From the General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM)



Chapter V: The Arrangement and Ornamentation of Churches for the Celebration of the Eucharist From the General Instruction on the Roman Missal

I. General Principles

288. For the celebration of the Eucharist, the People of God are normally gathered together in a church or, if there is no church or if it is too small, then in another respectable place that is nonetheless worthy of so great a mystery. Therefore, churches or other places should be suitable for carrying out the sacred action and for ensuring the active participation of the faithful. Moreover, sacred buildings and requisites for divine worship should be truly worthy and beautiful and be signs and symbols of heavenly realities.[107]

289. Consequently, the Church constantly seeks the noble assistance of the arts and admits the artistic expressions of all peoples and regions. [108] In fact, just as she is intent on preserving the works of art and the artistic treasures handed down from past centuries[109] and, in so far as necessary, on adapting them to new needs, so also she strives to promote new works of art that are in harmony with the character of each successive age.[110]

290. All churches should be dedicated or at least blessed. Cathedrals and parish churches, however, are to be dedicated with a solemn rite.

De la Instrucción General del Misal Romano (IGMR)

Capítulo V: Disposición y ornato de las iglesias para la celebración eucarística De la Institución General del Misal Romano

I. Principios generales

288. Para la celebración de la Eucaristía el pueblo de Dios se congrega generalmente en la iglesia, o cuando no la hay o resulta insuficiente, en algún lugar honesto que sea digno de tan gran misterio. Las iglesias, por consiguiente, o los demás lugares, sean aptos para la realización de la acción sagrada y para que se obtenga una activa participación de los fieles. Además, los edificios sagrados y los objetos que pertenecen al culto divino sean, en verdad, dignos y bellos, signos y símbolos de las realidades celestiales[108].

289. De ahí que la Iglesia busca siempre el noble servicio de las artes, y acepta toda clase de expresiones artísticas de los diversos pueblos y regiones[109]. Más aún, así como se esfuerza por conservar las obras de arte y los tesoros elaborados en siglos pretéritos[110] y, en cuanto es necesario, adaptarlos a las nuevas necesidades, trata también de promover las nuevas formas de arte adaptadas a cada tiempo[111].

Por eso, en la formación de los artistas y al elegir las obras destinadas a la iglesia, búsquese un auténtico valor artístico que sirva de alimento a la fe y a la piedad y responda auténticamente al significado y fines para los que se destina [112].

290. Todas las iglesias han de ser dedicadas o por lo menos bendecidas. Las catedrales y las iglesias parroquiales han de ser dedicadas con rito solemne.

CCC - IV. The Divine Works and the Trinitarian Missions

I. Catechesis on Creation

- 282 Catechesis on creation is of major importance. It concerns the very foundations of human and Christian life: for it makes explicit the response of the Christian faith to the basic question that men of all times have asked themselves:120 "Where do we come from?" "Where are we going?" "What is our origin?" "What is our end?" "Where does everything that exists come from and where is it going?" The two questions, the first about the origin and the second about the end, are inseparable. They are decisive for the meaning and orientation of our life and actions. (1730)"
- The question about the origins of the world and of man has been the object of many scientific studies which have splendidly enriched our knowledge of the age and dimensions of the cosmos, the development of life-forms and the appearance of man. These discoveries invite us to even greater admiration for the greatness of the Creator, prompting us to give him thanks for all his works and for the understanding and wisdom he gives to scholars and researchers. With Solomon they can say: "It is he who gave me unerring knowledge of what exists, to know the structure of the world and the activity of the elements... for wisdom, the fashioner of all things, taught me." 121 (159, 341)
- 284 The great interest accorded to these studies is strongly stimulated by a question of another order, which goes beyond the proper domain of the natural sciences. It is not only a question of knowing when and how the universe arose physically, or when man appeared, but rather of discovering the meaning of such an origin: is the universe governed by chance, blind fate, anonymous necessity, or by a transcendent, intelligent and good Being called "God"? And if the world does come from God's wisdom and goodness, why is there evil? Where does it come from? Who is responsible for it? Is there any liberation from it?
