

From the General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM)



The Readings cont.

358. In the Lectionary for weekdays, readings are provided for each day of every week throughout the entire course of the year; hence, these readings will in general be used on the days to which they are assigned, unless there occurs a Solemnity, a Feast, or Memorial that has its own New Testament readings, that is to say, readings in which mention is made of the Saint being celebrated.

Should, however, the continuous reading during the week from time to time be interrupted, on account of some Solemnity or Feast, or some particular celebration, then the Priest shall be permitted, bearing in mind the scheme of readings for the entire week, either to combine parts omitted with other readings or to decide which readings are to be given preference over others.

In Masses for special groups, the Priest shall be allowed to choose texts more particularly suited to the particular celebration, provided they are taken from the texts of an approved Lectionary.

359. In addition, in the Lectionary a special selection of texts from Sacred Scripture is given for Ritual Masses into which certain Sacraments or Sacramentals are incorporated, or for Masses that are celebrated for certain needs.

Sets of readings of this kind have been so prescribed so that through a more apt hearing of the Word of God the faithful may be led to a fuller understanding of the mystery in which they are participating, and may be educated to a more ardent love of the Word of God.

Therefore, the texts proclaimed in the celebration are to be chosen keeping in mind both an appropriate pastoral reason and the options allowed in this matter.

De la Instrucción General del Misal Romano (IGMR)

Lecturas cont.

358. En el Leccionario ferial se proponen lecturas para todos los días de cualquier semana a lo largo de todo el año; por consiguiente, se tomarán preferentemente esas lecturas en los mismos días para los que están señaladas, a no ser que coincidan con una solemnidad o fiesta o una memoria que tenga lecturas propias del Nuevo Testamento, en las que se hace mención del santo celebrado.

Sin embargo, si alguna vez la lectura continua se interrumpe dentro de la semana por alguna solemnidad o fiesta o alguna celebración particular, le está permitido al sacerdote, teniendo a la vista el orden entero de toda la semana, o juntar con las otras lecturas las que se omitieron, o determinar a cuáles textos habrá que darles preferencia.

En las Misas para grupos peculiares, el sacerdote puede escoger algunos textos que sean más apropiados para determinada celebración particular, con tal de que los tome de algún Leccionario aprobado.

359. Existe además en el Leccionario una selección particular de textos de la Sagrada Escritura para las Misas rituales en que va incluido algún Sacramento o Sacramental, o para las Misas que se celebran por diversas necesidades.

Estos Leccionarios se han hecho para que los fieles, ovendo una lectura más acomodada de la Palabra de Dios, puedan llegar a entender mejor el misterio en el que toman parte y sean formados en una mayor estima de la Palabra de Dios.

Por consiguiente, los textos que se proclaman en una celebración han de determinarse teniendo presente no sólo los normales motivos pastorales, sino también la libertad de elección concedida para estos casos.

CCC - Paragraph 5. Heaven and Earth

II. "Body and Soul but Truly One"

- The human person, created in the image of God, is a being at once corporeal and spiritual. The biblical account expresses this reality in symbolic language when it affirms that "then the LORD God formed man of dust from the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living being." 229 Man, whole and entire, is therefore willed by God. (1146, 2332)
- 363 In Sacred Scripture the term "soul" often refers to human life or the entire human person.230 But "soul" also refers to the innermost aspect of man, that which is of greatest value in him,231 that by which he is most especially in God's image: "soul" signifies the spiritual principle in man. (1703)
- 364 The human body shares in the dignity of "the image of God": it is a human body precisely because it is animated by a spiritual soul, and it is the whole human person that is intended to become, in the body of Christ, a temple of the Spirit:232 (1004, 2289)

Man, though made of body and soul, is a unity. Through his very bodily condition he sums up in himself the elements of the material world. Through him they are thus brought to their highest perfection and can raise their voice in praise freely given to the Creator. For this reason man may not despise his bodily life. Rather he is obliged to regard his body as good and to hold it in honor since God has created it and will raise it up on the last day.233

365 The unity of soul and body is so profound that one has to consider the soul to be the "form" of the body:234 i.e., it is because of its spiritual soul that the body made of matter becomes a living, human body; spirit and matter, in man, are not two natures united, but rather their union forms a single nature.

64. What are sacraments? Baptism, Penance, Eucharist

The sacrament where Christ gives himself to you as nourishment: you receive the Body of Christ, and you grow to be more and more like him.

Confirmation

The sacrament where God the Holy Spirit makes you strong to serve in the kingdom of God.

Marriage

The sacrament where God joins a baptized man and a baptized woman in his love.

Holy orders

The sacrament where God equips a man with his power and authority to serve the Church in his name.

Anointing of the Sick

The sacrament where God strengthens the sick and those close to death.

-> Sacraments are holy signs of God's action instituted by Christ. Through them, God gives us his divine life, which we call grace. Their words, symbols, and gestures signify what they bring about.
