MAKE YOUR HEART A PLACE OF WELCOME

"Our families need to ask for the gift of the Spirit! Through prayer, even in the busiest times, we give time back to God, we find the peace that comes from appreciating the important things, and we encounter the joy of God's unexpected gifts. Through daily prayer may our homes become, like the house of Martha and Mary, places where Jesus always finds a warm welcome (Pope Francis)." While it is necessary to attend to the details of hospitality, learning how to be present to people, experiences, and God is sometimes more important. Creating homes that are welcoming environments requires not only organization and structure but members who truly enjoy being there and celebrating life with one another.

Details can often get the best of us. While attending to details is important to success, our obsession with them can be problematic. Whether wanting to make a good impression, fear of failure, insecurity, or emotional immaturity, throwing ourselves into the "details" of hospitality can distract us from being present to those we want to serve. Conversely, focusing exclusively on being present without any attention to detail also sets our attempts at hospitality up for disaster! We need a balance of both. But creating a truly welcoming space in our homes and within ourselves requires still more.

We have to be empty of ourselves. Becoming a welcoming, hospitable person is not possible in someone focused on their own needs and desires. If the one we serve is the one who looks back at us in the mirror, then there is no space for anyone else. While Martha and Mary had different ideas of what it means to serve, they both had the inner space and freedom to do so. They were detached from themselves. Detachment becomes the challenge to hospitality and creating a God-centered, open-hearted space in our lives. When we impulsively act out of our personal agendas, violence, abuse, pride, greed, lust, power, control, passion, and self-aggrandizement encroach upon the space needed to be present to another human being. Not only can others not find a home in us, but even God cannot find a home in us!

The LORD is close to the brokenhearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit.

BE READY FOR GOD TO "STOP BY"

In my experience, most people can be divided into two groups: those who are old enough to remember when you kept food on hand for company, and those who aren't.

For those of you in the latter group, let me explain. Before text messaging and social media made us all unconditionally, mercilessly reachable, people would do this thing called "stopping by." They would be passing by a friend's house, maybe on the way home from work or shopping, and they would just ... stop. With no warning. No notice whatsoever. "I was just in the neighborhood," they would say. I remember my mother and I would do this on many a Saturday. It wasn't an everyday occurrence, but it was common enough that you had to be ready.

"Crazy," you might exclaim. "People just appeared on your doorstep? How did you cope with the uncertainty?" Well, most of us had moms who kept a little something on hand to eat or drink that was extra nice, just in case anyone stopped by. That way, we were always ready.

Today's readings are about a lot of things: prayer, hope, redemptive suffering. They're about what it means to be a Christian, and not just what it means to do Christian things.

Most of all, though, they're about readiness. If God showed up at your door, would you be ready for Him? Would you be ready for what He gives you, or what He takes away? Would you be ready for Him to interrupt the plans you have for yourself? To disrupt the idea you carry in your mind of what a servant or a steward is supposed to be?

Read your Bible. Say your rosary. Go to Mass. Get to Confession. Talk to God — every day, not just when you think you need Him. That way, you are always ready.





Decree for Plenary Indulgence on the occasion of the Second World Day of Grandparents and the Elderly DECREE

The Apostolic Penitentiary, in order to increase the devotion of the faithful and to procure the salvation of souls, by virtue of the faculties attributed to it by the Supreme Pontiff Francis, accepting the request presented by His Eminence Cardinal Kevin Joseph Farrell, prefect of the Dicastery for the Laity, Family and Life, on the occasion of the Second World Day of Grandparents and the Elderly, already instituted by the Supreme Pontiff on the fourth Sunday of July, graciously grants from the heavenly treasures of the Church the Plenary Indulgence under the usual conditions (Sacramental Confession, Eucharistic Communion and prayer in accordance with the intentions of the Supreme Pontiff) to grandparents, the elderly and all the faithful who, motivated by a true spirit of penance and charity, will participate on 24 July 2022, on the occasion of the Second World Day of Grandparents and the Elderly, in the solemn celebration that the Holy Father Francis will preside over in the Vatican Papal Basilica, or in the various functions that will be held throughout the world, an Indulgence that may also be applied for the repose of souls in Purgatory.

This Court of Mercy will also grant the Plenary Indulgence on this same day to the faithful who devote adequate time to visit, in presence or virtually, through the media, their elderly brothers and sisters in need or in difficulty (such as the sick, the abandoned, the disabled).

The Plenary Indulgence may also be granted, provided that they remove themselves from any sin and with the intention of fulfilling the three usual conditions as soon as possible, to the sick elderly and to all those who, unable to leave their homes for a serious reason, will unite spiritually with the sacred services of World Youth Day, offering to the Merciful God their prayers, and the pains and sufferings of their lives, especially while the words of the Supreme Pontiff and the various celebrations are broadcast through the media.

In order, therefore, that this opportunity to attain divine grace through the power of the Keys of the Church may be more easily realized through pastoral charity, this Penitentiary firmly requests priests, equipped with the appropriate faculties to hear confessions, to make themselves available with a ready and generous spirit for the celebration of the Sacrament of Penance.

This decree is valid for the Second World Day of the Grandparents and the Elderly. Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary.

The second World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly takes place on Sunday, July 24. Instituted by Pope Francis in 2021, this Church wide celebration takes place close to the liturgical memorial of Saints Anne and Joachim, the Grandparents of Jesus. The theme chosen by



the Holy Father for this World Day is "In old age they will still bear fruit" (Psalm 92:15) which is a way of expressing the living of this age to the fullest. Grandchildren and young people are called upon to be present in the lives of older people, and older people and grandparents also have the mission of evangelization, proclamation, and prayer, and of encouraging young people in their Faith. FRATELLI TUTTI The Dignity of Work and the Rights of Workers



"Work is fundamental to the dignity of a person. Work ... gives one the ability to maintain oneself, one's family, to contribute to the growth of one's own nation."

Pope Francis, Feast of St. Joseph, 2013

"...some opportune remedy must be found quickly for the misery and wretchedness pressing ... on the majority of the working class: for the ancient workingmen's guilds were abolished in the last century, and no other protective organization took their place ... working men have been surrendered ... to the hardheartedness of employers and the greed of unchecked competition." (RERUM NOVARUM, Paragraph 2)

Pope Leo XIII wrote Rerum Novarum in 1891. Not much has changed since then or since the early 20th century when Dorothy Day and Peter Maurin published the Catholic Worker. Once again workers are striking for the right to organize. The minimum wage is so low that people work two jobs and stand in line at food pantries to feed their families. Instead of showing mercy, people in post-pandemic America complain that "no one wants to work" because they are "living on unemployment." Here is a fact given by Florida Unemployment and Eligibility: As of 2021, the maximum time you can receive (unemployment) benefits is **19 weeks**. Your weekly benefit amount is calculated by dividing your total earnings in the quarter in which you were paid the most by 26. You will then receive this amount per week, or the weekly maximum of \$275, whichever is lower.

Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time — Year C

Even if she hadn't lived in times that begged for reform, St. Bridget of Sweden would have found opportunities to build a better Church and world. She was incapable of flinching from difficult realities. She was a natural contemplative and a woman of bold action who was guided by the Spirit throughout her life. She is honored as patroness of Sweden and co-patroness of Europe (along with Saints Catherine of Siena and Edith Stein).

The signs that great things were to come surfaced early. At age seven, Bridget reported a vision of an altar with a lady sitting above it, holding a crown and inviting Bridget to wear it. Throughout her life, she continued to speak of divine revelations, which usually focused on the sufferings of Jesus. These revelations made Bridget something of a celebrity to some and a controversial figure to others.

Born north of Stockholm on June 14, 1303 into a wealthy, powerful family, Bridget married at the age of 14 and bore eight children. She made it a priority to minister to the sick in her neighborhood, often with some of her children in tow.

She lived her married life in the court of the Swedish King Magnus II. Bridget constantly strove to exert her good influence over Magnus; while never fully reforming, he did give her land and buildings to found a monastery for men and women.

A Woman of Patience and Perseverance

When her husband died after 28 years of marriage, Bridget undertook a life of penitence and celibacy. In 1347, guided by her ongoing revelations and using the land and buildings she received from Magnus II, she began the establishment of a "double community" of women and men—nuns, priests and brothers that came to be known as the Order of the Most Holy Savior, or the Brigettines, (still in existence today).

Members, including Bridget and her daughter Catherine (St. Catherine of Sweden), lived austere lives. Any unneeded money went to the poor. Brigettines were permitted, however, to own books, and the monastery became the literary center of Scandinavia.

Bridget's boldest mission still lay before her. In 1350, a Jubilee Year, Bridget braved a plague-stricken Europe to make a pilgrimage to Rome accompanied by her daughter, Catherine, and a small party of priests and disciples. She had a dual purpose: to obtain papal approval for her new religious foundation and to gain the Jubilee indulgence that would be granted during the



Holy Year of 1350. Her patience and perseverance were put to the test: She waited 20 years before receiving official Church approval for her new order.

Final Pilgrimage

A final pilgrimage to the Holy Land, marred by shipwreck and the death of her son, Charles, led to her death at the age of 70 on July 23, 1373. She was canonized in 1391 by Pope Boniface IX. On October 1, 1999 Pope John Paul II named St Bridget a patroness Saint of Sweden and co-patroness Saint of Europe (along with Saints Catherine of Siena and Edith Stein). Her feast day is celebrated on July 23, the day of her death.

Comments

Rome was hardly hospitable during her lifetime. Parts of the city lay in ruins while other parts were divided into armed camps headed by rival factions. For decades, the papacy had been headquartered in Avignon in southern France. Spurred by revelations, Bridget confidently launched a campaign to return the papacy to Rome, writing letters to several popes. If she'd had access to e-mails and faxes, she would have used them as well! Despite her pleading and cajoling, the change she sought didn't come until 1378, five years after her death.

If it's not indelicate to ask, when did she reach her heyday? Early, as a devoted wife and mother? Later, as an ascetic widow and leader

of a new religious community? Still later, as a struggling pilgrim in Rome? Finally, as a voice of Church reform? Or was it as a lifelong beneficiary of divine revelations? In truth, Bridget displayed heroic holiness at every phase of her life. At each point along the way, she experienced joy as well as sorrow, success as well as failure, doubt as well as certainty. But she found God every time. Her life invites us to do the same.

Historical Background

Throughout most of Bridget's life, Avignon in France, rather than Rome, was the seat of the papacy. The tumultuous period was later described as the "Babylonian Captivity of the Church." The papacy was at its lowest point in prestige and influence. Bishops and other clergy were expected to pay taxes. Nepotism was common. Indulgences were for sale. Competing political interests among European nations led to further acrimony and strife.

Into the fray stepped Bridget of Sweden. Until a few months before her death, she was pleading with Pope Gregory XI to return to Rome lest he lose his temporal and spiritual power. Upon his return, St. Catherine of Siena (Bridget's Daughter) took up her call.
