and religious alike.






