FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

My Dear Parishioners,

In the last two weeks' bulletins, I shared with you two different rhythms in the celebration of the Mass—the Gathering Rhythm and the Storytelling Rhythm. This week, let us reflect on the third rhythm, which Fr. Paul Bernier calls the "*Nurturing Rhythm*." This is the part of the Eucharist that corresponds to the Communion Rite. During this time, we are fed no ordinary food, but rather the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus Christ! If we are open to the grace, it slowly changes us to become more and more like Christ Himself. We are nurtured to become one with the Trinity! This cultivates our local Church to become supportive and welcoming in every aspect of ministry.

After the readings, we move to the table of the Eucharist. As at a meal in the home of a friend, we (1) set the table, (2) say grace, and (3) share the food. We eat and drink. At Mass, these ritual actions are called:

- 1. the Preparation of the Gifts
- 2. the Eucharistic Prayer
- 3. the Communion Rite

Preparation of the Gifts:

The early Christians each brought some bread and wine from their homes to the church to be used for the Mass and to be given to the clergy and the poor. Today, a similar offering for the parish and the poor is made through our monetary contributions. Members of the parish take up a collection from the assembly and bring them to the priest at the altar along with the bread and wine to be used for the sacrifice.

The Eucharistic Prayer which follows brings us to the very center of the Mass and the heart of our faith. The prayer begins with a dialogue between the presider and the assembly. First, the priest greets us with: "*The Lord be with you.*" He then asks if we are ready and willing to approach the table and to renew our baptismal commitment, offering ourselves to God: "*Lift up your hearts.*" We respond that we are prepared: "*We lift them up to the Lord.*" We are invited to give thanks to the Lord our God. And we respond: "*It is right and just.*" To "give thanks" translates the traditional Greek verb which now names the whole action: *Eucharist.*

Preface and Acclamation:

The priest enters the Preface, a prayer which prepares us to come before the face of God. As the wonders of God are told, the assembly cannot hold back their joy and sing aloud: *"Wow! Wow! Wow! What a God we have!"* In the ritual language of the Mass, this acclamation takes the form: *"Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of hosts. Heaven and earth are full of your glory."*

The priest continues the prayer, giving praise and thanks and calling upon the Holy Spirit to change our gifts of bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ. He then recalls the events of the Last Supper—the institution of the Eucharist—and continues recalling the wonderful deeds of salvation: the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of Christ.

We look forward to that glorious day and raise our voices with those of all the saints who have gone before us as the priest raises the consecrated bread and wine and offers a toast—a doxology, a prayer of glory to God in the name of Christ: "*Through Him, and with Him, and in Him, O God, almighty Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honor is Yours, for ever and ever.*" Our "*Amen*" to this prayer proclaims our assent and participation in the entire Eucharistic Prayer.

The Second Vatican Council chose the term "People of God" to renew emphasis upon the vital role of the laity in the life and mission of the Church. Each baptized Catholic has responsibility for building up the Kingdom of God, as each is called to the priestly, prophetic, and kingly functions of Jesus Christ. Parish pastoral councils undertake a vital task of co-responsibility with the pastor to foster the spiritual growth of our faith community. Our archdiocese requires every parish to have this council.

The Mary Queen Pastoral Council is a consultative body whose primary responsibility is to provide counsel to Fr. Thomas on matters related to pastoral plans and policies. Our council consists of 10-12 members. New members are discerned onto the council annually with each member serving 3 years. This year, that discernment process will take place on Saturday, September 20, 2025. A call for nominations will be issued in August.

Mary Queen is indeed a community, inspired by faith and love, that lives, worships, teaches, welcomes, and supports one another in imitation of Christ. Our continued spiritual growth lies in part on parishioners willing to serve on the council. On Saturday, July 19, 2025, from 9-11 AM, an information meeting will be held. PRACTICING CATHOLIC

Mini Reflection: As Christians we know that everyone is our neighbor. It's drilled into us from the first time we hear this reading. But do we approach the victims that we see? Or do we draw away from the suffering of others in fear and confusion, thinking: "That's not my problem"?

Crossing the Street

It takes a cold, hard, godless heart to step over a wounded man on the street.

But in the parable of the Good Samaritan, the priest and the Levite didn't step over the half-dead traveler. I think we picture them doing so, in our collective imagining of this well-known story, but the words of the Gospel are quite clear. "When he saw him, he passed by on the opposite side," Jesus says of both.

So they saw him. They saw his need. It made them uncomfortable; it confused them — many scholars have said that Judaic law concerning the touching of dead bodies might have made them reluctant to approach — and so they decided the simplest way to file this situation in the Not My Problem category was to cross the street.

But that still leaves a half-dead guy on the road. And we all, 2,000 years later, still think of the priest and the Levite as cold and hard and godless — even if they didn't want to be, even if they didn't think of themselves that way — because the bottom line is, they didn't see the half-dead guy as their problem.

As Christians we know that everyone is our neighbor. It's drilled into us from the first time we hear this reading.

Well, I don't know about you, but I find myself crossing the street a lot more than I should.

There is so much pain and suffering in the world. We certainly can't begin to alleviate it all. But we have to start with the pain and the suffering that we see, that's right in front of us — even if it's something we really, really want to ignore. Even if we find it inconvenient or confusing or scary or weird.

The heroism of the Good Samaritan wasn't in his selfless actions, although those were certainly commendable. It was in his courage. "He approached the victim," Jesus said.

Can we approach the victims we see? Do we have that courage?

PRAY & REFLECT

July 13, 2025 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time Luke 10:25-37

I used to be a bad neighbor. I'd get wrapped up in my life and ignore those around me. Then I found sage advice from Benjamin Franklin to this effect: to be a better neighbor, ask someone to do a favor for you. It's counterintuitive, isn't it? Tell strangers that I need their help? Yuck. I'll risk looking needy. Worse, I'll be indebted to them. But I tried it, and it works like a charm. Recently I asked my neighbor Alan for a hacksaw, and Inga for an egg. They kindly obliged, and our friendship is growing.

This week we hear a scribe of the law cynically ask Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" (Luke 10:29). Like him, we prefer to keep the list of our "neighbors" as short as possible. It requires less interruption and inconvenience. But when Jesus tells the parable of the Good Samaritan, he exposes the lonely, cold-heartedness tendency of the scribe's (and our) heart. My "neighbor" is anyone I encounter who manifests a concrete need. There isn't time to require any other credential because human need opens us to the happy reciprocity which is love.

Jesus' words challenge us this week to ask a neighbor for help in some small way. How marvelous that God himself shows us how. He moves into our world and asks us to love Him with small deeds of love. Maybe that's where Ben Franklin got the idea.

Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA)

The Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (formerly *RCIA*) is the normative process by which adults are gradually introduced to the Catholic faith and sacramental life. Rooted in Sacred Scripture, guided by the Catechism of the Catholic Church, and sustained by prayer and the support of the Christian community, this journey mirrors the ancient catechumenal formation of the early Church (cf. RCIA, nos. 1–5).

This process is intended for:

Unbaptized adults, who seek to receive the Sacraments of Initiation: Baptism, Confirmation, and Holy Eucharist.

Baptized non-Catholic Christians, who desire to enter into full communion with the Catholic Church through a profession of faith, Confirmation, and the Eucharist.

Baptized Catholics, who have not yet completed their sacraments of initiation (Confirmation and/or First Holy Communion).

What is Serra Club?

Serra is a global organization, but every Serran will tell you that they spend most of their energy at the grassroots level, as part of their local Serra Club. In collaboration with the local diocese, clubs organize and promote a huge array of events and programs—prayer for vocations, dinners for clergy, vocation curriculum in Catholic schools, events for altar servers, and literally thousands of other programs.

We are passionate, creative, and energetic Catholics! While we pray and work for vocations, we are also keenly aware of the value of friendship and mutual support. Our clubs are places of deep friendship, where men and women enjoy camaraderie while growing in faith. We're mission-oriented, but also committed to personal growth in holiness.

Serra was formed in 1935 when a small group of lay people in Seattle decided to form an organization to promote and foster vocations to the priesthood and consecrated religious life. As a result, they chose Father Junipero Serra, the great missionary, as their patron and named the organization Serra Club of Seattle.

Serra International is the only lay organization aggregated to a primary pontifical work. This extraordinary status was conferred in 1951. Our special relationship with the Holy Father was renewed again at the 2017 Serra International in Rome, during which more than 600 Serrans gathered with the Holy Father to focus on our work of promoting vocations throughout the global Church.

Today, there are more than 500 Serra Clubs around the world in 30 countries, comprised of thousands of lay Catholics. We are men and women of all ages and from all walks of life. We have a variety of professional backgrounds. Many of us are retired, though we have many younger members as well. All of us have one thing in common: *we love our Catholic faith, and we are dedicated to promoting and fostering vocations.*

What Is Mammon?

Question:

When Jesus says, "You cannot serve both God and mammon," what does he mean? What is mammon?

Answer:

When you hear Scripture proclaimed each Sunday, remember it wasn't originally written in English. Hebrew, Aramaic, Greek — these ancient tongues were the original language of our Old and New Testaments. Most of the time, all of the words are translated into our native language. Sometimes, a word or two is left in the original language. Such is the case in this Scripture passage.

Mammon is an ancient Aramaic word referring to money, wealth, or profit. Earthly wealth isn't bad in itself, nor does it automatically exclude us from being a disciple of Jesus. But what dominates our life? To serve money — that is, to seek accumulation of wealth for its own sake and to structure our lives around it — is morally problematic. What good is our wealth if it isn't at the service of others? What good is our wealth if its pursuit leads us to selfishness, obsession, greed, envy, and comparison? There are many things that can be opposed to our service of God — power, prestige, popularity. Ultimately, something in our lives will be our master. But there is only one God worth serving.

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EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

So many times in my life, I have failed to start something because I had not yet adequately prepared. I would have started working out or going for a jog, but I needed to get the right shoes. I would have started eating right if only I could find

the time and money to buy the right foods. I would have started that journaling project, but I couldn't without a really nice leather-bound journal. I would have, I would have, and I would have!

I know many people can relate. We offer up excuses for so many things. Sometimes we even get to the point where we do start something, but by then, we have already lost so much time.

Some of us are thinking about taking a stewardship way of life seriously, but we are just not ready yet. We would be more generous if we can first get out of debt. We would give of our time, but we have to wait until the kids get older or until we fully research our options. The truth is, we don't have to be in any particular state of life or have any specific financial portfolio to start giving our very selves to God. God takes us as we are now. No resume needed. Why waste so much time thinking about getting started and becoming serious? Time is a gift given to all of us. As we think and prepare endlessly, we are practicing poor stewardship. The time to start is today. Who wants to answer God one day at the gates of Heaven saying, "I would have."?
