Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you. – Colossians 3:13

Stories of forgiveness abound but one has caught my ear recently that I think bears repeating here. It's about the late Alabama Governor George Wallace.

Steve Beard, Editor of Good News Magazine, this month wrote an article that reminds us (or ALERTS us) to how "dug-in" views CAN be turned around in his essay, "Bright Light In Montgomery." I offer a portion of that essay here for us at EUMC. May it bless you as it did me!

In 1972, there were a dozen Democratic candidates running in the primaries for a race that would eventually pit Richard Nixon against George McGovern. During a campaign stop in Maryland, Wallace was shot five times by an assassin. The attack would leave him permanently paralyzed. Shortly after his brush with death, convalescing at the Holy Cross Hospital in Silver Spring, Wallace received a most unlikely visitor.

"Shirley Chisholm! What are you doing here?" Wallace asked from his bed. Chisholm was refined, dignified, and decent. She was the first black woman elected to the U.S. Congress and in 1972 became the first African American to run for U.S. President, as well as the first woman to run for the office.

No one was more surprised than Wallace – and her staff – that she suspended her campaign and immediately went to visit her rival. "What will your people say?" Wallace asked. Chisholm responded, "I know what they are going to say. But I wouldn't want what happened to you to happen to anyone."

In so many ways, they represented polar opposites fifty years ago. While Wallace was the standard bearer for the Old South and segregation, Chisholm (1924-2005) was a champion of integration, women's rights, refugees, Native Americans, and the working poor. There were few things they had in common, other than their humanity – and they were both United Methodists. They held hands and prayed together.

Wallace wept.

The medical staff asked her to end their visit because Wallace was very weak. "He held on to my hand so tightly," Chisholm recalled, "he didn't want me to go."

Congresswoman Barbara Lee was a young and idealistic campaign worker for Chisholm in 1972. She was confused and upset about the Wallace visit. In a recent interview with the Washington Post she recollected how Chisholm told her, "Sometimes we have to remember we're all human beings, and I may be able to teach him something, to help him regain his humanity, to maybe make him open his eyes to make him see something that he has not seen."

Chisholm also said, "You always have to be optimistic that people can change, and that you can change, and that one act of kindness may make all the difference in the world."

Chisholm understood that people were angry – very angry – but she believed "you have to rise to the occasion if you're a leader, and you have to try to break through and you have to try and open and enlighten other people who may hate you."

In a speech a year after the hospital visit, Chisholm, a member of Janes United Methodist Church in Brooklyn, asked, "Are we ready to learn to deal with others as God has dealt with us? God gave us life at the risk of our rebellion and paid for reconciliation at the price of the cross."

Back in Montgomery, Wallace arrived at Dexter Avenue Baptist Church on a Sunday morning in 1979 unannounced and unexpected. Without fanfare, an attendant rolled his wheelchair to the front of the sanctuary. "I've learned what suffering means in a way that was impossible," he told the African American congregation. "I think I can understand something of the pain that black people have come to endure. I know I contributed to that pain and I can only ask for your forgiveness." As he left the sanctuary, the congregation sang "Amazing Grace."

More than twenty years before Wallace found himself before the Dexter Avenue congregation, it was the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. who said in 1957: "Forgiveness does not mean ignoring what has been done or putting a false label on an evil act. It means, rather, that the evil act no longer remains as a barrier to the relationship. ...While abhorring segregation, we shall love the segregationist. This is the only way to create the beloved community.

Shirley Chisholm did not have to approve of George Wallace's politics in order for her to refuse to allow a barrier or a bullet to stand between them. Her faith would not allow it. A whirlwind of change took place in the man whose whole purpose was to maintain segregation in the south. The news reel footage and the bitter words would never paint the whole story. Wallace was a four-term governor who sought forgiveness and ended up winning 90 percent of the African American vote during his last campaign.

Upon Wallace's death, civil rights legend John Lewis wrote a moving essay in the New York Times. "With all his failings, Mr. Wallace deserves recognition for seeking redemption for his mistakes," he wrote, "for his willingness to change and to set things right with those he harmed and with his God." Perhaps one of the most poignant of illustrations of Wallace's transformed life was the attendance of Vivian Malone and James Hood, the two black students Wallace tried to bar from the University of Alabama in 1963, at his funeral.

She was about to put the bottle in the sink, *but first*, she decided to put the remote control away.

So as she walks into her living room to put the remote away, she sees her cat. And her cat is crying of hunger. She was about to put the remote away, *but first*, she decided to feed her cat.

So her vicious cycle of the But-First event continues. So what happened, you may ask...

At the end of the day: The LAUNDRY is not done, NEWSPAPER is still scattered on the kitchen table, The BOTTLE is still not in the sink, The BILLS are not paid, And the CAT is gnawing on the TV remote...

She kept putting off things that needed to be done first. We now know this is called the "*BUT-FIRST*" Syndrome! The woman was busy throughout the day, going back and forth and discovering a chain of things she needed to do. At the end of the day, she did not get anything done because of the *But-First*.

That got me thinking. Before the winter season arrives in the twilight of our lives, we need to go back to our Lord. We must not procrastinate as the *But-First* has never been the prerequisite. That also means that we must not give some far-fetched excuses and delay our return to Jesus. Just as Paul wanted to see Timothy before winter, Jesus wants us to return to Him before "the Winter" sets in.

Our lives are just too busy to be making the excuse. We have spent the most critical seasons of our lives taking care of and tending to our secular matters and affairs. The winter is not far away. It is closer than you think. The snow, the ice, the freezing temperature, and the scouring winds are right in front of us. We must all return to our Lord before the winter arrives! Our Lord wants us to do His work before the winter sets in.



and for world peace. In other words we pray for what ever is asked of us; by you, friends, and by the Holy Spirit.



HELPING OUR RETURNING NEIGHBORS

Helping our Returning Neighbors (HORN) is a new 501(c)3 charitable organization with a mission to empower men and women whose lives have been impacted by crime with the necessary essentials needed to have a successful transition in to becoming law abiding, productive citizens that follow Jesus Christ and are assets to our communities. HORN is focusing efforts on southwest Florida and has been approved by the Southwest District of the Florida United Methodist Conference.

Did you know?

- The Florida Department of Corrections has an annual budget of \$2.5 billion dollars.
- There will be 30,000+ prisoners released in Florida annually and typically 7,500+ or 25% of those released will return to prison within 3 years.
- There will be 1,600-2,500 potential HORN program participants released in the southwest Florida area from 4 prisons in the region.

How can you support this effort?

- Prayer for our mission and the Holy Spirit's movement in our lives and those of the participants.
- Mentoring. Mentors work one on one or in small groups to help with spiritual and social development providing encouragement and assistance.

THE SIXTIES

During the years 1963-65, Addison Hardee and his wife, Anne, served the charge, to be followed by Dr. Ira Williams in 1965-66. The pastor's salary was up to \$4800 plus \$600 expenses, though pledges were low; and so, the pastor, the treasurer, and the financial secretary were to call on non-pledging members to raise the \$18,705 budget.

Membership increased by 80 new persons on the rolls during the year of Dr. Williams' pastorate. Many of them are still actively participating in 1990, their twenty-fifth anniversary.

Homecoming Day set for Sunday, April 18, 1966, with the WSCS ladies buying and preparing meat for the celebration meal. Previous ministers who returned and took part in the worship services were Rev. Edgar Stauffer, Rev. Ralph Jones, and Rev. Hubert odd. A plaque was dedicated honoring Rev. Dodd and Bert Anger, who had been instrumental in building our first church home, known by that time as the Lampp Youth Center.

In June a new pastor arrives, and this Personals ad appeared in the Englewood paper: "WANTED—all persons who do not have a regular church home! Come and help the Methodist members give our new minister and his family a hearty and warm welcome to Englewood this and every Sunday. This ad sponsored by your Friendly Western Auto Store." Hugh Doan the stores owner and a member since 1960. The congregation did give a warm welcome to the Rev. Bob Soka, his wife Grace and their daughters Chris and Mary, who would serve here to the end of the decade.

UNITED WE STAND

Three lots on Green Street, diagonally across from the church, were cleared for parking as the number of worshippers grew, and parking assistants were recruited. Church business required the hiring of Calla Mae Burgan as a part-time secretary. Route 41 was a channel from the north and Midwest for the rapidly increasing stream of retirees, attracted in many cases by a travel booklet which extolled the low cost and charms of a little-known paradise on Lemon Bay—Englewood.

During 1968 our name became Englewood United Methodist Church as nationally the Methodist Church joined with the Evangelical United Brethren. A new Discipline was issued, the Official Board became the Administrative Board, and the fiscal year became the calendar year as we instituted United Methodist changes. Nationally, the Women's Society of Christian Service was recharted as the United Methodist Women.

For Easter 1969, Rev. Soka enlisted Altar Chairman Helen Hamor and her helpful husband, Jerry to assemble a beautiful floral cross, a church tradition ever since.

SWINGING INTO THE SEVENTIES

A tidy balance of \$660 was on hand on January 1, 1970, as we sent out letters about the budget of \$26,092. The church had vote a \$1000 scholarship for Roger Ward to study for the ministry. Our organist, Helen Hamor Ficks, and choir director, Norma Sawn, were each paid \$15 per Sunday.

When the Rev. John Whitehead and Lucy, Marilyn, John Jr. and James arrived in June 1970, the church was ready to pay off its \$58,000 debt on the education wing and to plan dedication of its new facilities.

In August we voted that "meat will be provided, and Don Browning will prepare it" for Family Night. Who would have guessed that he would have the job for the next 10 years? And what roast beef that was!

What would our pioneer settlers of 1886 think of Englewood and EUMC today?
