The "OPEN TABLE"

I love attending our new members classes where we pastors get to know our new folks in a more personal way. The life experience that is shared in those classes is amazing. The stories that you have shared with us are inspiring—example after example of God's faithfulness—in times of joy and family growth as well in times of deep heartache.

I thank you for sharing these sacred experiences with us. As one of your pastors, it helps me know some of the issues you are dealing with—it informs my preaching and helps me know how to direct the pastoral care of the church. So, as a church, we're blessed with many life experiences.

We are also blessed by quite a variety of church backgrounds. This brings with it a mosaic of faith expression, as well as a diversity of theological understanding.

In one of our new members meetings, I was talking to a couple with a Catholic background. They were wrestling with the United Methodist practice of the "Open Table" at Holy Communion. It was confusing to them with their Catholic background—understandably so. So, I thought I would touch on a few reasons why we celebrate the "Open Table" for all of us to ponder again.

To be honest, there's a part of the Communion ritual that used to kind of get to me—the part of our confession that says, "...we have failed to be an obedient church...We have not loved our neighbors, we have not heard the cry of the needy..." and a bunch of other things we haven't done. I used to think, those things aren't entirely true! I've been a good neighbor. Just ask Pastor Bo—I haven't bugged him any—I offered to come over and help him eat Sushi and Kimbap! And the cry of the needy—I gave at the Salvation Army Kettle over the holidays. In fact, I can think of several times when I gave of my resources to help someone in need.

The problem is when you get in this mode of self congratulations you begin to think..."I need to qualify this confession...I need to scale it back a bit—it seems a bit too harsh. I wasn't all that bad this week!"

But then, please hear what a wise Christian man once told me, he said, "as we qualify our confession, we disqualify ourselves from Grace...we make ourselves less open to receive Grace." As I make excuses for myself, I excuse myself from the meal. When I do that, what I am saying, in essence, is...I really don't need Grace—I'm worthy in and of myself.

This was a real problem for the Pharisees—they had the Law down cold—they had it memorized and knew it forwards and backwards. And they lived it! That's why it was so hard for them when Jesus came along talking,

living, and requiring grace. He threatened their self-righteousness—he was offering to meet a need they didn't think they had. Grace was virtually inaccessible to them.

So, when we humbly confess and receive Holy Communion we are opening ourselves to God's gift of Grace. God's Grace is open to all who would come and receive it. We see this reality in many of Jesus' parables as well as His encounters with people. None were turned away from Him for not being good enough. We don't have to prove ourselves. Thank God for that! Because the bar is simply too high for any of us. None would be found worthy. When Jesus initiated this sacrament, he offered it to his twelve, knowing some would deny him and others would betray him within hours, yet Jesus offered it to them all.

In fact, the only requirement to receive God's love and grace is our admission that we *don't* have a pure heart—our admission that we *don't* have it all together—our confession that we are *not* worthy by our own goodness or acts of mercy or charity toward others!

So, when we come to that part in the confession during Communion, know that it fits—own it and sincerely embrace it. In all the good we do here at Englewood—and we do a ton of good here—just know we are still so far away from God's righteousness. We are all in need of Grace—and through our confession, we open ourselves up to it.

It's a level playing field for us all—and that's why we celebrate the "Open Table."

A WORD FROM PASTOR BO

People fail. No one succeeds in life without falling at some point in their life. We can fail on exams or promotions, business, and even relationships. All will seem well and destined; yet, we can still fail. All people desire to befriend everyone around them and make no enemies; yet, interpersonal relationships are difficult to maintain. We hurt others, and, at the same time, we get hurt by others. We often despair when our relations with others fail. Failure, regardless of form, is a lot that we frail humans must endure. No one is free from failure.



Anyone can fail; the important thing is not to end up in our lives in failure.

No matter how sinful and defeated in failure we are, God will forgive us and help us if we return to Him. When we call to God, with the determination that we will not let our lives end as failures, God will unfailingly answer our call.

However, we cannot let our only life end in failure. We have to make it succeed, no matter what it takes. When we return to God, we can turn our failures into success. It is because God helps us. God teaches us the method, the secret of true success.

Let me share the story of Reverend Charles Spurgeon (English Preacher,1934-1992). A group of pastors from the States visited England to listen to Reverend Spurgeon's sermon. Just as they have heard, Reverend Parker was an eloquent and graceful one, delivered in front of about 2,000 people. Upon leaving the church, the pastors could not help but remark, "Joseph Parker is a wonderful preacher!"

That night, visiting pastors heard that Charles Spurgeon would be delivering his sermon at the Metropolitan Tabernacle Church and decided to attend that service. The building at this church was much bigger than the City Temple Church, and the size of the congregation was about twice its size. The pastors soon forgot about the great building, the congregation's size, the preacher's voice, his gesture, and his eloquence. They soon forgot about comparing Reverend Spurgeon to Reverend Parker, whom they heard that morning. They had only one thing to say after Spurgeon's sermon, that it was "Jesus Christ is a wonderful Savior!" And just as they have heard, Reverend Spurgeon's voice and the sermon was out of this world.

It is true. There is no more tremendous success in life. True success is understanding that *Jesus is our Great Savior*. True success is discovering that we are sinners and found the embrace of Jesus Christ to ask for His forgiveness and live the rest of our lives in obedience to His will and wishes.

Have you experienced bitter failures? Do you despair that you are at the dead-end of your life? Return to God! Call to God! God will help you! The same loving God who helped the people in the Bible will help you today.

His love never fails. There is no failure in Jesus Christ. Believe it! True faith will lead us to beautiful and genuine success. We cannot fail this way! We cannot continue to fall into the swamp of failure because of our desires! Return to Jesus. He will take responsibility for us all.

Serving Opportunities

We are asking you to prayerfully consider helping in one of these ministries.

- Wednesday Night Dinners We need a small leadership team to plan and prepare the weekly dinners.
- Reset Team Needed to reset tables & chairs between dinners & Sunday worship & again for dinners.
- Good News Team A minimum of 10-12 people are needed to be able to offer Good News Club in the elementary schools, beginning January 2022. A commitment of 3-4 hours, once a week for 13 weeks.
- Short term Adult Bible Study or Christian course facilitators.
- **Family Promise** One or two people to lead and organize Family Promise at EUMC. Families staying on site will resume 2022.

- Congregational Care Ministry more people are needed for visitation to Assisted Living, Nursing Homes and homebound congregants.



Sign children in at the Check In station each morning. Check In takes place at the Event sign up tables at the back of Fellowship Hall. Children start worship with parents in Fellowship Hall. The children's moment is after the opening song. Children are called to the stage to hear the message, then dismissed to go to the Education Wing for Sunday School. Children return to fellowship hall at 10:40 AM for pickup. Our pickup place is behind the youth tables. Parents must sign children out with leader before child is dismissed.

Currently the Preschool classes are discussing the *Fruits of the Spirit*. This is a great, fun way to introduce young ones to the characteristics of Jesus and how we all can have those same traits. Book Buzz

Why do lobsters and shrimp turn pinkish red when you cook them? Haven't you often wondered about that? Today's column will be about hints and fun tips about cooking.



When you watch cooking shows, you often hear "Don't forget the salt"! To season the white of a hard -boiled egg, add salt to the boiling water. It penetrates the shell, imparting flavor to an otherwise tasteless bite.

To get the froth in a bubbling pot of jam to subside, add a small bit of melted butter. It will disperse the foam.

To eliminate the clear film that sometimes appears on a cup of black tea, add lemon juice. The acidity of the lemon disperses the calcium carbonate; adding milk will increase the amount of film.

Red wine owes its color to vegetable pigments called anthocyanin. Over time, these pigments react with the tannins in the wine, mellowing them and improving the taste of the wine. As the wine continues to age, the reaction makes the red of the anthocyanin disappear and the dark tannins become visible. This explains why red wines darken as they age.

The best temperature for storing chocolate is around 57 degrees F, which is the approximate temperature of a wine cellar. This will preserve the aroma and appearance and keep it from getting that undesirable white film. Just allow it to come up to room temperature before eating.

The receptor on your tongue that senses spicy food is both a chemical and thermal sensor, which is why eating spicy dishes makes the mouth feel as though it is on FIRE!

The next time you have a particularly tough cut of meat, try tenderizing it with pineapple juice. The especially powerful enzymes found in pineapple break down proteins in meat, resulting in an absolutely tender roast.

Use a copper pan for making jam. The copper ions reinforce the pectin gels, which firms the preserves.

Oh, to answer the first question.....Shrimp and lobster are sea creatures. They contain a red-colored molecule called astaxanthin, which does not appear in other living animals. When this seafood is cooked, the heat breaks up the bonds shielding the astaxanthin and the pinkish red color appears.

There are 7,139 languages spoken today. That number is constantly in flux, because we're learning more and more about the world's languages every day. And beyond that, the languages themselves are in flux. They're living and dynamic, spoken by communities whose lives are shaped by our rapidly changing world. This is a fragile time: Roughly 40% of languages are now endangered, often with less than 1,000 speakers remaining. Meanwhile, just 23 languages account for more than half the world's population.

There has been an active, ongoing research project going on since 1951 cataloging all the languages of the world. Hundreds of linguists and researchers around the world go into rapid action when a new language is discovered which no one has ever heard about. Meeting every year they determine if a new language has been discovered to be a separate language, or when a supposed dialect is discovered to be a separate language, or vice versa. At their recent meeting, researchers estimated that there will be several dozen languages added to the current count of 7139. The exact number is still unknown because there are still many undiscovered languages, mostly spoken in remote regions.

When we invited Dave Eberhard, the current editor of the reference work Ethnologue Languages of the World, to speak at a Mission Conference here at EUMC, he asked us to provide someone who spoke a language he DIDN'T speak! Dave and his wife Julie had served many years in Brazil, Thailand and Malaysia. What to do? Then we remembered our missionary friend Kevin Wooster who, with his wife Laura, had spent many years in Mongolia and was fluent in the language. It was fascinating to see how Dave was able to use a plain stick and leaves which had

fallen from a tree just outside the Lampp Building, to elicit enough words from Kevin to be able to form a sentence describing the stick: color, length, strength, texture, all the while using chart paper to record the responses. Then he was able to use the sentences to show the structure of the unknown language.

The missionaries, linguists and researchers who strive to find and learn these unknown languages, are then able to, with years of study and much work, transcribe Scripture into the unknown language and bring "God's talk" to people in remote and isolated parts of the world. We members of EUMC are so blessed to have the Word in several different formats, and a beautiful sanctuary in which to worship and praise God for our blessings.



We will be using this forum to keep you abreast of actions that the EUMC Guide Team takes on behalf of the church. At its December and January meetings, the Guide Team discussed and/or acted on the following:

- A reception for our retiring Director of Music Ministries, Fonda Davies, will be held on Sunday, April 24, 2022 following the 11am worship service.
- Discussed the search and interview processes for both the Director of Music Ministries and Church Receptionist positions on staff.
