



Deacon Chris's Corner.....



Back on Monday, January 2nd, I, like so many millions of Americans, was watching a National Football League game being played in the evening between the Cincinnati Bengals and Buffalo Bills. It was not too many minutes or plays into the game when Damar Hamlin, a Buffalo Bills defensemen, took a blow in the chest while making a tackle. After getting up momentarily, he fell to the ground, suffering a cardiac arrest. The medical staff attended to him, giving him CPR. The teams gathered around

the scene so that most outsiders and certainly those from the TV viewing audience couldn't really see what was taking place, which was probably and good thing. All we knew was that something was very wrong and there was no control over the outcome.

As the coverage continued, it was clear that the sportscasters from ESPN did not really know what to say, as they were in shock of what was taking place and had never experienced anything like this before. So, what ended up rising to the top of the coverage? A consensus of people who realized that only God was in control of the situation. As a result, the sportscasters of the coverage, each in their own way, started recognizing the need for **prayer to God** in this chilling situation. And, for the rest of the coverage of the scene, in which the game ultimately was cancelled, the sportscasters made it known over and over again that Damar and his family were in their prayers.

Our Gospel tells us today, "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven." Basically, what this means is when we realize that we are not in control of this life but, rather, God is in control - when we are truly humble and poor in spirit - we will inherit the promise of eternal life with God, the promise of the kingdom of heaven.

In the days that followed the Damar Hamlin medical emergency, he made a remarkable recovery, even to the point of returning home eight days after the incident took place, I believe. What was even more remarkable is that Damar and some of his fellow teammates continued, beyond that frightful night, to give thanks to God. They realized that something happened that night that was different: Only God could have orchestrated the positive, life-saving outcome.

I don't know about you, but this gives me great hope in the midst of a world that seems to be heading in a direction where God has been completely removed. For one trying night and several days to follow, God was given the glory. May our world respond always to God with spirits that are truly poor, allowing God to always be in control. Ours will be the kingdom of heaven!

GOSPEL MEDITATION

January 29, 2023
The 4th Sunday in Ordinary Time

In my parents' bedroom there were on the wall two photos of my mom and dad from their early adulthoods. The photo of my mother entranced me when I was a boy. I loved looking at it, even though I saw her in daily life. Something about that picture captured her perfectly. It was an image of the joy, wisdom, beauty, and strength that enveloped me from the start of my life. It was an icon of the woman who fed, taught, and encouraged me. I felt a deep pride that I came from such beauty.

The beatitudes of Jesus are a kind of self-portrait. But it is a strange picture. At first, the blessings of being poor, mourning, and hungering and thirsting for righteousness may seem bizarre or, worse, a religious delusion. Who wants to look like *that*? But if we look again, we begin to see the characteristics of Jesus' form. He becomes poor and fills it with his riches for us, he weeps and mourns for us, and fills it with his joy, he hungers and thirsts for us to be righteous, and so satisfies us. And so on. It's the way he appears on the cross.

Perhaps we should put on our bedroom room walls the words of the beatitudes next to a crucifix of the Lord Jesus. Then we can do what the beatitudes are designed for, to gaze at the joy, wisdom, beauty, and strength of the one who is our origin, and who is with us every day. And little by little, we'll start to look like him.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

I have a competitive streak. Whether it's guessing Wordle in one try, grabbing the last Doorbuster deal at Kohl's or snagging Boardwalk early in a game of Monopoly, I like to win. For this reason, the readings today especially challenge me. In a world that values success, wealth and "winning," today's readings turn things upside down when it comes to status and justice. In Zephaniah, God chooses the "humble and lowly." In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus lays out a road map to lasting happiness that bears little resemblance to what the world tells us, and even what our own instincts may tell us, about being "happy." I'll still buy Boardwalk at the first opportunity, but Jesus' words invite me to focus on seeking righteousness, and to be merciful and "clean of heart." They encourage me to seek the happiness that only Christ can give. Through prayer and reflection on these words, we can ask the Lord to transform our hearts and lives to align with what it truly means to be blessed.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Pope Francis has referred to the Eight Beatitudes as a kind of Christian "identity card." (General Audience, Jan. 2020) And he had a suggestion for those of us, like me, who love to listen to the Sermon on the Mount but may not be sure where to start when it comes to living it. His suggestion is simple: "There are eight Beatitudes, and it would be nice to learn them by heart and to repeat them in order to keep this law that Jesus gives us in our mind and in our hearts." Perhaps we can place each Beatitude on a sticky note by the mirror, incorporate them into our morning prayers, teach them to our children or discuss them with friends. Practice makes perfect, yes? As Pope Francis reminds us, "the Beatitudes always bring you to joy; they are the paths to reach joy."

STUDY Memorize the Eight Beatitudes. Learn about each one by reading the writings of Pope Francis or another theologian such as Bishop Robert Barron. Ask God to help you incorporate them into your daily life.

World Day of Prayer for Consecrated Life February 2, 2023

(Celebrated in Parishes February 4-5)

Instituted by St. Pope John Paul II in 1997, World Day of Prayer for Consecrated Life is celebrated in conjunction with the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, also known as Candlemas Day, which commemorates through the blessing and lighting of candles that Christ is the light of the world. So too, those in consecrated life are called to reflect the light of Jesus Christ to all peoples.

All the faithful are invited to reflect on the importance the role of Consecrated Life is to the life of the Church and to the People of God; it is an intimate part of her mission, holiness, and growth. "The Consecrated Life, deeply rooted in the example and teaching of Christ the Lord, is a gift of God the Father to His Church through the Holy Spirit." Vita Consecrata

Consecrated Life parallels the Gospel account of the Presentation of the Lord in the Temple as it is a life consecrated to God, freely and deliberately chosen in response to His incredible love. Through the Evangelical Counsels of *Poverty, Chastity and Obedience*, following the poor, chaste and obedient Christ, the Consecrated Life gives witness to the primacy of Christ in one's life, witnesses that Jesus Christ is ultimately Who we are called to sacred union with, and seeks a deeper and more intimate relationship with Him through a life dedicated to prayer and service.

Men and women throughout the ages have responded YES to Gods call to give their lives to Christ as Consecrated Religious in order to be more closely configured to the One they love and to live this life espoused to Christ and His Church with love and gratitude in their hearts. The life of consecrated men and women points to a life beyond this world as it is a witness to the way we (all) will live our lives with Jesus Christ in the heavenly Kingdom.

RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

The Humble of the Earth

When I think of the Beatitudes, I think of collectible coffee mugs emblazoned with the words *Blessed are the peacemakers*, with little pastel flowers stenciled in the white spaces of the lettering. I think of greeting cards and decorative wall hangings.

Why? These are the Beatitudes, for heaven's sake — revolutionary and radical. An uncompromising impeachment of worldly values. They are the opposite of banal.

But I cringed from my head to my toes when I read my first draft of this reflection, a retelling of a time in my life when I decided to embrace humility and meekness. I realized that the Beatitudes aren't something I can tell you about. Poverty of spirit, the hunger for righteousness, the gladness God gives to the downtrodden — these are concepts that must be animated within us. They must be lived. So instead of telling you my story, I want you to tell yours.

I invite you to think of a time when you were vulnerable. When you were discouraged or humbled or felt like a failure. A time when you were cut low. The loss of a job, perhaps, or the rejection of a loved one. The abrupt end of some road that you felt sure would be long and prosperous.

Resentment, envy, and vengefulness flourish in moments like this. Did you experience those feelings? Did you embrace them? Did you want to?

What did the world tell you this moment should mean?

What does Christ tell you it should mean? Have you figured it out, or are you still working on it?

God chose the foolish of the world to shame the wise, and God chose the weak of the world to shame the strong.

Presentation of the Lord February 2

At the end of the fourth century, a woman named Etheria made a pilgrimage to Jerusalem. Her journal, discovered in 1887, gives an unprecedented glimpse of liturgical life there. Among the celebrations she describes is the Epiphany, the observance of Christ's birth, and the gala procession in honor of his Presentation in the Temple 40 days later. Under the Mosaic Law, a woman was ritually "unclean" for 40 days after childbirth, when she was to present herself to the priests and offer sacrifice—her "purification." Contact with anyone who had brushed against mystery—birth or death—excluded a person from Jewish worship. This Jesus, emphasizes appearance in the Temple more than Mary's purification.

The observance spread throughout the Western Church in the fifth and sixth centuries. Because the Church in the West celebrated Jesus' birth on December 25, the Presentation was moved to February 2, 40 days after Christmas.

At the beginning of the eighth century, Pope Sergius inaugurated a candlelight procession; at the end of the same century the blessing and distribution of candles which continues to this day became part of the celebration, giving the feast its popular name: Candlemas.





Why do we bless throats?



Every year around this time we are invited to the altar to have our throats blessed. The priest or deacon says:

"Through the intercession of St. Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from every disease of the throat and from every other illness, in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit."

St. Blaise was a bishop in Sebastea, Armenia, who was martyred in the year 316. While not much is known about him for certain, he is said to have blessed a young boy who was choking to death on a fishbone lodged in his throat, curing him.

Eventually, the custom of the blessing of the throats arose. The crossed candles used to impart the blessing may be a reminder of the kindness of a woman who brought candles to him so that he might have light while suffering persecution for his faith in a prison cell.

The Memorial of St. Blaise is Feb. 3. The throat blessings are offered at weekend Masses around that date.

The annual blessing of the throats is a traditional sign of the Christian struggle against illness. With faith, we follow the lead of the Church in asking for St. Blaise's protection.

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Pray for the sick.
