

# Sunday Reflection With Fr. Rafal

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Let's look at today's Gospel on this **15th Sunday in Ordinary Time.** Jesus, you remember, is on the road to Jerusalem. He meets a cast of characters and spends time teaching. Today a scholar of the law - a scribe - approaches Jesus. In the Gospels scribes are uniformly negative. Why? Well, rather than bringing them close to God and the people, they use their knowledge to look down on others.

Let me give you an example: we live in a culture in which money is important to many of us. We want money to take care of basic needs and to help others. Money, however, can become a source of superiority. Back in the 1940's C.S. Lewis wrote: "What is it that makes a man with \$10,000 a year anxious to get \$20,000 a year? It is not the greed for more pleasure. \$10,000 will give all the luxuries that any man can really enjoy. It is Pride - the wish to be richer than some other rich man, and (still more) the wish for power." Ten thousand could buy a lot more in 1940 than today, so you get the idea.

It's true that pride can motivate a person to work hard, strive for excellence and benefit others. Still pride can become destructive. C.S. Lewis sums it up this way: "Each person's pride is in competition with every one else's pride." Pride often leads to put downs, bullying and even violence.

In today's Gospel the scholar of the law - the scribe - embodies pride. He studied hard, for sure, and he has knowledge which could greatly help others. Instead he uses his knowledge to show himself superior, more clever than anyone else - including Jesus.

Big mistake. Jesus has no need to prove anything to the scribe's question, Jesus responds with a question: You ask what to do to inherit life, well, tell me, what is written in the law? The scribe quotes the commands about love: love of God and love of neighbor. When Jesus tells him then to do it, the scribe wants to justify himself. So he asks, who is my neighbor?

Here's where it gets interesting. Jesus offers a parable for overcoming pride. He tells about a man journeying from Jerusalem to Jericho. Jerusalem, Mount Zion, is the high point, Jericho the low point, over 3000 feet lower than Jerusalem. In the Bible Jericho represents the world, the fallen world. On that road to Jericho robbers attack the unfortunate man. They steal his possessions including all of his clothes. They beat him so badly he appears dead.

A priest and a Levite come by. Like the scribe they know the law. They can talk about love of neighbor. Yet they are reluctant to investigate if the man is dead or not. Besides, they have "important" things to do. They may have plans to reform their nation.

Then comes a Samaritan. Remember, Jesus had just passed through Samaria. He had personally felt the hostility between Samaritans and Jews. To speak favorably about a Samaritan would be like a Democrat praising a Republican - or vice versa. Jesus portrays the Samaritan as someone with practical humility. To care for the unfortunate man, the Samaritan uses his own resources: oil, wine and mule. He uses his own money and time. He gets help from others - in this case the innkeeper. And he promises to follow up. That's practical humility.

For today I ask you to remember: The word pride can have a good sense - we can take pride in others by genuinely admiring them. Still we must recognize that pride in the sense of smug superiority can do damage. It sets people against each other. Jesus teaches how to overcome pride: by looking for a way to praise even our opponents - and by practical humility. That means sharing resources and time, by getting others involved and following up.

# NEVER UNDERESTIMATE THE POWER OF PERSEVERANCE



#### WHAT JESUS DOESN'T SAY

"If Jesus wanted us to (fill in the blank), he would have said so."

We hear this argument applied to every controversial topic under the sun — and even some not-so-controversial topics, too. Whenever someone is trying to make a case for a decision they have already made, they call in Jesus' scriptural silence on the matter as their expert, unimpeachable witness.

And sure, there's much Jesus doesn't talk about in the Gospels. But by this logic, we would have to assume that Jesus doesn't care, for instance, if we drive well over the speed limit (he doesn't discuss cars and highways in the Bible) or what we do online (he never mentions the Internet or websites at all!), when we know that certainly is just not the case.

Like the scholar of the Jewish law who challenges Jesus to define who exactly his "neighbor" is, we can argue semantics all we want. But if we rest in prayer and look deep into our hearts, we know what path we need to take, and it's usually not the easy one.

I find that I do this plenty in ways that are far more subtle. I lament that the situation facing me is not sufficiently "black and white." I become frustrated by the shades of moral grey and toss up my hands, claiming I don't know what the right answer is, insisting that I can't be blamed for the ramifications of whatever decision I make.

What I need to be doing in these situations is asking God for His guidance, even if it makes me nervous. I need to be like the scholar. He was brave enough to ask, even though I think he knew he wouldn't particularly like the answer. Let's strive for that same courage.







Kateri Tekakwitha, (pronounced [gaderi dega'gwita] in Mohawk), was a young Mohawk woman who lived in the 17th century. The story of her conversion to Christianity, her courage in the face of suffering and her extraordinary holiness is an inspiration to all Christians.


Tekakwitha is the name the girl was given by her Mohawk tribe. It translates to "She who bumps into things." Kateri is the Christian name she took at the time of her baptism. Kateri was born around 1656 in the Mohawk village of Ossernenon near present-day Auriesville, New York. She was the daughter of a Mohawk chief, Kenneronkwa, and Tagaskouita, a Roman Catholic Algonquin woman, who had been adopted into the tribe after capture. Her mother had been baptized and educated by French missionaries in Trois-Rivières, east of Montreal. Mohawk warriors captured her and took her to their homeland where she eventually married Kenneronkwa. Tekakwitha was the first of two children. A brother followed.

As a young girl she would circle a cornfield while praying the "Hail Mary" in her native tongue. She had learned the prayer from her mother before being orphaned, scarred and nearly blinded by the same small pox epidemic that caused her parents and baby brothers death when she was about four years old. She was then adopted by her father's sister and her husband, a chief of the Turtle Clan who bitterly opposed her fledging Christianity.

By the time Tekakwitha turned 17, around 1674, her adoptive parents had become concerned over her lack of interest in young men as potential husbands. In accordance with Iroquois custom, they paired her with boy who they expected she would marry. However, Kateri wanted to dedicate her life to God by remaining single and offering her life to Jesus. Rather than cooperate, Tekakwitha fled the cabin and hid from her family in a nearby field. For this rebuff, Tekakwitha's aunts punished her with ridicule, threats, and harsh workloads. While submitting to their work demands, Tekakwitha who had taken a vow of perpetual virginity, stayed firm in her resistance to marriage.

In the spring of 1675 at age eighteen, Tekakwitha met the Jesuit Father Jacques de Lamberville, who was visiting people in the village. Most of the women were out harvesting corn, but Tekakwitha had injured her foot and was in the cabin. In the presence of others, Tekakwitha told him her story and her desire to become a Christian. It was after this that she started studying the catechism with him.

After about a year of catechism study, she was judged ready to convert to Catholicism. Lamberville baptized Tekakwitha at the age of 19, on Easter Sunday, April 18, 1676. She was baptized "Catherine" after St. Catherine of Siena (Kateri was the Mohawk form of the name).



After Catherine was baptized, she remained with the tribe for another six months, where she was ridiculed and scorned by villagers. She was subjected to unfair accusations and her life was threatened.

Nearly two years after her baptism, she escaped to the Mission of St. Francis Xavier, a settlement of Christian Natives in Canada.

Tekakwitha was said to have put thorns on her sleeping mat and to have lain on them while praying for the conversion and forgiveness of her kinsmen. Piercing the body to draw blood was a traditional practice of the Mohawk and other Iroquois nations. She lived at the mission the remaining two years of her life.

Within minutes of her death on April 17, 1680, at the age of 24, witnesses say her scars vanished and she appeared radiant and beautiful. Known for her virtue of chastity and mortification of the flesh, as well as being shunned by her tribe for her religious conversion to Catholicism, she is the fourth Native American to be venerated in the Roman Catholic Church.

Under the pontificate of Pope John Paul II, she was beatified in 1980 and canonized by Pope Benedict XVI at Saint Peter's Basilica on October 21, 2012. Various miracles and supernatural events are attributed to her intercession.

She is the first Native American to be declared a Saint. Her feast day is July 14. She is the patroness of the environment

and ecology as is St. Francis of Assisi.

## Comments:

Most of us tend to think that our proposed holiness is thwarted by our situations. If only...we had more time, more solitude, better health, etc.
