

Saint Maria Crescentia Höss, whose feast is today, was a weaver in 18th-century Bavaria before she became a nun, and when she was assigned to servitude and living in a cubbyhole in the monastery, she kept weaving. Maybe that helped sustain her until she eventually rose to be elected the mother superior. Holy creativity can feed your soul.

Tuesday, Apr 06, 2021-EASTER TUESDAY Sing the Octave

Happy Octave of Easter—the eight days between, and including, Easter Sunday and Divine Mercy Sunday. By relishing the Resurrection for eight whole days instead of just one, the church declares it the cornerstone of belief. What's more: In contrast to the Christmas Octave, we observe no other feast days during Easter Octave, keeping the Resurrection our only focus. Why eight? Christianity's Jewish roots feature ritual celebrations that end on the eighth day—a week, when you count both the first and last days. Make every day this week a "mini-Easter," as our church intends. Sing Alleluia for eight days.

Wednesday, Apr 07, 2021-EASTER WEDNESDAY Pray for all who heal a world in pain

On April 7, 1948, the World Health Organization was established as a leading global health authority within the United Nations system. In 2021, the WHO counts 7,000 members from 150 countries. It declares that the health of all people is essential to attaining peace and security, and among other things chooses a particular health theme each year to mark its anniversary. Past

themes include mental health, maternal and childcare, and climate change. Mindful that the world's aging population is living longer, the WHO set this year's theme as "Aging and Health." On this Easter Wednesday, as we take note of the healing miracles within the early Christian community, ask the Lord to bless all who work to safeguard the health of humanity.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Acts 3:1-10; Luke 24:13-35 (263). "And a man crippled from birth was carried and placed at the gate of the temple."*

Thursday, Apr 08, 2021-EASTER THURSDAY Keep it going

We are still in the Octave of Easter, the eight days following Easter. The Octave is meant to keep the celebration going, to keep savoring the joy of the Resurrection. The gospel for each day focuses on the Risen Christ. In the early church, those who were baptized at the Easter Vigil would continue wearing their white garments all week in recognition of the life-changing, festive event. You've likely been changing your clothes during the Octave, but try keeping your focus on the Resurrection. Meditate on a time that God has blessed you with new life.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Acts 3:11-26, Luke 24:35-48 (264).* "*He stood in their midst and said to them, 'Peace be with you.*""

Friday, Apr 09, 2021-EASTER FRIDAY It all adds up

Numbers play a key role throughout salvation history: Yahweh, the *one* true God; the *5,000* fed; the cock crowing *three* times; the *Triduum*; the *Trinity*; and the *third* time Jesus appears to his disciples after his death, which we read about in today's beautiful gospel story of Jesus cooking breakfast for his disciples on the seashore. Numerologists love to explore all the hidden meanings packed in the biblical numbers. But the gospel message is actually quite simple. Jesus alone feeds us. Remember that next time you are looking for sustenance elsewhere.

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 4:1-12; John 21:1-14 (265). "Jesus said to them, 'Come, have breakfast.'"

Saturday, Apr 10, 2021-EASTER SATURDAY Faith takes time

What would you think if you heard that someone you knew was dead had risen from the grave? It's no wonder the disciples doubted the story. No less a witness than Mother Teresa of Calcutta expressed serious doubts about God's existence over the course of her life. "Where is my faith?" she wrote. "There is nothing but emptiness." And she's a saint! So when loved ones stop going to church and express doubts about God—or if you yourself face such doubts—accept it as a part of the spiritual journey each of us walks. Keep praying and be patient. Faith takes time and hits dry spells. But in God's heart, there's all the time in the world.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Acts 4:13-21; Mark 16:9-15 (266). "When they heard that he was alive and had been seen by her, they did not believe."*

Faith Enrichment Perpetual Eucharistic Adoration

Alleluia! He is Risen!

Saying those words is like drinking a tall glass of cold water after being out in the desert all day. Lent is over and it is now time to celebrate the great joy of Easter!

At the Easter Vigil, the Exsultet is sung as Mass begins in darkness, illumined only by candles throughout the church. The Exsultet is a beautiful hymn of rejoicing in Christ's triumph over sin and death. One part states:

O truly necessary sin of Adam, destroyed completely by the Death of Christ! O happy fault that earned for us so great, so glorious a Redeemer!

This line stands out because it calls the sin of Adam "necessary" and refers to it as "O happy fault." At first, this may seem strange. Why is it that we refer to the sin of Adam, Original Sin, as "necessary" and "happy." The answer is Easter. It's because God, in His perfect wisdom and love, took sin and the consequence of sin (death) and used them as the means of the salvation of the world. That's what Easter is all about!

This may be hard to comprehend so it's worth thinking about more deeply. Without Adam's sin, there would be no Jesus. God would not have had to become one of us. So even though the original sin of Adam, as well as all future sin, is evil and wrong, God in His perfect power and love chose to use it as the very means of the salvation of the world. How? By allowing the sins of the world to persecute Him and crucify Him, and then, by turning that suffering and death into the very means of salvation. Jesus destroyed sin by destroying the consequences of sin which is death. Death loses in the Resurrection! Jesus' Resurrection takes away the effects of all sin for those who cling to Him.

Easter is a time when we must do just that. We must "cling" to our resurrected Lord! We must cling to Jesus who is alive and well. We must cling to His Resurrection and strive to share in it. How do we cling to our Resurrected Lord? There are many ways. Here is one.

Take joy in everything. Start with whatever it is that burdens you the most. Whatever it is that makes you angry, sad or depressed. Whatever that is, it can potentially become one of your greatest sources of grace and joy. Seriously, it can. If the brutal Crucifixion of Jesus, the Son of God, can turn out to be the greatest event in all of human history, then your personal suffering, your burden, or even your sin can very much become a source of great joy as long as you let God transform it into part of His Resurrection!

This is the meaning of Easter! Easter means that nothing can keep us from the joy that God wants to give us. Nothing can steal that joy away. Sure, at times we will struggle just as Jesus did in the Agony of the Garden and the *Via Dolorosa* (the Way of the Cross), but those sufferings will not win. The Resurrection won with Christ and it will win with us when we cling to Him. Jesus persevered and, in the end, rose victorious. This is Easter!

Know that God wants you to experience the joy of Easter in your life. Let Him fill you with hope and with the joy that only the Resurrection can bring. God wants Easter to begin now in our lives! **Happy Easter!**





Disconting St. Vincent de Paul



The Officers and Members of the St. Michael Council of the Knights of Columbus want to wish you and your family a very Blessed and Happy Easter.



¡Felices Pascuas de Resurrección! ¡Cristo ha resucitado, verdaderamente ha resucitado! ¡El pecado ha sido derrotado y la muerte ha perdido su aguijón! Los largos años de espera han llegado a su fin, todas

las profecías se han cumplido.

Podrías pensar que la lectura del Evangelio de hoy reflejaría toda la alegría contenida en estas verdades. Pero en realidad eso no es lo que escuchamos, más bien escuchamos un relato lleno de pánico, falta de entendimiento y una fe incompleta. María Magdalena piensa que el cuerpo de Jesús fue robado pues no lo encontró donde lo habían puesto. Pedro está sorprendido de pie frente a la tumba vacía, ¿y Juan? Él comienza a creer, pero aun así abandona la escena insatisfecho. ¿Dónde está la alegría? ¿Qué pasó con la victoria que Jesús prometió?

En realidad está ahí, en el umbral, apunto de irrumpir. Todavía debía suceder una cosa más. Los discípulos debían *encon-trarse* con el Señor resucitado.



Focus on Religious Freedom

Trying to Restore Some Freedom to Worship at Easter

Santa Clara, CA: The U.S. Supreme Court rejected Santa Clara County's ban on indoor worship services, ordering California's only holdout to fall in line with the rest of the state following the Court's earlier ruling telling CA that it cannot ban indoor church services because of the coronavirus pandemic. "Banning indoor worship and yet allowing people to gather at airports...and retail shopping is unconstitutional - and the Supreme Court has said so several times," wrote Bishop Oscar Cantu.⁽¹⁾

British Columbia, Canada: As of February, 2021, there were still no in-person Catholic masses, no worship services, anywhere in the province. Religious leaders are seeking clear guidelines but are losing hope there will be changes to the current policy in time for Easter services. Religious freedom law firms are now beginning legal challenges.

Greece: Christians had defied a government ban and held Epiphany services in January, 2021 and are expected to do this again for Easter. "State orders are one thing and faith is another," said a 38 year-old worshipper. "No law can order us what to do." (2)

Scotland: The Scottish Government has revised its lockdown restrictions and said, "should progress suppressing the virus continue," it will permit churches to re-open for communal worship beginning on March 26 with an attendance cap of 50 people (3)

Italy: Unlike some countries, Italy has approved a fresh round of tight anti-Covid restrictions nationwide to be implemented between March 15 and April 6. The whole country will be at the maximum level of restriction during Easter weekend, April 3-5.
