

A Story About Forgiving

Once upon a time, two brothers who lived on adjoining farms fell into conflict. It was the first serious rift in 40 years of farming side by side, sharing machinery, and trading labor and goods as needed without a hitch. Then the long collaboration fell apart. It began with a small misunderstanding, and it grew into a major difference, and finally it exploded into an exchange of bitter words, followed by weeks of silence. One morning, there was a knock on John's door. He opened it to find a man with a carpenter's toolbox. "I am looking for a few days work," he said. "Perhaps you would have a few small jobs here and there. Could I help you?"

"Yes," said the older brother. "I do have a job for you. Look across the creek at that farm. That is my neighbor, and in fact, it is my younger brother. Last week there was a meadow between us. Well, he took his bulldozer to the river levee, and now there is a creek between us!" he said.

"Well, he may have done this to spite me, but I will go him one better. See that pile of lumber curing by the barn? I want you to build me a fence—an eight foot fence—so I will not need to see his place anymore. It will cool him down, anyway." The carpenter said, "I think that I understand the situation. Show me the nails and the post-hole digger, and I will be able to do a job that pleases you." The older brother had to go to town for supplies, so he helped the carpenter get the materials ready, and then he was off for the day. The carpenter worked hard all that day . . . measuring, sawing, and nailing. About sunset, when the farmer returned, the carpenter had just finished his job. His Jaw Dropped.

The farmer's eyes opened wide, and his jaw dropped. There was no fence at all! It was a bridge—a bridge stretching from one side of the creek to the other! A fine piece of work, as well—handrails and all—and the neighbor (his younger brother) was coming across, with his hand outstretched.



His response is not to consider how he might share all the extra food with others but to wonder how he can possibly store it all. He has what he thinks is a brilliant idea: to tear down his present barns and build larger ones.


Then he will have many things stored up for years of eating, drinking, and making merry.

COFFEE AND A MOVIE



Join us on Monday, August 29th, at 1:00 PM in the parish hall for "Paul Apostle of Christ". The film tells the story of Paul, who was known as a ruthless persecutor of Christians prior to his conversion to Christianity. Paul became Jesus' most influential apostle. Awaiting execution in a Roman prison, he reflects on his life with his friend and physician, Luke---who resolves to write a book detailing the birth of "The Way."

Their faith challenges an empire. Will their words change the world? The plot focuses on his becoming a pivotal figure in the formation of the early church before being executed by Emperor Nero in Rome.

ST. ALPHONSUS LIGUORI (AUGUST 1ST)

St. Alphonsus Liguori is a doctor of the Church who is widely known for his contribution to moral theology and his great kindness.

He was born in 1696 in Naples to a well-respected family, and was the oldest of 7 children. His father was Don Joseph de' Liguori, a naval officer and Captain of the Royal Galleys, and his mother came from Spanish descent. He was very intelligent, even as a young boy. As a boy of great aptitude, he picked up many things very quickly. St. Alphonsus did not attend school; rather, he was taught by tutors at home where his father kept a watchful eye. Moreover, he practiced the harpsichord for 3 hours a day at the heed of his father and soon became a virtuoso at the age of 13. For recreation, he was an equestrian, fencer, and card player. As grew into a young man, he developed an inclination for opera.

He was much more interested in listening to the music than watching the performance. St. Alphonsus would often take his spectacles off, which aided his myopic eyes, in order to merely listen. While theatre in Naples was in a relatively good state, the young saint developed an ascetic aversion to perhaps what he viewed as gaudy displays. He had strongly refused participation in a parlor play.

At the age of 16, he became a doctor of civil law on January 21, 1713, though by law, 20 was the set age. After studying for the bar, he practiced law at the age of 19 in the courts. It is said in his 8 years as a lawyer, he never lost a case. Although, he resigned from a brilliant career as a lawyer in 1723 when he lost a case because he overlooked a small, but important, piece of evidence. His resignation, however, proved profitable for the Church. He entered the seminary and was ordained three years later in 1726. He soon became a sought-after preacher and confessor in Naples. His so sermons were simple and well organized that they appealed to all people, both learned and unlearned. However, his time as a diocesan priest was short-lived: in 1732, he went to Scala and founded the Redemptorists, a preaching order.

He was a great moral theologian and his famous book, "Moral Theology", was published in 1748. Thirty years later, he was appointed bishop, and he retired in 1775. He died just over 10 years later in 1787, and was canonized in 1839.

THE TRANSFIGURATION OF THE LORD (AUGUST 6TH)

It was not a miracle that Jesus Christ transfigured Himself on Mount Tabor before the Apostles. It was a miracle that He maintained His common, earthly appearance for the whole of His life. It was a miracle that His face was not glowing like the sun as He walked the hills and valleys of the Holy Land. Christ's normality, His sustained suppression of His divine radiance, was a miracle of humility, of slavish devotion to His vocation to incarnate, teach, suffer, and die for mankind.

The Christian believes in the resurrection of the body and life everlasting in that body. We believe this because of the appearances of the risen Christ after His resurrection, because of His bodily Ascension into heaven, because the gospels specifically mention the empty tomb, and because of the events of today's feast. The Transfiguration shows the splendor of truth. It is a peek into the life of heaven, where we see that Christ will not shed His human skin. Christ will bring His humanity to heaven and glorify it. This exaltation of flesh and blood is one reason why the Church has such immense respect for the human body.

The Church's understanding is contrasted by two extreme views on its flanks: one overly spiritualizing man, and the other overly materializing him. The religions of the Orient stress the inner life of man to such an extent that they see him as a pure spirit caged in the body, glad to escape the confining carcass at death. From this Oriental perspective, the body is a trap for the soul. On the other flank is the Western materialist view. It sees the body as having priority over the soul to such an extent that physical, sensory experience is the best, and only, path to knowledge. This Western lens sees the body as a sensory sponge meant to soak up as many external experiences—pleasure, music, travel, conversation, food—as possible. If you don't experience something yourself, you can't assess its truth or value. This personalizing of existence reduces all reality to "me" and leads to cultural breakdown.

But neither an excessively spiritual approach nor an excessively material understanding do the body justice. A balanced understanding of the relationship between the body and soul is a hallmark of traditional Christianity. When Christ reveals His glory, He doesn't point a long, bony finger to a colorful rainbow on the horizon. He doesn't puff His cheeks and blow a strong rush of wind on the Apostles' faces. And He doesn't sit down and start playing soothing melodies on a harp. Christ shows the Apostles the truth by showing them Himself. He shows them His arms and legs and torso and face and hair. It's a real body. Jesus gives us a target to aim for. He shows us that the destination is Himself. We desire heaven because Jesus is there. If He were not there, then heaven would not be heaven. He, not a place, is the true destination.

A mystery is not something we can know nothing about, but something we can't know everything about. A comprehensible God would not be God, but an entirely opaque God would also be too remote for us to care. Catholicism's theology of the body has a beautiful equilibrium because our God is knowable and yet mysterious. Food, drink, dancing, smoking, romance, music, and beauty are not sins. The body is good, and God took one Himself as proof of that. But while nature is the source of human operations, a person operates them. So the person prevails over the tools he uses. The body, then, must ultimately be a servant. We are enfleshed souls. In heaven, hopefully, we will be most truly us, and have our ideal body. Every man and woman will be transfigured like Christ and radiate the glory of the Trinity in heaven, like a white sheet on the line radiates the sun shining behind it.

Lord of the Transfiguration, Your glorified body gives us hope of the glories to come in heaven, where You will be the destination. May Your glorified body inspire all Christians to live well their body-soul uniqueness on earth until they are perfected in heaven through You.

Catholic Social Teaching: All Are in God's Image, Likeness

My friend Trevor employs Rosa, a woman from El Salvador, to clean his apartment. On each cleaning day, Trevor gets lunch for Rosa and for himself, and they eat together. By these simple acts, Trevor is practicing Catholic social teaching. By paying Rosa a just wage, he recognizes the dignity of her work. By buying her lunch and by inviting her to eat with him, he

shows that he respects her and is in solidarity with her. All of these elements showing respect for human beings, honoring the dignity of work, and being in solidarity—have long been part of Catholic social doctrine.

The social teaching of the Church instructs the faithful on how to live the teachings of Christ amid the challenges of a changing society.

The seeds of Catholic social teaching are found in the 1891 encyclical
Rerum novarum (Rights and Duties of
Capital and Labor). In this encyclical,
Pope Leo XIII addressed social and
economic issues at a time when the
industrial revolution and political
changes created a widening gap between
the wealthy and the working poor.
The encyclical affirms the dignity of the
poor, a worker's right to just wages, the
right to form trade unions, and the right

to own property. The seven social teachings are:

Life and dignity of the human person: The foundation of all Church social teaching is the understanding that every human being is made in the image and likeness of God and is therefore sacred. This fundamental belief, the Church says, is the basis for a moral society.

Anything that insults human dignity—from abortion to capital punishment to social and economic disparities—is contrary to Catholic social teaching and to the Gospel.

Call to family, community, and participation: Humans are social beings who depend on one another in both good and bad times. The human community has a right and a duty to participate in society, seeking together the common good and the well-being of all. At the heart of the community is the family. The family, the domestic church, is a sign of unity and gives witness to the Gospel by participating in human institutions for the betterment of society.

Rights and responsibilities: Because every human life has value, all persons, regardless of status, are entitled to basic human rights, including the right to life, the right to health, the right to work, the right to food, the right to shelter, the right to family, and the right to participate in society. Along with those rights comes the responsibility to ensure that others are

afforded those same human rights.

Option for the poor and vulnerable: The Church's love and concern for the most vulnerable is rooted in Jesus' compassion for the poor. The commitment to the poor is not simply for the sake of charity, it is to help the poor become active participants in society so that they might contribute to the common good.

The dignity of work and the rights of workers: According to Catholic social teaching, a job is more than a means to earn a living; it is a participation in God's work. Therefore, the worker must be protected by rights such as the right to productive work, the right to decent wages and benefits, the right to organize, the right to own property, and the right to economic initiative.

Solidarity: Despite our ethnic, economic, and political differences, we

are one human family. In a world that is becoming more and more global, it is critical to focus on what we have in common rather than what makes us different. At the heart of solidarity is the desire for and pursuit of peace and justice.

Care for creation: Human beings have been entrusted as the stewards of all creation. We are called to do our part to protect and preserve our common home, to temper consumption with moral considerations for the poor, for humanity as a whole, and for future generations.

For some, Catholic social teaching brings comfort: for others, challenge. Reflect on which of the teachings challenge your beliefs and which affirm your beliefs. Discern how you might be called to act so that the Church's social teaching is no longer a secret but a new way of being for the human race.

WHAT IS A SMALL CHRISTIAN COMMUNITY (SCC)?

A group of 8 to 10 people meet weekly (or once a month) in someone's home to study Sunday's scripture readings. Each person discovers, at their own pace, how God has been actively loving them and helping them. In this environment, mutual trust grows, and members share their individual faith stories. The group becomes a small church in the large parish, so that everyone experiences the concern, prayer, and emotional support of the Body of Christ.

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE PART OF A GROUP CALLED "COMMUNITY?"

• This is more than a bunch of people gathering for a meeting every week. SCCs are people of similar beliefs meeting WITH ("com") UNITY. Oneness does not mean alikeness; rather it means agreeing to join in the journey of uniting ourselves to God and His love. Members feel connected to each other due to sharing their faith week after week, but it is more than that. Groups will occasionally gather outside the meetings for social events such as barbecues and pool parties, with all family members invited. During parish missions or retreats, they often attend together and go out for coffee afterward. Why? Because the love flowing between the members cannot be contained within a mere hour and a half meeting per week.


